## MORROW TO BE GIVEN GUARD AT BORDER

### MAN GIVEN DEATH SENTENCE ON CHARGE KILLING MERCHANT

#### VICTIM SHOT DOWN WHEN RESISTS ARREST

#### Interest Runs High at Coleman Where the Killing Occurred

COLEMAN, Texas, Oct. 20.—A district jury today returned a death sentence against O. C. Wells, charged with murdering J. A. Mitchell, during a grocery store hold up here last January 27.

The case aroused intense public feeling here and the court house was crowded when the jury returned its verdict.

Wells was alleged to have walked into the suburban store operated by Mitchell while the latter was sweeping out the store and said "pick 'em up." Mitchell, his wife and nine-year-old daughter thought Wells was joking, Mitchell taking it as a jest made a play with the bandit with a broom. Wells is alleged to have responded with a shot from a pistol. Mitchell died instantly.

#### ENGINEER AND FIREMAN BOTH DEAD IN WRECK

Passenger Engine Turns Complete Somersault Thirty Foot Plunge.

HALLSFEAD, Pa., Oct. 20.—The engineer and fireman were killed and two persons injured last night when Lackawanna passenger train No. 20, was wrecked at a washout three miles east of here.

The engine turned a complete somersault in a 30 foot plunge. Fireman and engineer were killed instantly.

None of the passenger coaches left the track and passengers scarcely were aware of the wreck.

The train was going at slow speed up grade when the accident occurred.

