SALEM, Mass., Sept. 19.—Suit for \$20,000 for an alleged breach of promise to marry was filed against the estate of Augustus F. Mead, of Danvers, by Miss Mary F. Gallivan, of that town, today.

A marriage license, taken out by the couple in 1886, but never used, will be submitted in support of the suit according to counsel.

The declaration sets forth that Mead and Miss Gallivan kept company from the early eighties until Mead's death last November. He died without a will, leaving an estate estimated at \$50,000. Miss Gallivan is 60 years of age.

FRISCO TAKES LOOK AT 'BUSTED' RAILROAD

HARRISON, Ark., Sept. 19.—A party of officials of the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad, which crosses the line of the defunct Missouri & North Arkansas railroad at Seligman, Mo., is in Harrison today inspecting property of the suspended road.

Members of the party, which consists of Vice President A. T. Hamilton, Chief Engineer F. J. Jonah, P. O. Wood, assistant superintendent of motive power, and C. H. Baltzell, superintendent of the central division of the St. Louis & San Francisco, said they were making the survey for Eaststarr interests. They will go from Harrison to points on the road to the south, they said.

At least three roads are said to have made inquiry of corporate officials of the Missouri & Arkansas railroad in connection with its proposed sale at auction next month. A delegation from towns along the line also has conferred with a representative of Henry Ford in an effort to interest him in the purchase and operation of the road which suspended July 1.

NOVELIST MAY SEEK TREASURE LOST 140 YEARS

LONDON, Sept. 19.—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, novelist, has interested himself in a scheme to recover treasure from a ship sunk in 1782 off the Kaffir coast, South Africa.

Doubletons, pieces of eight, rubies, diamonds and pearls worth \$5,000,000 are reported to lie in the cabins and hold of this ship, the Grosvenor, which was lost off Port St. John, A. Johannesburg (South Africa) syndicate has undertaken to salvage the treasure.

"I have written to the syndicate asking questions with regard to the method by which it hopes to salvage the treasure," Sir Arthur said today. "If the answers are satisfactory—and I am an old sea-going man myself, having been a ship surgeon, with knowledge of such matters—I may take 1,000 shares. I certainly believe the treasure is worth £1,000,000."

Salvage experts doubt whether treasure so long lost is recoverable.

"All search for sunken cargo is speculative, and all questing for sunken treasure a dream," said an authority.

"Several salvage companies have attempted in recent years to recover treasure from wrecks. They have picked up a few coins and jewelry and have spent a king's ransom in raising scrap iron."

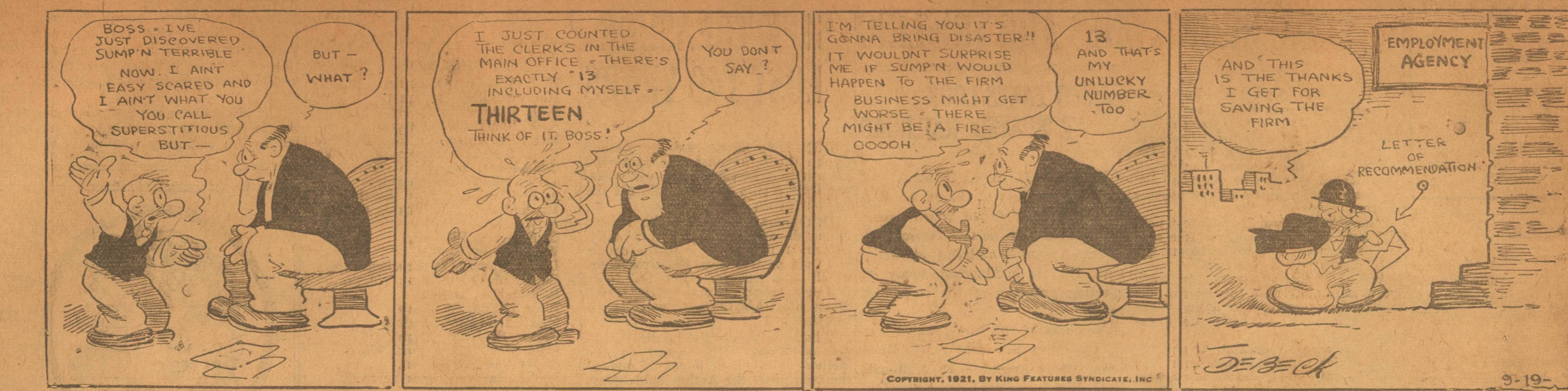

SWAP RATIONS FOR GOOD HOCH PRUNES; INDIANS STARVING

EDMONTON, Alberta, Sept. 19.—Indians in the near north are in danger of becoming an extinct species unless measures are taken by the province to safeguard them against contagious diseases, Dr. W. W. Bell, health inspector declared in a report made public Friday after a trip through the Wabaskawa district.

Dr. Bell urged regulations prohibiting overcrowding in one-room tepees, in which two or more families frequently are found.

He also attacked the government ration issue, declaring it had done much to degrade the Indians. Many of them, he asserted, use the rations only as stakes in gambling for prunes and raisins, which they use to brew "hooch."
