LONDON, Dec. 5.-There was a persistent rumor on the stock ex-change this morning that the su-preme council of the peace con-ference had threatened Germany unless the final peace terms were agreed to.

It is said that the allies plan to occupy Essen and Frankfort with troops should Germany fail to comply with the treaty. Yesterday Germany through the head of the German peace delegation at Paris demanded that the protocol of the peace treaty be revised, and declared that the treaty would not be signed until this was done.

Rumors here are that Germany's action in refusing to sign the protocol is a direct result of the failure of the United States to ratify the treaty.

## ROADS READY TO TURN BACK TO OLD OWNERS

"Only an urgent emergency would cause the United States railway administration to decimate the oil-burning motive power of the Texas & Pacific in order to maintain equable passenger and freight service on some other roads," declared Passenger and Freight Agent C. B. Jonz of the Texas & Pacific, in discussing the possibility of reducing the train service on the line as a result of the rapid awindling of the coal reserves. "In order that Texas & Pacific oil-

"In order that Texas & Pacific oilburning engines might be used on far northern roads, it would be necessary to equip them with steaming apparatus to keep the oil in the tender sufficiently warm so that an equal flow might be made to the firebox. The engines we now have are adapted only to moderate weather such as obtains on southern lines. Even during the very coldest weather oil-burning regines occasionally fail to respond. This is particularly noticeable on rome Texas railroads burning oil in the Panhandle. Engine failures are numerous.

"The oil field traffic cannot be decimated without the maximum disruption of business," said Mr. Jonz. "Even now the Texas & Pacific has not a sufficient amount of motive power to handle its constantly increasing business, though an immense number of new engines have recently been added and more are coming as fast as the shops in the north can turn them out." At present five passenger trains pre operated in each direction from

At present five passenger trains pre operated in each direction from Ranger. One of these which turns at Eastland requires only one locomotive. A very large number of freight trains handled by the larger type of locomotives are also handled through Ranger.

through Ranger. "To pull oil burning locomotives on northern roads remote from the oil wells would be rash. For instance, they could burn only oil. This could be secured only from a distance. It would mean that a large number of additional cars would be impressed into the service to clutter the lines and demand motive power to haul in order to provide the fuel for operation of the roads. For this reason I believe it would be impracticable for diverting oil burning locomotives from the Texas & Pacific at this time."
