SWITCH COULD HAVE CAUSED COLLISION AT BRECKWALKER

Expectant Mother in Serious Condition; Impact of Two Engines Lock Locomotives as Collision Comes; Twenty Injured.

Charges that a switch was deliberately thrown are voiced by Bob Hansford, an engineer, and J. T. Hamilton, fireman, who were among the twenty-five injured last night when the northbound passenger train swerved into a switch at Breckwalker and crashed into a freight engine.

The collision occurred as the train was nearing the staion at Breckwalker. .. Steam had been shut off, but the train was running about eighteen miles an hour, when the engineer was given the "clear" signal by a brakeman on the freight train. Hamilton asserts that he was leaning out of the window at the time, and is positive that the switchlight showed green. buddenly the engine swerved into the housetrack which runs alongside the Breckwalker depot. Thirty-five feet ahead loomed one of the road's big freight engines. Hansford applied the brakes and jumped through the window. He landed on the right ankle and the left knee. Both are badly sprained and the knee may be fractured, but it is too swellen at present for a decision to be made Hamilton braced himself and stuck. He was skinned a bit when the crash came.

Men Who Took "Vacations" Heed Advice of Brotherhood and End Dispute.

Through the efforts of members of the four railway brotherhoods, who compose the large majority of the employes of the Hamon-Kell railroad, a peaceful settlement of the controversy between the switchmen and the officials has been reached. All of the men except a few irreconcilables are back at work today and after a sixteen-hour interruption traffic is back at normal.

A meeting of the Yardmen's association, an unofficial local union, was addressed last night by brotherhood men, who pointed out that although conditions might not be satisfactory, the road was within its rights in cutting down the two-hours overtime at any time conditions demanded it, that the trouble was unauthorized and could not have the support of the brotherhoods as no contract has yet been signed with the railroad.

The advice to return to work was heeded by the men on vacation, and conditions went back to normal this morning.

The action of the men in refusing to work under the ten-hour day was not a strike, but the act of the employes as individuals.





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
