## Latest Labor-Saving Device



The latest invention in the way of labor-saving devices is the apparatus pictured here, which takes the place of twenty men, according to the inventor. It is an auto-truck attachment which automatically bores postholes. It consists of a huge earth-boring auger on the end of a twelve-foot, geared shaft, mounted on the front of the chassis of an ordinary automobile truck. The power plant of the truck furnished the power for the boring machinery—the simple expedient of disengaging the clutch of the truck and throwing in that of the boring apparatus being the only operation necessary in digging a hole of any depth down to ten feet. The driver operates the entire mechanism from his seat on the truck.
