Cheerful Before the End. Often it got so lonely that he visited a sympathetic friend, Mrs. Amelia Helmer, who lives on the floor above. He called there Saturday night. She said yesterday that she played the piano for him and when he left he was more cheerful than in months.

ONLY CONVULSION OF NATURE OR SUDDEN DEATH CAN CHECK DELIRIUM OF DUCK HUNTERS

Isn't it queer how duck hunters always travel in pairs? Or possibly it is not so queer, either, when one considers the nature of the disease, since only those who are affected will put up with the wild ravings of their tribe. But no matter what the cause they will always be found two or more in a bunch and even the batting average of Babe Ruth will not turn them from their gibberings of mallards and greenheads and the respective merits of 7 1/2 chilled shot against a larger size for long-range shooting.

It was so this morning; a twain of the species were together. The feverish light of the duck-slayer was in their eyes and their arms swung wildly about. Said one to the other: "Listen here, all we gotta do is to ride this here Sunshine Special that leaves at 7:20 in the evening out to Pig Spring or Lorraine or somewhere. We'll hop off at daylight way out 'yan' where the mallards are thick and will."

Lissen, fellows, Lissen. "Or," and the first speaker was at it again, "we could go to Sweetwater, change trains, change again at Daylight at Texaco, go to Las Vegas, N. M., right up in the mountains."

Collision Smashed Concrete Steamer's Hull to Pieces

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 6.—The sinking of the concrete steamer Cape Fear in Narragansett bay recently, in which seventeen men perished, will cost this type of ship into disfavor, it is believed.

The Cape Fear went down within three minutes of the collision, members of her crew said. The impact practically crumpled her concrete hull to pieces, they said, chips of concrete being struck off in all directions, much of it falling on the City of Atlanta's decks. The bow of the latter struck the Cape Fear amidships, cutting her almost in two.

A few of the crew of the concrete steamer were caught below, unable to reach the deck before she went down. The others were pulled aboard the City of Atlanta by ropes or jumped into the water. Some of the latter were able to swim clear of the vessel, but others were caught in the suction and went down with her.

Those who were drowned were known only by the names registered with the shipping commissioner here before the Cape Fear sailed for the James river to be tied up, and home addresses were lacking. The Cape Fear's records and papers went down with her, it was said.

Some of the survivors expressed the belief that the concrete ship's boilers exploded soon after the collision. A muffled detonation was heard.

Captain Bertram H. Garfield, of the Savannah liner, places the blame for the collision on Captain A. Biggins of Boothbay Harbor, Maine, master of the Cape Fear. Garfield asserted that the concrete steamer ran across his bow after she had signalled acknowledgment of the City of Atlanta's signal that the latter was going to pass port.

Captain Biggins, who was injured, said he could not discuss the subject at this time.

DENVER DIVORCES TOO CHEAP, JUDGE RULES, FIXES FEE

DENVER, Nov. 6.—"Divorces are too cheap," declared District Judge C. J. Morley Monday, replying to argument of Attorney Z. T. Brown that \$50 was an excessive fee to allow opposing counsel in the case of Lena Cottew against Leo H. Cottew. "People ought to know that they cannot bring ill-considered divorces in these courts without paying for it," declared Judge Morley.

"I think it would have a salutary effect on society if the fee for divorce were not less than \$150. As it stands, attorneys make the price of divorce so cheap that it is an easy matter to bring a divorce charge. A great many divorces are brought that ought never to be started. If it cost a little more people would hesitate about bringing divorce actions."

Mrs. Cottew brought a suit for divorce and later was reconciled to her husband. Her attorney asked the court to dismiss the suit and order the defendant to pay attorney's fees. Judge Morley ordered an attorney's fee of \$50. Cottew's attorney objected that the fee was too much.

UNIVERSITY GAME FOR THANKSGIVING DRAWING BIG CROWD

AUSTIN, Nov. 6.—Since the opening of the sale of tickets for the Thanksgiving football game of the University of Texas with A & M college, the amount received at the university athletic office has exceeded \$10,000. It is expected that the seating capacity of 15,000 will be more than filled on the day of the big game. The \$10,000 reported is only the amount taken in at Austin, and L. Theodore Bellmont, university athletic director, states that he feels confident that more than \$3,000 has been received at A. & M. The entire grandstand for this game is reserved for university of Texas alumni, and the sale of seats is limited to two for each individual alumnus. There will be bleacher sections reserved for students of the university, and also a section for A. & M. students in the bleachers, for which coupon books will give admission. All other seats are open to the general public.

MEMBERS OF GERMAN CABINET LECTURE IN POLITICAL CLASSES

BERLIN, Nov. 6.—Apparently the German government isn't all busy warding off bolshevism, Kaiserism and bankruptcy as the world imagines, for the cabinet ministers have announced that they will adopt the sideline of school teaching. Practically all of the cabinet members, including Dr. Simons and General Groener, are announced as lecturers on the new German High School for Politics.

