The Frogs displayed a superior brand of football to anything they have flashed this year to down the strong conference bidder from Ability Abilene.

Especially were the Purple mentors pleased by the showing of some of their sophomore backs. Virgil Roberts, who started at full, was one of the outstanding performers of the afternoon, slashing to the advection, such that the cowboy line and playing a bang-up defensive game. Austin Grif-fith, who took over the line-backhis usual fine form, showed through the opposing line almost at will and taking such ball carriers that trickled through the forward wall

That the Frog first line was airtight is indicated by the first-down tabulation which gave the Abilene crew only two successful attempts at ten-yard gains.
