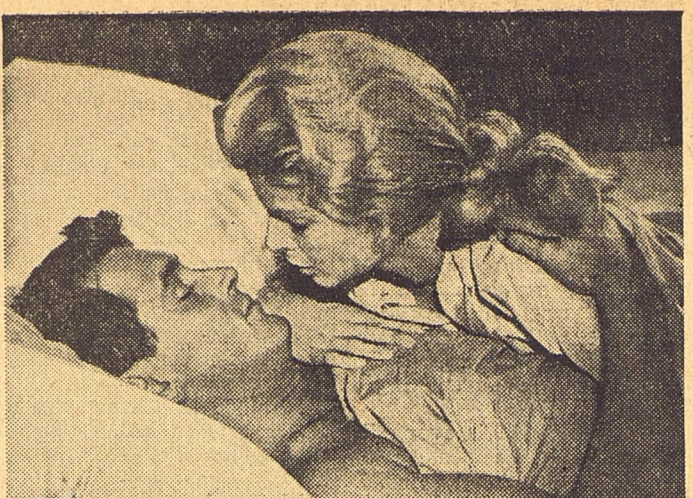

**Mens Softball Team Scores Third Win Over Eastland**

The Ranger men's softball team once again displayed their ability to come from behind, winning a close one from Eastland Thursday night.  
Eastland owned the ball game for the first five innings, by a margin of 1 to 0. Their 1 run advantage came by the home-run route off the bat of Walter Maynard in the second inning.  
The game was a pitching duel from the first through the seventh innings, with Bob Gailey of Ranger and Jack Petree of Eastland going all the way. When the game was over Bob Gailey was ahead in the statistics, allowing only two runs on eight hits, with six strikeouts, while Jack Petree allowed three of Ranger's five runs on thirteen hits. Two of Ranger's runs were on errors.  
The game was not without its heroes, as two Ranger players turned in game saving performances.  
Jimmy Wilson made two, game-saving, three-finger catches at the center field wall, robbing Eastland of two certain home runs. With the men left stranded, this would have been more than enough to win the ball game.  
In the top of the sixth inning Ranger made its scoring debut with one run scoring on a wild pitch and Jim Everett's on a single by Bob Gailey. Ranger now led by a score of 2 to 1.  
In the bottom half of the sixth Eastland once again went the home run route to tie the game going into the final inning.  
In the top of the seventh, Bill Collins singled, bringing up Randel Hover who thundered the first pitch into the darkness above and beyond the lighted area. The last time the ball was seen, was when it went out of sight, going up. This scored two more runs to break the tie. One more run was donated by Eastland and Ranger went into the bottom of the seventh with a three run lead.  
Ranger was able to hold onto its advantage making the final score, 5 to 3.

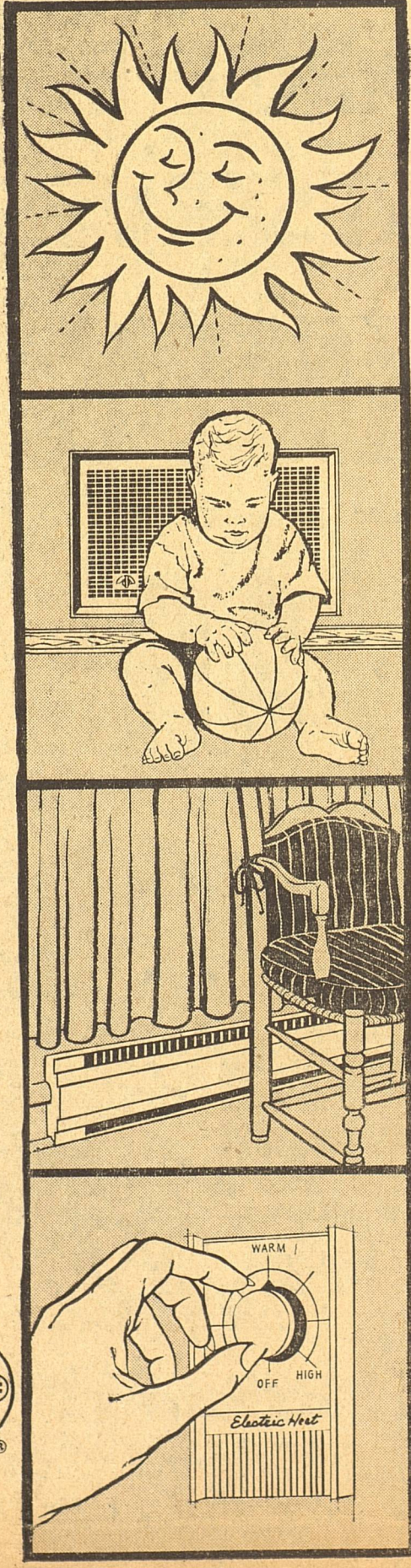
