# Republican Nominee Sweeps Country by Overwhelming Vote; 14 States for Cox, Three Doubtful, All Others for Harding

Earliest returns from the far eastern states in Tuesday's election gave evidence of a trend toward Senator Harding, which became a veritable landslide as fuller reports came in. It was soon apparent that Governor Cox had been buried under an avalanche of votes in that section. The Middle West chimed in with the same verdict and the indersement of Harding swept all the way across the continent without a single reverse. From all indications at 5 o'clock Wednesday morning, with the vote of the entire nation probably one-fourth counted, the Harding majorities are so tremendous that it would take a reversal much more phenomenal than the one which returned Woodrow Wilson to office in 1916 to in any way affect



## THERE IS A HEREAFTER, SAYS **BISHOP BURCH IN DISCUSSING** THOMAS EDISON'S NEW THEORY

ison has now evolved a new theory tal life of personality. concerning the human personality and sonality, or soul, as we may wish to call pensed. that part of our mental and spiritual

Our bodies are made up of countless small cells which Mr. Edison calls entities. These cells never die, but at the time of death pass from the bedy to take other form "thus giving the eternal life which many of us hope for. This means little to you and me," Mr. Edison is quoted as saying, "it, when we come to that stage known as death our personality breaks up into small separate units which combine with others to make new structures."

Mr. Edison is at present construct ing an instrument with which he expects to determine whether or not it is possible to communicate with departed spirits. Dreary and hopeless as the scientist's belief may make the future for those who agree with him or are influenced by his statements, the opposite side of his argument is here given by Bishop Char-les Sumper Burch of the Episcopal diocese of New York.

Views of Bishop Burch "This is a very interesting contribution by Mr. Edison to the discussion of my long and earnest attention, but I' will say this much:

## 'Junk Men' Make Money From Old Wells at Hogtown

Reports from Desdemona indicate that there is renewed activity there along the line of drilling wells deeper and increasing production, and in' many cases re-establishing remunerative production in wells that were thought worthless except for junk. Most of these wells have been bought up from small operators by the larger companies and by "junkers." Some of them were originally barely drilled into the sand, and deeper drilling and a small shot produce very satisfactory results in the 2,700 foot sand. Others are wells bought at salvage values, whose buyers, experienced in the ways of oil and the art

of coaxing it from the ground, secure enough production to repay their initial investment, leaving the tankage; casing and other equipment as pure "velvet."

There are also a fair number of new holes in the field, especially the northwest extension.

## BLACK BROS. SET CASING ON WEIR WELL

Black Bros. are setting casing on their Weir No. 1 well, northeast of Desdemona, at 3,100 feet, with a good show of oil and gas. This well is about a mile north of the Magnolia's Carruth well, which came in nearly a year ago for 5,000 barrels and is still producing. It is in partially proven territory, as another well still further north has shown oil despite a faulty hole.

International News Service. LONDON, Nov. 2-Buyers from Paris who wish to attend the International Shoe and Leather fair which is being held here are accommodated with a special service of aeroplanes from the French capital to this city.

The present fair, which is the twenty-first, is the biggest yet held. There are over 400 exhibitors—but none from Germany, and the department of overseas trade is actively co-operating with the British manufacturers in their endeavors to find overseas markets.

In view of the recent "slump" in the leather industry, says the American Chamber of Commerce in London, commenting on the fair, much dissatisfaction is being expressed at the imports of German upper leather, which is reported to


be arriving in large quantities.



Unofficial results indicate that the Republican candidate will run up a larger majority in the presidential race than any since 1888, excepting only the one for Wilson in 1912 during the time of the Republican party split. The first trial of woman suffrage this year contributed largely to the Republican majorities.

## TUMULTY ON WILSON.

Secretary Tumulty's portrayal of the character of President Wilson will take high rank among the classics of American biography. It is the work of an admiring friend who has had extraordinary opportunities to study his subject in the most intimate relations and whose knowledge is verified by his discriminating recognition of qualities which he wishes might have been different. A masterpiece of analysis, it is also a personal tribute of rare eloquence.

When we come to understand the Presidents' abhorrence of war, his hatred of aggression, tyranny and wrong, his idealistic devotion to Democratic selfgovernment and his myincible belief in the ultimate triumph of right, many things are made plain. He has not magnified the responsibilities of his office. They have exalted him. Bound to duty by a conscience as unbending as his will, he appealed to arms only when every other resouce had, been exhausted and the man of peace and justice became in war the most terrible of the foes of autocracy. With victory gained, such a chieftain could no more surrender its fruits than he could have struck his colors when the conflict was raging.