#### Fall Conducted Lease Matters Very Secretly

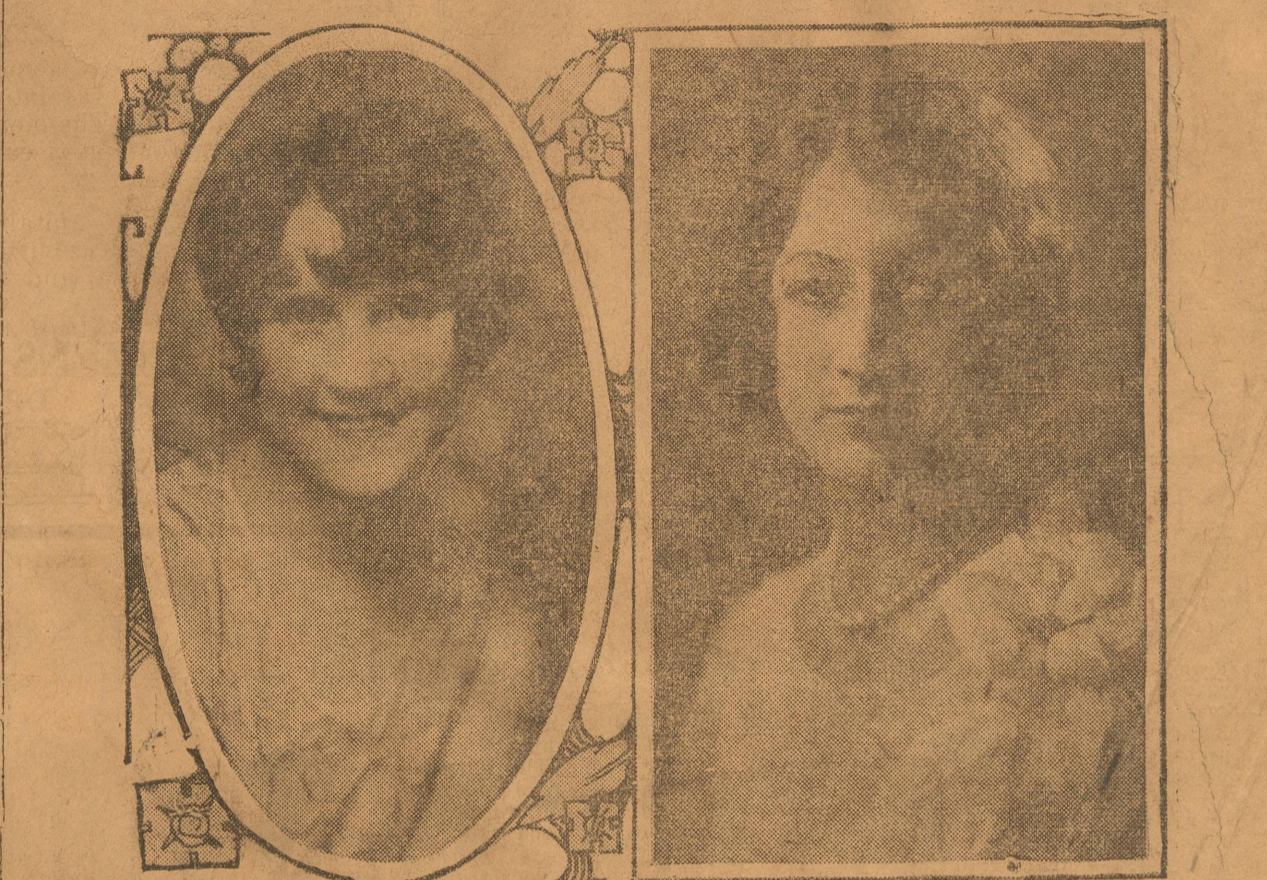

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Secretary of the Interior A. B. Fall early in 1922 told his assistant secretary, E. C. Finney, not to give out information on the prospective lease of Teapot Dome, Finney told the Fall-Sinclair jury today.

The government drew this statement from Finney to support its charges that the Fall-Sinclair negotiations leading up to the Teapot Dome lease, were conducted in secrecy, designed to protect an illegal conspiracy to defraud the government of the naval reserves.

George D. Hoover, Sinclair's lawyer, who irritated Owen Roberts of the prosecution by frequent objections, conducted the Finney cross-examination. His questions dealt mostly with Fall's activities in leasing government land in the Salt Creek fields adjoining the Teapot Dome reserve and with the claims of various persons to parts of Teapot Dome.

The claim to Teapot Dome, for which Sinclair paid about \$1,000,000, were the subject of extensive examination by Hoover.

#### W. K. GORDON FORT WORTH WILL LEAD

Parade Will Form On Caddo Road, Will Traverse Walnut, Main and Pine.

The big parade will begin its formation Friday morning at 9 o'clock on the Caddo road, Ranger. All who are going to participate in the parade will be issued cards assigning them to their places in the parade.

The parade with its many bands, its beautifully decorated floats and cars promises to be one of the most beautiful spectacles ever seen in Ranger.

Bands from many different towns will assure plenty of music and floats not only gaily decorated but bearing attractive human cargo as well, will make the parade as colorful as a Texas sunset.

Abilene will send three bands, among them being the Shrine Drum Corps. Cisco, Eastland, Breckenridge, Mineral Wells, Mings and Thurber, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Ranger are among the towns contributing bands to the parade and band contest.

Cisco's float will carry Miss Elizabeth Glenn and Miss Dorothy Roberts. This part of their float will represent "Better Schools," while the rear part of the float carrying Mrs. Elizabeth Leu Voss, will represent "Better Homes." The float is sponsored by Miss T. R. Warwick, J. M. Wall.

#### EASTLAND CITY ORDINANCE IS BEING FOUGHT

#### Many Residents Object To Ordinance Prohibiting Stock in City Limits.

Court action may result if the city of Eastland insists in enforcing the ordinance recently passed by the city commission governing the keeping of certain livestock within the city limits.

The ordinance, which was passed by the commission on Oct. 11, prohibits the keeping of cattle, horses, mules, jacks, or jennets, in pens, barns, or other places within less than 200 feet of any private residence, hotel, boarding house, business house or office within the city limits.

#### FLOOD CONTROL PLAN MUST BE UNITED EFFORT

Secretary of War Davis Makes Plea for Non-Political Plan.