You don't have to study dry-as-dust books if you wish to learn civics and political science in Germany. You sit comfortably and let the present minister of foreign affairs explain to you exactly how he works and worries; or if you are interested in railroads, you go to the lectures of the minister of railroads, General Groener.

President Ebert is the only prominent figure omitted from the list of professors and lecturers. The truth is that there is nothing to learn about the job

of presiding in republican Germany. When the constitutional convention created a president to succeed the emperor they deprived it of all the privileges and prerogatives which had made the emperor's reign unpopular. When the shearing was over it was found that nothing remained but the name. As the president is permitted to say nothing or do nothing without the permission of the cabinet, Ebert's omission from the list of Government pedagogues has no practical significance.

Neither high school certificate nor college degree is necessary to enroll in the school. "It is open to everyone who desires to co-operate in the solving of our political and economic destiny," announces the Tageliche Rundschau. It is especially intended for the training of future diplomats, teachers of civics and administration officials.

The classes will be held between 4 and 8 in the evening. The high school will have the usual high school organization with regular and special courses divided into semesters.

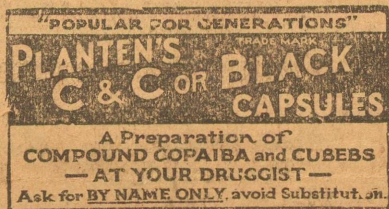

New York's Famed Mystery Mansion Which Never Had Tenant Will Give Way to Modern Apartment House

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Progress has crept up Madison avenue as far as Seventy-second street and put the zero mark on this city's mystery mansion.

Crowding the heels of wreckers, masons and carpenters, romance, as she lives in spires and wrought stone balconies, is slipping out of existence with destruction of the old Rhinclander Waldo residence, which for a quarter of a century has stood upon a corner of the city's most fashionable neighborhood with shutters drawn over the dusty shades. For it is perhaps the only house in New York which never has had a tenant.

Modern Apartment to Be Constructed
According to an official of the building company which has taken it over, the house will be made over into the most modern type of two and three-room duplex apartments. Plans provide for as many as fourteen apartments in the old pile, which was copied after a chateau in Normandy. The furnishings, said to be worth a fortune, were removed and sold a long time ago.

The history of the "mystery mansion" also known as "house of aching hearts", began when Mrs. Gertrude Rhinclander Waldo returned to this country from a visit in France twenty-five years ago and directed that an ancient chateau of that country be reproduced upon a corner then far uptown and uncrowded by apartment houses and family hotels.

The five-story house is of a style unique in this city. Running round the windows of the middle three floors is a balcony of heavily carved stone work, and sharp little turrets break the roof. The windows are small and iron bars protect those on the lower floor.

A great iron lamp, from which the glass is broken lends cheerfulness to the wide entrance.

Work of Building Proceeding Slowly.

The work of building proceeded slowly, according to the story, and was superseded by Mrs. Waldo in person. When it was finished she picked up the decorations and furnishings in the French chateau and, bringing them to America, put them down in her new home. The total cost, it is said, was \$550,000.

But she never enjoyed the palace she had created with so much care. Soon after it was finished her husband, Francis W. Waldo, died, and Mrs. Waldo closed up the house and went abroad. Many times she was offered large sums for it, but she refused to sell. A few rooms in one corner were occupied by caretakers who came and went; the remainder with unwashed, shuttered windows, seemed to stare at the street with sightless eyes.

No one knows exactly how the tale of "aching hearts" or the ghost woman got out.

SAYS FOREIGNERS AND MONGOLIANS IN AUTONOMY PLOT

MUKDEN, Nov. 6.—Major General Chu Chu-hsiang, commanding Chinese troops in Urga, in an urgent telegram to General Chang Tso-lin, commissioner for the three northern Chinese provinces, reports unrest in Urga, Kobdo and among a few tribes in Outer Mongolia. He alleges that the Mongolians with foreign aid and encouragement, are plotting to recover their autonomy, and that unless arrears of pay to the troops and reinforcements are forthcoming serious disturbances are likely to occur. General Chang is, accordingly, dispatching a brigade of troops.

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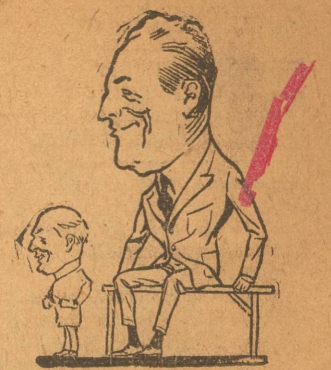

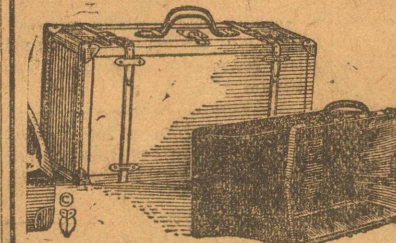
