WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.-All general appropriations for 1921 will be pared down "in accordance with the strictest economy," except the postoffice and naval departments, estimates of which are less than for the present year, Majority Leader Mondell told the house when the first urgent deficiency bill at this session was brought up.

The greatest reductions would be made in the army and fortification estimates, he said, the former requested totaling \$982,800,020 and the latter \$117,793,330, an increase of more than \$106,000,000 over the present appropriation.

The balance of estimated liabilities over the receipts, Mondell said, is \$3,050,608,574. The total estimated receipts for the year, he said, are \$6,035,850,000.

AMERICAN FLAG **RESTORED TO 41 OCEAN ROUTES**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18. - The American flag has been restored to forty-one of the world's greatest ocean trade routes, the shipping board records in its annual report to con-gress. Most of the ships are plying trans-Atlantic and South American lanes, the report said, but some of them are in waters where the Stars and Stripes have not been seen on commercial vessels for more than a generation

fleet of 1,230 vessels, aggregating 6,-791,080 tons, shows 236 vessels in northern Europe trade. Th trans-Atlantic trade is next with 197 ships of 1,204,953 tons, engaged in the food relief service and 176 ships a tonnage of 1,175,614 were still in use by the army on June 30

Another 188 vessels were engaged in the South American trade; 73 plying to Brazil, 92 to La Plata and 2 to the west coast of South America Sixty vessels were making regular sailings to southern through an or 14 to Africa, 6 to India, 77 in the trans-Pacific, 143 to the West indies and 44 in the coastwise and New England coal trade.

The total gross revenues for the year were approxinately \$500,000,-000 as compared with \$80,000,000 for 1918, but no comprehensive state-ment showing the profit or loss was available.

Expenditures totaled \$2,515,692,-002. compared with \$770,694,057 for 1918, \$1,971,367,078 being for ship construction. Next heaviest was for nventory of materials, amounting to \$177,734,648, and plant and property expenses were placed at \$167,786,-
