Under the offer to pay half the installation this price was placed at \$54. For a 400-candlepower lamp to burn the same number of hours the price for current has been placed at \$42 a year. For the lights to burn all night the rate for the smaller would be \$42, and for the larger \$56 a year.

If all the lights burn until midnight and half the number are maintained until dawn the price of \$32.50 will be made for the \$250-power light and \$36 for the larger size.
