ONE BALLOT ELECTS

Headquarters at the Oil Cities

The war department of the United States has contributed generously but without any intent of charity to the Eastland county's road building program. Roars of laughter resounded last night as County Judge C. R. Starnes at the open forum of the Chamber of Commerce detailed purchases which the county had made at a fraction of their actual

Included in the list were:
Fourteen "junked" Ford automobiles at \$25 each. Sixty sets of harness valued at \$200 each, at \$10; nine hundred squares of corrugated iron, worth \$11 each, for \$3.

Sixty thousand pounds of TNT worth 28 cents, at 10 cents a pound: 30,000 pounds of black powder at a similar discount and 1,000,000 detonators at a lump price. The road work will require some thousands of these "caps," but the army officials didn't need them anyway, so they obligingly made out a surplus order and "threw in" the rest, explaining that they would come in handy in the celebration after the roads are completed.

A Hoe caterpillar tractor was purchased for \$800, and is now rented out by the county for \$20 a day when it is working and \$10 when it is idle, which means that the young locomotive will pay for itself within a couple of months. A Case tractor, "unusable" because a box ing was missing, was condemned by a young first lieutenant and wished

off on the county for \$150. These were only a few of the items re cited by Judge Starnes to show that the countys interests were being well looked after. Nothing was said as to the needs of a guardian for Uncle Sam, but the udge made it clear that while the army cople seemed to think it was their duty to turn everything not needed into cash. and made prices attractive, no bribery was involved. days, Mr. Starnes said. Two-Thirds of Right-of-Way In speaking of the countys highway system, Judge Starnes said that right of way has been secured for 95 45-100 of the 150 miles of roadway. In only a few instances has it been necessary to resort to condemnation proceedings, one being on the Ranger-Thurber road and another just outside of Eastland. There are still places to be ironed out. and some of the roads are still to be definitely located, he continued. commissioners had used condemnation proceedings only as a last resort, Mr. Starnes added, "as next to breaking into his family relations, nothing aggra-

Two roads vitally affecting Ranger are yet to be located, the judge informed the assemblage. One of these is the Ranger-Eastland road. The Royal Duke company has a refinery site of thirty-one acres south of Ranger, for which it paid a nice price during the heighth of oil speculation. On account of a creek and a bluff which the highway encounters at this point, the most feasible route for the road through this property; otherwise a bad detour will have to be made. The company insists that the building of the road through this property would so affect their building plans as to make it worthless for their purpose. RUSSELL CREEK **RESERVOIR SITE** APPEARS GOOD

Would Hold Billion Gallons, Good Sanitary Location, Excellent Watershed.

Misplacement of the plans of the Russell creek reservoir project in the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil company's general offices at Thurber will delay for some weeks the report to be made by Major John B. Hawley of Fort Worth. Major Hawley and city and Chamber of Commerce officials motored over to Thurber Wednesday and had a conference with Mr. Britton, but only a temporary report of the makers of the survey could be G. White & Co., Inc., of New York, constructing engineers, and the complete plans will be obtained for them. The party went over to the site of the proposed reservoir, and it appears very favorable, Mr. Hawley said, though no positive opinion can be expressed until a survey is made. If the project proves feasible, a dam about 1,800 feet long and forty-five feet high could be built at a cost of them. about \$300,000, present construction prices. This would impound a lake of about 250 acres, holding nearly a

billion gallons of water.

The watershed for this project is about nineteen square miles, according to the surveyor's incomplete figures. Ordinarily this would be rather small, but the surface is of such a sections. It is either rock or clay and would give nearly 100 per cent "runoff," Mr. Hawley said.

"Innumerable homes are broken up be cause people don't know how to choose the right kind of furniture," says M. Goult.

"Women are to be blamed more than men, because the women, as a rule, have most to say about the home.

"If a woman would bear in mind, that walls should be covered with colors which suit her complexion, that carpets should be selected to hide or display her feet, that furniture should be stiff or restral, according to her temperament, whether active or languid, she would atways look her best in the home and therefore always be attractive to her

Opinion of a New York Woman. Further commendation for M. Groult's

plan comes from a New York woman, an authority on household arts, who is also a pretty young wife, Mrs. Christine W. Nelson, instructor of the department of household arts at Teacher's college, Columbia university.

"I don't wish to speak officially now, but from a personal standpoint," says Mrs. Nelson. "I have always had very decided views about home furnishings. Furniture is the background of the home life and should not be ornamental alone. It should meet the needs of the family, be useful and simple.
"Furniture should be chosen so as to

minimize labor in caring for it.

"Simple lines, less stuffing of satins and tapestries, would relieve many a housewife from a burden and transform her home into a place of pleasure.

"Consider the tired husband who comes home at night to the 'parlor.' Oh, yes," smiles Mrs. Nelson, "there are really a few parlors left in the world, hard as it may seem to believe. A man wants one good comfortable chair. He can't find it. He wants to lean back and relax, to read

in a good light.

Easy Chair, Good Light.

"The husband should have a restful chair, not far from a lamp which sends its rays, not only down, but out far enough to be useful. Nothing is more irritating or makes a man crosser than a lamp that lights a spot on the table or floor and refuses to cast a gleam on the book or newspaper.

> "The matured plant bears a number of seeds, each in a pod which is curled tightly around the tiny seed. The end of the pod is sharply pointed and the edges are slightly feathered and barbed which gives the winds an opportunly to blow it long the surface of the ground till it finds lodgement or until it is overtaken by rain. In the latter case the curled pod begins to straighten out as soon as the moisture strikes it and in the uncurling process it is drawn by the barbs into the rain softened earth where it germinates. If the germination is followed by reasonably moist weather the plant sends down a tap root, something akin to the tap root of its counsil, the well known root of its cousin, the well known alfalfa plant, which is now almost universally cultivated as a forage plant. It is said above that the movement of the 'filaree' growth in this section of the state is toward the east. That probably is because the prevailing winds at the time the plant goes to seed are from the