PINE BLUFF, Ark., Oct. 20.—An appeal for the South to unite on a plan for a flood control and smoother, and disunion, was made to Arkansas business men today by Secretary of War Davis.

"Congress is in a receptive mood now and the project must be put through," he said.

"It will be put through if we all drop minor differences and get behind a definite plan."

He said the plan must be non-political, non-partisan, and non-personal.

FORT WORTH, Oct. 20.—Assistant District Attorney Frank Rawlings is attempting to settle a dispute over "storage charges" on a husband. #### PRECAUTIONS TO BE TAKEN TO ASSURE SAFETY

#### Will Have Military Escort From Laredo to Mexican Capital

LAREDO, Oct. 20.—Unusual military precautions will be taken by Mexican Federal forces Saturday when Dwight Morrow, ambassador from the United States to Mexico, is expected to cross the border at this point.

The military headquarters at Nuevo Laredo across the border, today made plans for a heavy military escort to accompany Morrow's train to Mexico City, as a result of the dynamiting Tuesday of the Mexico City-Laredo train.

Morrow is expected to arrive Saturday morning and leave that afternoon for Mexico City.

Representatives of Calles' administration will come here to meet the train.

In addition troops from the Nuevo Laredo garrison will accompany the train.

Eight passengers, most of them women, were killed when the train was dynamited Tuesday by bandits believed to be sympathizers of Arnulfo Gomez the revolutionary leader.

Passengers quoted the bandits as saying they were disappointed in dynamiting the train because they believed it carried federal troops.

#### Surety Company Stops Insurance And Bank Is Sold

AUSTIN, Oct. 20.—"The surety company cancelled our robbery insurance and the department would not let us operate without it, so we closed the bank," said W. D. Carrington, president of the Farmers National bank of Buda, today, explaining its transfer to the Austin National bank.

"The surety company notified us that after three robberies, they refused to carry insurance longer."

"We were robbed three years ago when someone dug through the walls, again last December and again a few weeks ago," Carrington said.



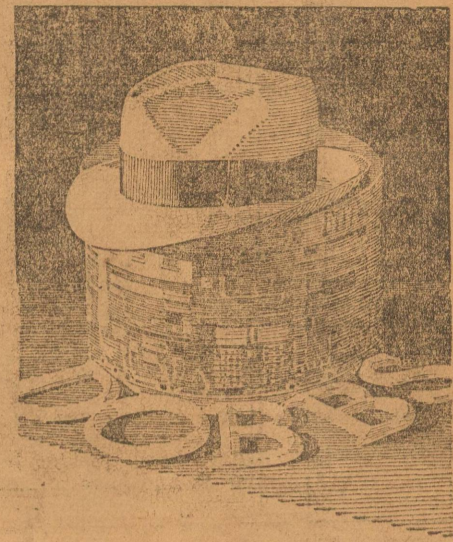

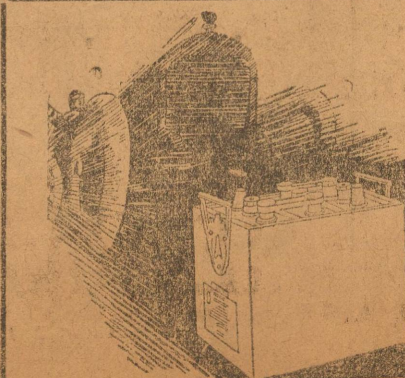

### Jubilee Guests May See Drilling Wells Near Town

Oil men returning to Ranger Friday and Saturday, may without much time or difficulty, visit some drilling wells near Ranger. A well that is being watched with a great deal of interest due to its being purely wildcat is the Powell No. 1 east of Ranger not far from Winsett Springs. This well, which is being drilled by Chestnut & Smith, Gholson et al., is now drilling at 2,500 feet and has already shown two favorable sands. As a wildcat it looks most promising.

