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Take Up

Ben W. Hooper, vice chairman of the board, announced that he is now in a position to take up the matters, and the controversy between the transportation heads and five brotherhoods, which nearly resulted in a widespread strike, is expected to be resumed immediately.

Railroads hurried to notify employees Wednesday that a 10 per cent wage cut is contemplated. This question will be before the board formally within six weeks.

The bulk of the modifications in shop craft working rules were made on privileges granted by the government during the war. These rules have been bitterly assailed by the carriers as the cause of inefficient management. Machinists were forbidden to touch anything but repairs. They could not disconnect wiring. This had to be done by electricians. They could not touch pipe connections because this was the work of sheet metal workers only.

Unskilled laborers could not dismantle wooden freight cars. This was the work of carmen. No employe could touch an engine grate except a boilermaker. It was this condition that caused the protests of the railroads.

Under the new rules much of this condition is done away with. The classification of the work of electricians, carmen, sheet metal workers, boilermakers, blacksmiths, machinists and iron ship builders is so broadened that any employe can step in and do most any job that requires attention.

Complaint Is Removed.

Some of the rules are discontinued altogether and the complaint of the railroads that "it takes ten men to do four men's work" is removed.

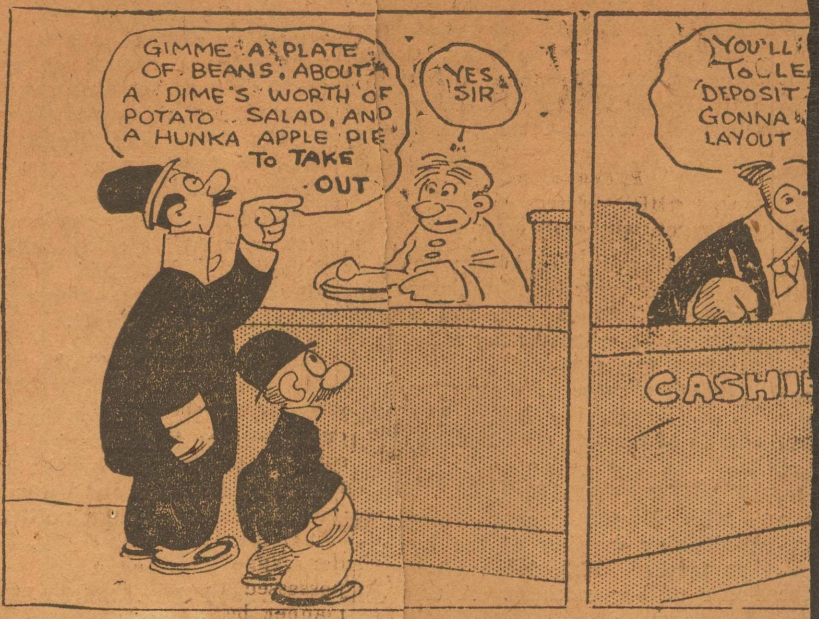

DALLAS, Dec. 1.—Chief interest in the seventy-third annual session of the Baptist general convention of Texas, which opened in Dallas today, will center in the report of the convention's executive board on the results of the campaign waged during October and November for the collection of \$2,100,000 cash on pledges made in the Baptist seventy-five million campaign, according to R. E. Burt of Dallas, president of the executive board. This report is to be made next Saturday. Sessions of the convention are being held in the First Baptist church, of which Dr. George W. Truett is pastor, and will continue through next Monday. The convention was called to order by Dr. J. D. Sandefer of Simmons college, Abilene, who is president of the body. The annual convention sermon is to be delivered tonight by the Rev. M. M. Wolf, pastor of South Main Baptist church of Houston.

465 Missionaries.
The report on the finance campaign Saturday will include a resume of results from the work done by 465 missionaries and missionary pastors, the work among the foreign born, the soldiers of Texas camps and the educational work fostered by Sunday schools, Baptists Young People's union and Baptist Student union departments. Another report which is expected to be of unusual interest is the report on sanitariums, located at Dallas, Houston and Waco. Definite steps probably will be taken, according to Dr. F. S. Groner, general secretary of the board, to proceed at once with the establishing of new sanitariums at Abilene, San Antonio and some point in the lower Rio Grande valley. At San Antonio definite plans already are in progress, Dr. Groner said, for beginning these enterprises.
