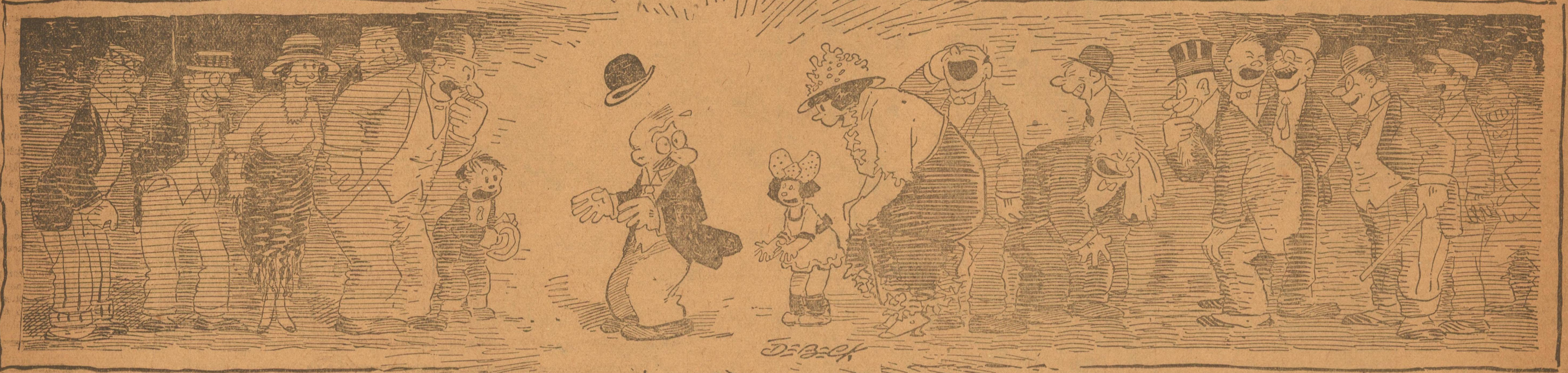

LACK OF WORKERS CAUSE OF SMALLNESS OF RED CROSS FUND

A total of \$2,100 was secured by the Red Cross in its membership drive just closed. This amount did not reach the goal workers set for themselves, yet it is a good showing based on the results obtained by other chapters over the country, leaders say.

While the exact figures are not available it is thought that \$1,000 will cover the amounts secured in Eastland and Cisco.

SUGAR IMPORTS HEAVY

GALVESTON, Nov. 27.—Imports through ports of the Galveston district in September were valued at \$2,909,137, according to customs house figures, just made public.

Cuban sugar headed the list of dutiable articles, imports being worth \$1,592,401. There were more than 7,000,000 pounds brought through this port in September. A total of 61,070,219 gallons of crude oil from Mexico, worth \$808,217, was received during the month.

Army Teaches Citizenship to Alien Recruits

CAMP DIX, N. J., Nov. 27.—Thirty officers are in charge of the Camp Dix school where the illiterate and aliens are given the fundamentals of citizenship as soldiers.

Tall, short. See this man is tall; this man is short. I write the words on the blackboard. Tall—that is for this man. Short—that is for this one.

Shuffling the action to the word, the teacher points first to a six-footer standing beside him, then writes the word "tall"; then points to a chunky youth, measuring four feet, six, and writes the word "short."

Class shuffles its feet, squirms in its chairs and laboriously pencils the queer looking words in note books. And when this class shuffles its feet it means more than the shuffling in the ordinary school room, for this is one of the rooms of the Recruit Educational Center, and the students range from the fairly lads of Europe to the raw-boned muskies of the western part of the United States.

In age they run from 18 to 45 years, and in education from zero to the heights. But those with good education acquired that education in another language and have no English at their command, and those who know English have no education.

Uncle Sam, in the person of the war department, has undertaken to equalize their education, as it were. The draft disclosed that 24.9 per cent of the men called to the colors could not read a newspaper or write a letter. Most of them were well equipped with natural intelligence, but lacking in an education.

