Prospective jurors had so thoroughly discussed the case among them-selves and with their neighbors, or were so well acquainted with Mrs. Southard and her father, "Billy" Trueblood, prominent rancher, that they were automatically barred from

When the second day of the trial opened, only one juror had been passed for cause, and eleven others were holding their seats in the jury box tentatively. There had been no peremptory challenges, and each side still had to.

Witnesses From Missouri. Witnesses began to arrive from various parts of the country, includ-ing several from Missouri. The latter will testify regarding the death of Mrs. Southard's first husband, Robert Dooley, and his brother, Edward Dooley, who had been her childhood chums in Missouri. She is specifically charged with the death of her third husband, Edward Meyer, al-though it is alleged that she poisoned her other two husbands, as well as

No Death Penalty.

The state apparently will not demand the death penalty for Mrs. Southard, believing it is practically impossible to hang a woman on circumstantial evidence.

settled by medical testimony. The defense plans to challenge the state's contention that Meyer died from arsenic poisoning, believing the charge cannot be proved beyond a reasonable doubt, and will ask acquittal on that ground.




