CHICAGO, Dec. 14. --- Drastic changes in the overtime pay of half a million railroad workers were made public by the United States railroad labor board today.

The board in announcing new working rules, stated that starting Friday, maintenance of way employes would not be paid time and a half for overtime until a day of ten hours had been completed. the old rule, time and a half was paid after eight hours work.

GULF EMPLOYE IS DEAD AFTER LONG ILLNESS USE OF COTTON


