### TRANSPORTATION TAX LASTS ANOTHER YEAR

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—The senate finance committee today re-stored to the tax bill the transportation tax taken out by the house, but reduced it 50 per cent. The new rate will apply to 1922, after which the transportation taxes are to be abolished. This involves additional revenue of \$131,000,000 in 1922.






