Bomb Sent Herrick Is Part of Plot; Desperate Deeds Guarded Against in Other Places; U. S. Consulate Attacked.

#### By United Press.

BREST, France, Oct. 20.-A mob of 1,000 syndicalists marched upon the American consulate here today and smashed windows, singing the "Internationale" and the "Red Flag." The police finally dispersed the crowd.

Reports from European capitals and from South America today indicate the existence of an international communist plot to secure by intimidation the freedom of Niccolo Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzettli, Italian communists, convicted of the brutal murder of a paymaster and a guard at South Braintree, Mass., July 14.

American ambassadors in Rome, Brussels and London have received threatening letters from communists in this country. Yesterday an attempt was made to assassinate Ambassador Herrick at Paris by means of a bomb sent through the mail, after he had ignored threats from communists in France.







## **TOO MUCH SUPERVISION CAUSE OF R. R. TROUBLES**

CHICAGO, Oct. 20 .- In the event the threatened railroad strike materializes, the roads are prepared to do our utmost to move necessities, utilizing to the fullest possible extent all the manpower available, Charles H. Markham, president of the Illinois Central declared Wednesday in an address before the Ameri-

can Mining congress. Mr. Markham said the present transportation tangle was due to the fact that ninety-nine public bodies have a hand in fixing the rules, income and expense of the roads and that the roads have no voice in the expenditure of more than 97 per cent of their money.

"The remedy is to place once more into the hands of railroad manage-ments, under competent and broad-minded supervision, the control of operating costs, in such a way that responsibility may be properly fixed upon the managements for the operation of their properties," Mark-ham asserted. The railroads, he said, have taken their share of losses in the present period of depression, de-spite the fact that they were not per-mitted to profit as other induction mitted to profit as other industries were during the period of high prices because their earnings were fixed by the government.
