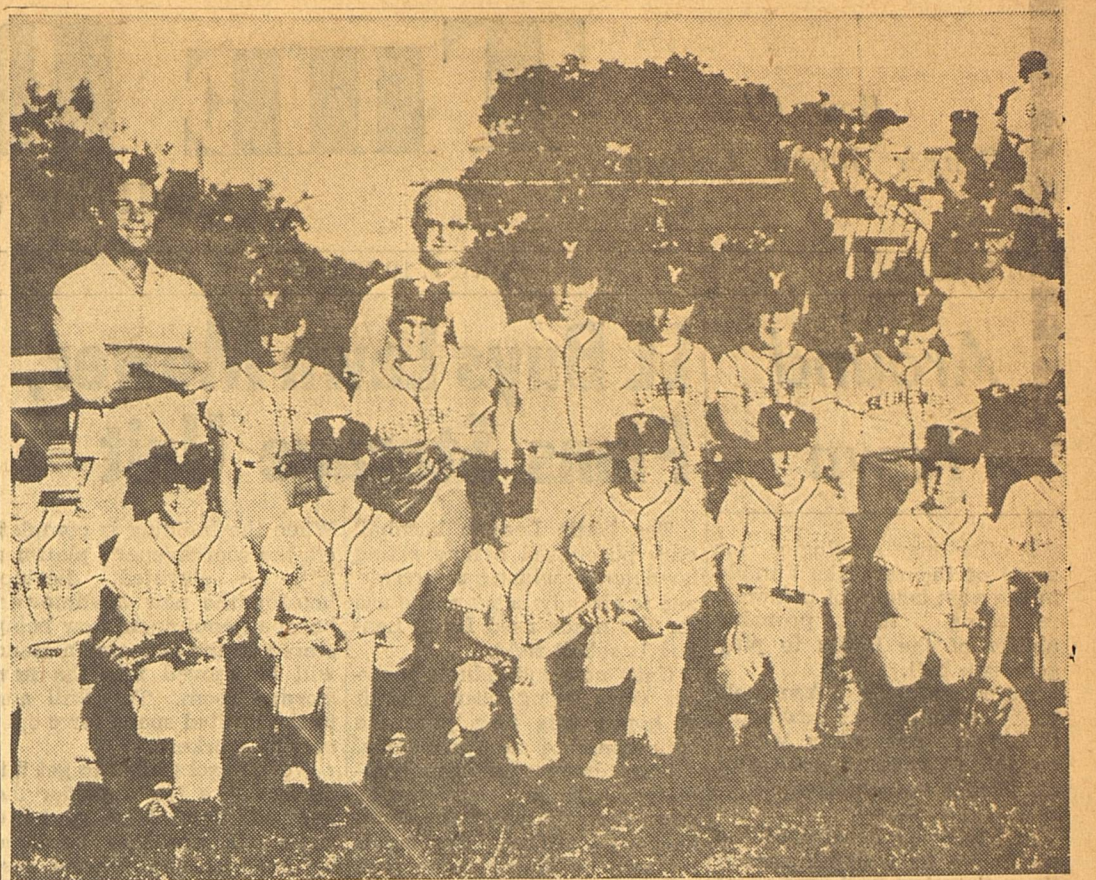

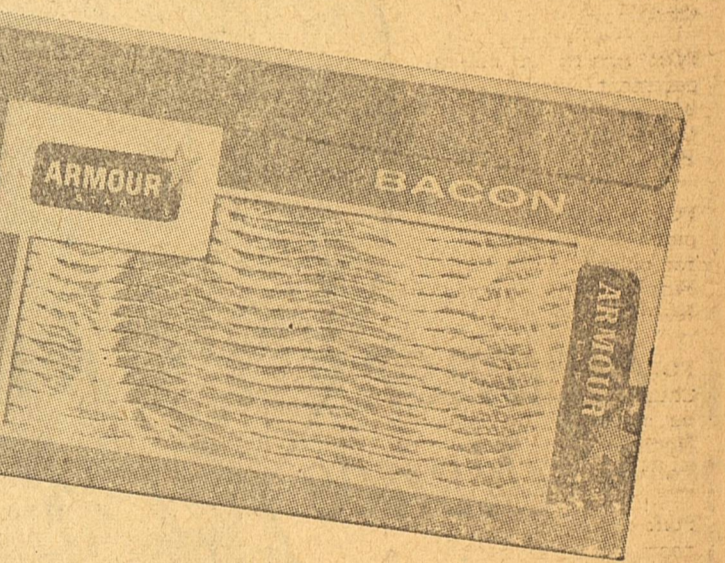

Rebekah Lodge Holds Regular Session

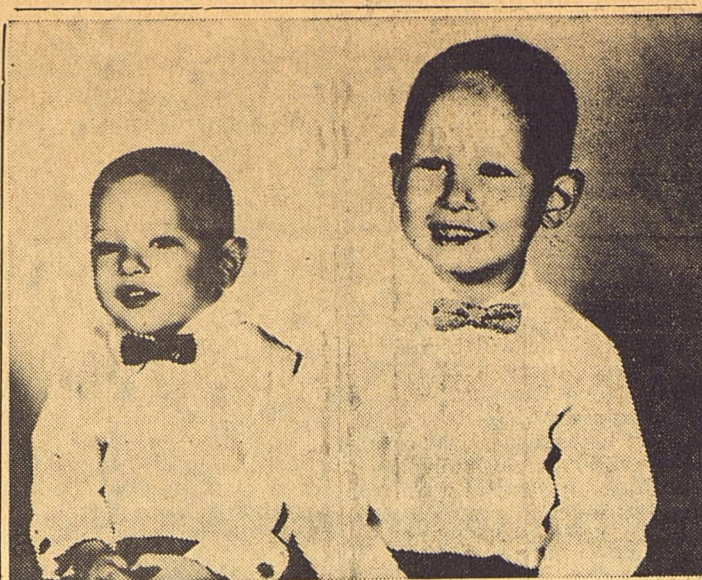
