Three Killed and Twenty-Six Wounded in Mad Rush for Exits.

By United Press. NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 28. Three dead and twenty-six seriously injured was the toll of the fire, which destroyed the Rialto theatre here last night, Police Chief Smith announced today.

Twelve of the twenty-six injured, now in hospitals, are in a critical condition.

Search of the smoking ruins of the theatre today failed to disclose bodies of victims, who it was feared had been caught under the falling roof of the theatre.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 28.-The smoldering ruins of the Rialto theatre were being dug up by parties of searchers today in the hunt for more victims of the fire which caused three known deaths last night. Others are believed to have perished in the blaze, and their bodies buried in the burning debris.

More than sixty persons were injured in the fight to reach the exits or seriously burned by the flames which leaped through the theatre, while 600 persons were watching the picture. 