This feature applied to both native and foreign born. Efforts were made then, in a rather groping way, to rectify this. That modest start has developed into the school now at Camp Dix, which was recently moved from Camp Upton, New York, and five others at Camp Lewis, Washington; Camp Travis, Texas; Camp Pike, Arkansas; Camp Jackson, South Carolina, and Camp Grant, Illinois, all modeled on the one at Camp Dix, which was the original.

The Camp Dix school is under the di-

rection of Prescott Lackey, of Richmond. Major F. M. Burr is military commandant of the school, which occupies eighteen buildings and houses 1,000 students. Captain Louis T. Byrne is the executive officer. The students are all regularly enlisted in the army, but during their stay in the school are known as "recruits," not privates. They have military drill three hours a day for five days a week. Reading, writing and public speaking are taught daily. Twice a week there is group singing in the Liberty Theater. The words of the song are thrown upon a screen and read aloud by an instructor, who points to each word as he pronounces it, after which the recruits sing the song.

"KROOL" IS THE TOREADOR AS THE BLADE SINKS HOME AND THE BULL FIGHTING SEASON IS ON

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 27.—American fans never welcomed the opening of the baseball season with more enthusiasm than did "corrida" lovers in the Mexican capital greet the return of bullfights, after four years of prohibition. Flaming placards on every billboard announced that "El Toreo," the huge bull ring here, would again be the scene of battle to death and the newspapers in news stories and editorials heralded the opening of the season, which was auspiciously inaugurated the latter part of October and will run until the latter part of January.

During this period some of the world's best matadors, most of whom have been fighting in Spain, will appear. Among those who have been engaged at fancy prices are Adolfo Ganoa, Ernesto Pastor, Luis Freg, Fernandez Manalete and Juan Silveti.

The opening of the season with Silveti, a Mexican favorite, and "Angelete," a Spanish youngster, appearing jointly, was a festive occasion. At the last moment there had been a disagreement with the government both as to the amount of taxes to be paid by the promoters, and as to the safety of immense amphitheater which for almost four years has been in practical disuse.

All difficulties were finally removed and Sunday afternoon found 25,000 cheering spectators awaiting the entrance of the first bull. Diplomats, high social and civic officials, the city's social aristocracy paid their six pesos each to sit in the shade and watch the spectacle while several thousand pelados (peons) were glad to sit in the sun and pay two pesos each for the privilege. It was a gala day and six bulls were dispatched in record time.

Bullfights are held on Sunday afternoons and on the days of fiesta and Mexico City's glorious winter season which admits of no rain assures perfect weather. Six bulls are generally killed and clever matadors will complete the bill in an hour and a half. Ganoa, Pastor, Freg and Belmonte are said to receive from 3,000 to 12,000 pesos each for an afternoon's work. (Normally a Mexican peso is worth 50 cents.)

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Hay and Grain Show Opens With Largest Exhibit

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—The International Hay and Grain show will open here today with hundreds of farmers in the United States and Canada measuring skill for premier honors. The United States department of agriculture, state agricultural colleges, state farm bureaus, corn and seed growers' associations and Canadian dominion and provincial organizations have sent big exhibits. As a further incentive to crop improvement, which is the object of the show, the Chicago Board of Trade will give \$10,000 in cash prizes for the best samples of hay and grain.

The show will go far toward encouraging better agricultural and better country life," said Prof. G. I. Christie, Purdue university, who for several months has been directing the preliminary work. "For many years growers have felt the need of an international show where best grains and forage crops might be compared. A thousand ten-car carloads of corn will form a part of the exhibit. Premiums will be offered for single and ten-car samples each of white and yellow corn; for exhibits of wheat, oats, barley, rye, soy beans, cowpeas and field peas and for samples of seed and hay, including red alsike and clover, alfalfa and timothy."

The number of exhibits is expected to exceed 3,000. The exhibit of the United States department of agriculture occupies 3,000 square feet of floor space. The show, which is in conjunction with the International

Livestock Exposition, will continue a week. States sending especially large exhibits include Michigan, Missouri, Kentucky, Wisconsin, Iowa, the Dakotas, Nebraska, Kansas, Minnesota, Montana and Ohio. Louisiana is sending the chief exhibits of her state fair for the purpose of showing progress being made in the growing of rice, sugar cane and cotton.
