SAYS TIGERS DON'T FIGURE IN FLAG RACE

AUGUSTA, Ga., March 28.—It is fairly safe to predict that Ty Cobb and his Tigers will not cause any sleepless nights for the flag aspirants in the coming American league race. The famous Georgian is going to pilot a team that will be considerable improvement over last season's but it will not have the balance a good team should have. When next October rolls around, Cobb will find himself in the second division with the Red Sox, White Sox, and Athletics keeping him company.

The one thing Cobb is sure to have and Tiger teams have had it since time immemorial—is hitting. Most of this strength will be in the outfield, where the famous Georgian will be surrounded by Harry Heilmann and Bob Veach. Beyond this known batting power, the team is problematical, but even when looking at the layout through rose-colored glasses one can foresee nothing sensational.

Second Sack Weakness. Last season Cobb attributed his misfortunes to weakness around the second sack. Of course, poor pitching also had a lot to do with the stringency in the win column, but the glaring defect in the infield is evidenced by figures which show the team made over 100 errors around the second bag alone in 1921. Also the Tigers finished the season with twenty less double plays than any other team in the league.

In his two weeks down here Cobb has been paying particular attention to his infield rookies. He has discovered four lads of exceptional worth, but indications already are that the short job will go to Emory Rigney, while second will be occupied either by the veteran Pep Young or George Cutsaw, who was obtained from the Pittsburgh club via the waiver route.

The Tigers have had a string on Rigney for several seasons. In fact, they held him so long that Commissioner Landis smelled a rat and declared the kid a free agent. Then the Detroit club had to pay the young athlete \$7,500 to retain him. Apparently he is a dandy fielder. He works fast on a double play and makes his throws accurately. Last season at Fort Worth, Texas, he hit around .270.

The other new infielders are Fred Haney, Danny Clark and Johnny Mann. Haney was at Omaha last year and prior to that was a star grid and diamond man at Poly high, Los Angeles. Mann needs more experience in the minors and will get it. Whether Young plays in his second base position depends entirely on his physical condition. Last year he

NEW YORK, March 28.—Gordon Duffield, 17-year-old heir to a million, who ran away from a Plainfield, N. J., private school last October to make his way in New York, is back in the arms of his mother, Mrs. Graham Duffield, who came from Chicago to find him. Fresh from a job as waiter in a Bowery restaurant, young Duffield walked into his mother's hotel room and announced he was brimful of sympathy for the unfortunate he had met among the "working people."

"I know what it is now to be hungry, broke, down and out," he said, adjusting his 15-cent tie and giving another brush to the cheap blue jeans that contrasted with his salt and pepper coat and vest.

"When I ran away from school I had no idea I would be so enriched by a study of social conditions." During his five months of hand-to-mouth existence in the city's slums, the youthful millionaire hobo averaged \$1 or \$2 a day doing odd work, washing dishes, "slinging hash," hawking vegetables and smashing baggage. Several nights he passed at the Municipal lodging house, where he scrubbed the floor to earn his meals.

Duffield spent Sunday with Headmaster Burke of the Plainfield school. Since it was the sixth time he had run away from schools, it was decided he should remain East and begin a business career.

## RED CROSS WORKER HERE; GIVES PROGRAM FOR CHILD WELFARE

One out of every four children in Eastland county is underweight, according to Mrs. Grace Ashbaugh, division representative of the American Red Cross, who is spending the day in Ranger. Mrs. Ashbaugh explained that careful health surveys by organizations have shown that the same percentage of underweight children exists in the majority of other sections over the country. She complimented the local Red Cross chapter, the Child Welfare club and the Parent-Teachers' association for their work in combating malnutrition, which she said she classed as one of the greatest health evils.

The danger of underweight, particularly among children, she said was chiefly the derangement of the nervous system, the lack of resistance to disease and the retarding of mental development. It has been established, she said, that children even 7 per cent underweight are retarded one year in their school work. Repeaters in schools are an expensive liability

to a community and correction is a money as well as a soul saving investment.

### Health Program.

Malnutrition among children is being combatted over the country by the organization of health clubs in the schools. The club program, she said, would include the following:

"1. Rise early, take some setting up or other exercises and drink at least one glass of water before breakfast. Take a bath with a shower afterwards, if possible.

"2. Eat a health breakfast of fresh fruit in season, cereal, milk and perhaps an egg. The other meals of the day will be preceded by a glass of water and will include leafy vege-

table. Sweets will have a place on the menu only at the conclusion of the meal.

### Take It Easy.

"3. Fill your day with tranquility—mothers will send the kiddies off to school in plenty of time to avoid running and hurry and if you are an adult and on your way to an office, the same rule will apply to you.

"4. The old rule of work while you work and play while you play is as good today as it was when formulated. Children as well as adults should learn to finish with work and when it is through children should play out of doors at least a half hour every day. This is a good rule for grown-ups to follow, instead of taking all of their outdoors at a gulp at golf on Saturday.

"5. Go to bed early enough to insure at least eight hours of sleep and have the windows wide open all that time. Multiply this perfect health day by 365," concluded Mrs. Ash-
