It is pointed out that of the outstanding school bonds on which interest is being paid, \$10,000 was carried over from prior to 1919, and \$200,000 were voted on March 1, 1920. The bond issue and the \$22,000 secured from the banks was used in constructing the Tiffin, Young and Cooper schools at a total cost of \$172,000, in the erection of temporary buildings at a cost of \$16,000; an expenditure of \$17,400 for equipment and sidewalks, \$7,500 for the teacherage and furniture and in the payment of \$9,000 toward meeting deficiencies in the payroll. The high school bonds, voted by the district, have not yet been sold.
