Men Misunderstood Instructions, He Says, and Were Over Zealous in Ordering Cigar Stands and Soda Foun-

"No drinks sold here today by order of the police department," was the wording of a sign printed across the fountain of one drug store yesterday morning. Many other places where soft drinks and cigars were sold had the same instructions. Police Commissioner A. Davenport made an effort to buy a cigar and failed. The Sunday "blue laws" were in effect for about two hours. Then the ban was lifted.

The boat has a bole in the bottom through which the water is drawn by an intake pipe which leads to a powerful centrifugal pump operated by a 140-horse power steam engine. The water is then forced backward into the sea through two outlet pipes opening at the bottom of the craft.
