CHICAGO LEGIONNAIRES TO OPEN FREE HOTEL FOR STRANDED EX-FIGHTERS

By International News Service CHICAGO, Sept. 24.—The Vets' hotel, to be used exclusively by homeless and penniless veterans of the world war, will be opened here this fall. The hostelry, the first of its kind in America, will be conducted under the auspices of the American Legion. It will be run on the "honor

Men who fought overseas and are hungry, bedless and out of work can obtain food and lodging free. If the man is able to pay he can pay whatever he desires. If penniless, he can live there without charge until he ob-

The hotel, located in the building housing the old Grand Pacific hotel, will house 1,000 men, with a bathroom for every five men. Meals will be served twice a day and an employment bureau, free of charge, will be conducted as an adjunct.

"We want to emphasize the fact that this is not a charity," explained Captain Myron E. Adams, legion commander. "The men can come, be fed and housed, and still maintain their self respect. It is presumed that each one will pay back the costs to the hotel once they get on their

He declared, however, there would be "no dunning" for the money owed

the hotel. "We expect to get enough funds from three sources to underwrite the entire venture. These are, first, from the left-over funds of war relief organizations; second, from private individuals interested in the welfare of former soldiers, and third, from the men themselves."
