Ratification Certain. Ratification is regarded as certain, but that will not terminate the controversy. Technically, no official step for ratification has yet been taken. It would be the duty of the British government, acting in Ireland through the clerk of the crown, to summon the ratifying body, which will consist of all the members elected to the house of commons for southern Ireland. The house of commons itself as such does not exist and could not come into being unless the members took the ordinary oath of allegiance to the king; hence the phrase in the treaty defining the ratifying body merely as members elected to serve in it, whether they have like the Trinity college member agreed and sworn to do so, or like the Sin Fein members, have refused.

PROSPEROUS NEW YEAR.

New Years has from time immemorial been a time for making a new start, for viewing the past with a more or less keen eye for flaws in conduct and performances, and for making high resolve to do better next time.

The first are easy to find; the latter hard to keep. Happily, also, it means best wishes

for friends and the community and nation in which one lives.

On the occasion of the birth of 1922, it is probable that the old-time salutation of "Happy New Year" will be changed by most of us to "Prosperous New Year." The world has learned during the parlous times of the last twelve months that Happiness is in many cases a weak and faltering sister unless encircled by the strong arm of prosperity. Therefore, in wishing prosperity, one generally wishes happiness. Though to be sure, as the divorce courts often point out, a too-strong Prosperity is liable to squeeze poor Happiness until she passes away. However, that is not the general rule. More often poor Happiness flees because Prosperity is not around to protect her from the brutal hand of Poverty.

THE FIRE BILL.

In the annual casting of accounts that comes with the close of the year, Ranger's fire bill looms large. Admitting that a quarter of a million is perhaps an overestimate, it is yet much too high. As to the number, eighty-four-there can be no exaggeration, as that is a matter of rec-

That is too great a number and too great a loss. It is an average of more than \$2,000 for each blazenearly \$3,000 if the estimates are

That is too much. Whatever the contributing causes, it is a loss that no city the size of Ranger should be called on to sustain. With the opening of the new year, prompt efforts should be made to see that there is no recurrence of this figure in 1922. Fire hazards should be eliminated, so far as possible, in order that there will be fewer fires. All elements that increase the difficulties of the firemen should be reduced to a minimum. Co-ordination must be established between the agencies which assist in fighting fire. If necessary to secure efficiency, the fire force must be increased.

This is one matter that Ranger should ponder well before rejecting as a New Year resolution.






