Forty-two bodies recovered out of an estimated death list placed by some as high

as 500. Property loss is variously estimated from \$1,000,000 to \$5,000,000.

The residence sections, where the greatest loss of life occurred, is occupied mostly by Mex-

Before the waters began to recede, Saturday morning at 8 o'clock, an area estimated six miles wide and six miles long, including a larger part of the business district, had been swept by the flood. Among the buildings damaged are some of the finest in the city.

At one time the water was standing almost to the mezzanine floor of the Gunter hotel. The St. Anthony hotel, and several smaller hostelries were damaged. The Alamo escaped,

due to its elevation. Troops under Colonel Porter opened headquarters in the federal building shortly after midnight, and are patrolling the

As the waters receded organized bands of workers were searching ruined homes. Temporary morgues have been established.

Unprecedented rainfall beginning at midnight Thursday and continuing until Friday night caused the flood. At least eight inches of rain fell. last night a heavy rain fell in the valley of the Olmos creek. The river went out of its banks within a few hours. By warning residents of the Mexican section hundreds obtained safety before San Pedro overflowed.

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 10.—Forty-two known dead by police, one hundred or more estimated dead, thousands homeless and millions of dollars property damage stood at noon today as the toll in San Antonio of South Central Texas' night of horror and of the flood which last night swept the entire business section of this city and several outlying residential sections, leav-

ing in its path wreck re and ruin. Rising to a height five feet from a cloudburst, water from the San Antonio rives wept through the business district of this city, into storeroo and into the residence part, driving hundreds from their holds, as a deluge of rain, totaling more than ten inches, was falling. Telephone service within the city was badly demoralized, and communication with different parts of town, to check the restors of casualties was impossible.