Should this test well prove to be a producer it will open up a vast area of land that for some reason was not developed during the boom to any extent whatever.

In the Sibley pool, south east of Ranger, Mook-Texas company is rigging up on an offset to Barkley et al., Duffer, which came in a few weeks ago and is now making 150 barrels of oil and around 31,000,000 cubic feet of gas.

Barkley, et al., are getting ready to start another well on this lease. Schimmel Bros., are starting a well on the J. H. Hamilton, south of Ranger, seven miles.

In the Frankell area, which was one of the first shallow pools opened after the boom, a 2,400 test is being made on the Longford estate, one and one-half miles southwest of Frankell.

dent of the Pennsylvania Railroad, and Walter S. Gifford, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, were among the utility men present at a luncheon given at the Adolphus Hotel on the occasion of the annual meeting of the National Association of Railroad and Utilities Commissioners.

One of the principal speeches at the luncheon was the address of President Gifford of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. His speech, in part, was:

"Broadly considered, you, as Public Utility Commissioners, and we in the telephone business, are engaged in a common enterprise; our success must depend upon mutual confidence and understanding. In the current performance of our daily tasks it is possible to lose sight of the ultimate aim and goal of our endeavors. With the thought in mind that it may prove helpful, I wish to state very briefly the principles that guide the management of the Bell System.

420,000 Stockholders  
"There are today over 420,000 stockholders of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, and no one of them owns as much as one per cent of the capital stock. The business of this Company and its Associated Bell Telephone Companies, whose common stock is largely owned by this Company, is to furnish telephone service to the nation. This business from its very nature is carried on without competition in the usual sense.

"These facts have a most important bearing on the policy that must be followed by the management if it lives up to its responsibilities. The fact that the ownership is so widespread and diffused imposes an unusual obligation on the management to see to it that the savings of these hundreds of thousands of people are secure and remain so. The fact that the responsibility for such a large part of the entire telephone service of the country rests solely upon this Company and its Associated Companies also imposes on the management an unusual obligation to the public to see to it that the service shall at all times be adequate, dependable and satisfactory to the user. Obviously, the only sound policy that will meet these obligations is to continue to furnish the best possible telephone service at the lowest cost consistent with financial safety. This policy is bound to succeed in the long run and there is no justification for acting otherwise than for the long run.

"It follows that there is not only no incentive but it would be contrary to sound policy for the management to earn speculative or large profits for distribution as 'bonuses' or extra dividends. On the other hand, payments to stockholders limited to reasonable regular dividends with their right, as the business requires new money from time to time, to make further investments on favorable terms, are to the interest both of the telephone users and of the stockholders.

Spirit of Service  
"Undoubtedly a very great factor in the continued progress and improvement of telephone service is the intangible but quite real spirit of service that has become a tradition in the telephone business. It is fundamental in our plan of organization to have at headquarters and in our laboratories several thousand people whose sole job it is to work for improvement. They are engaged in studying what is used in the telephone business and how it is used and endeavor to find a better thing or a better way. Of course, the people who are engaged day by day in trying to maintain a high standard of telephone service are doing their part, and a most important part, in increasing the quality and keeping down the cost of service, but progress is assured by having a large group of scientists and experts devoted exclusively to seeking ways and means of making the service better and cheaper.

"It is now nearly 20 years since the State Commissions generally took over the duties of regulating the telephone companies. During those 20 years the physical results of your regulation and our operation are impressive. In 1907 there were about 9,000,000 telephones in the United States, but they were only partially interconnected, while today there are over 18,000,000 telephones in the United States so interconnected that it is possible for practically any one of the 18,000,000 to be connected with reasonable promptness with any one of the 18,000,000. This, today, practically any one anywhere can talk by telephone with any one else, anywhere else in the country. Moreover, anyone in the United States can now converse by telephone with any one in Great Britain, Canada, Cuba, and the principal cities of Mexico."
