# STIMSON'S ACTS ATTRACT FAVOR **IN PHILIPPINES**

Governor-General's Program of Filipino Cooperation Approved.

By RANDALL GOULD United Press Staff Correspondent HANILA, Oct. 1°.—Governor-General Henry L. Stimson's pro-said gram of governmental organiza-tion now completed, appears to have met the favor of Filipino leaders.

At the base of this program lies, coupled with Stimson's ad-herence to the principle of retaining full executive powers in the hands of the Governor-General, the parallel principle of securing regularly service and cooperation from Filipino party chiefs.

This might be said to aim at the L. seeingly impossible ideal of com-bining the best features of the Harrison and the Wood admin-istrations. Under present condi-Instrations. Under present condi-tions, however, this ideal is con-siderably less impossible of achievement than seemed the case to most experienced observers herea.
 Governor-General Harrison came to Manile during an American etal

to Manila during an American era of idealism and benevolence. Per-haps, as his critics charge, he went too far in giving actual executive power into the hands of the Fili-power into the hands of the Fili-issued out of the Honorable SSU pinos; but at any rate there appears to have been positive merit in the basis of friendship established between the Governor-General as representative of foreign sovereignty and Filipino political leaders as representatives of their own people.

Governor- General Wood came on the heels of the Wood-Forbes report and the Filipinos anticipat-ed severe actions on his part. As amatter of fact there was little or no severity, but instead a considerable amount of leniency wherever decisions had to be made. Yet a variety of factors combined to make friction between General Wood and the Filipino leaders and the general public both are here and in the United States undoubt-

eral Wood was acting with se-verity. That has been the outstanding feature of the Stimson program. Wherever it was possible to do so, the new Governor-General has giv-en the Filipino leaders a chance to "make face," and the latest and greatest of these moves was the revival of the name of Harrison's Council of State. Governor-General Stimson seems pleased, and thus far at least the mey hook-un-
