






### NEW SCOUT CRUISER BEING BUILT FOR ITED/STATES NAVY AT PHILADELPHIA

Ten new scout cruisers for the U.S. navy are under construction. Five of them at the William Cramp & Sons Ship and Engine Building Company yards at Philadelphia. The cruisers will be 555 feet six inches long, with a fifty-five foot beam and a displacement of 7,100 tons, and a speed of thirty-five knots an hour. They will have a complement of nineteen wardroom officers, thirty chief petty officers, seven warrant officers and 300 men. 



# New England and New York Go Republican by Big Majorities; Early Returns Show Harding 2 to 1 Favorite in Ohio and Illinois; Only South for Gov. Cox

That Harding will defeat Cox in the candidate's home state by a majority of almost 2 to 1 seems to be indicated by early returns from that state. Cleveland and Columbus both report clean-cut decisions for the Republican nominee, and unless there is a strong reversal of the present trend, the senator will outvote the governor by the largest majority ever polled in the Buckeye state.

The trend in Ohio is reflected in reports from all parts of the East, with the exception of Indiana. Even there Harding is leading on first reports, from Marion county, where he defeated Cox 3,674 to 3,243. This is the smallest majority yet reported for the Republican nominee.

The only returns that have shown a preference for the Democratic nominee are those from states below the Mason & Dixon line—the Solid South. All other sections have invariably reported strong majorities for the G.O.P. Even Maryland, normally Democratic, gives Harding a handsome lead in the only report sent out.

# FORECAST GOOD VOTE

DALLAS, Nov. 2-With generally fair

Texas returns were slow in coming in on account of the polls not closing until 7 o'clock and the lengthy ballot making tabulations slow. It is noteworthy, however, that the first ten precincts to report gave Harding 237 to 466 for Cox. It this ratio continues, the Republicans will register the largest vote in the history of Texas elections. However, fuller returns show the normal Democratic strength coming to the front, with Cox showing 5,340 to 1,236 for Harding. Neff is being counted in as governor by a clear majority over all opponents, having 3,809 to Culbertson's 571, Capers' 544 and McGregor's 510.

Upstate cities went for the Republicans by majorities as high as 3 to 1. Buffalo cast 76,233 votes for Harding and 32,486 for Cox. Rome went 4,494 to 2,153 and Syracuse 36,653 to 17,523. .These are representative specimens of the vote in this state.

Maine city returns show majorities as high as 5 to 1 for Harding. Bath gave Harding 1,994 to 1,092 for Cox and Rockland gave Harding 1,235 and Cox 867. These being the nearest approach to a Democratic victory. All returns indi-12 cate the largest Republican majority in years in the Pine Tree state. ... ...

Vermont and New Hampshire were concededly Kepublican. Massachusetts gave the Republican ticket a clear majority of better than 2 10 to 1. In Boston only did the Democratic standard bearer make any showing, but lost that city by between 15,000 and 20,000 majority with 115,000 votes counted.

10 New Bedford went G. O. P. by 18,000 to 4,000. Connecticut and Rhode Island show a big ratio in favor of the Republi-20 can ticket, with comparatively few votes counted. Bridgeport went 2 to 1 for Harding with 28,000 votes cats. New Haven showed 10,671 majority for Harding.

The Chicago Journal, Democratic, concedes Illinois to Harding by 250,000 majority. First reports indicated that Harding was leading by more than 2 to 1 outside Chicago, and by about 3 to 2 in the Windy City.

Early reports on the election are mainly from the East. These indicate that Senator Harding, the Republican nominee, has carried every state between the Atlantic ocean and the Mississippi river, north of the Ohio. First returns from New York and New England states indicated a landslide for Harding in that section. Even in New York city, normally Democratic, Harding is leading the incomplete

tabulations by a vote of nearly 2 to 1. Kentucky's early reports refute the Republican claim to that state, although the contest is fairly close, 108 precincts out of 3,000 giving Cox 16,713 and Harding 11,497.

In Oklahoma, 216 precincts out of 2685 give Cox 1746, Harding 1465. Ferris Democrat, is leading Harrell, his Republican opponent, by a slightly reduced majority, 1703 to 1501. Pringey, Republican, is leading McKeoun, Democrat, for congressman from the Fourth district, 223 to 64.

Missouri thus far indicates the heaviest slide to Harding, if early reports are representative. One hundred and seventy-one precincts out of 3810 give Harding 773 to 87 for Cox. Long, Democrat, is leading Spencer, Republican, for the senate. On the next report, However, Cox was leading Harding 3850 to 23 13. in 27 precincts out of 3810.

No states west of Missouri and Oklahoma have reported at this hour, except Kansas, where twelve districts give Harding 2732 to Cox's 1060 The Philadelphia North American from early returns makes the following estimate of

Harding plurality: Pennsylvania, 700.000; New York, 900,000; Massachusetts, 400,000; Connecticutt, 200,000; West Virginia, \$50,000. Returns at 10 o'clock had begun to come in from the West. Montana gave the prevalent 2 to 1 figures in the first five boxes, 634 for Harding to 347 for Cox.

Wyoming's lone report gives Harding26 and Cox 3 at some box unmentioned. Harding is leading in West Virginia, 28,000 to 19,000. Virtually no returns have been received from New Jersey, one district, giving Hard-
