Mrs. Shepherd had been suffering from burns she received a short time ago and bronchial pneumonia, which developed soon afterwards was the cause of her death.

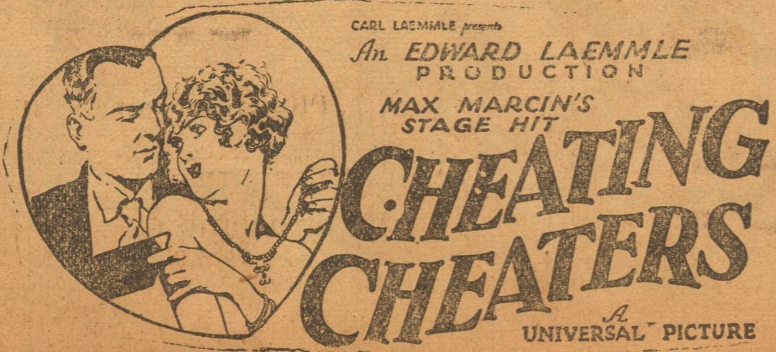

BECKY ROGERS ON TRIAL FOR BANK ROBBERY

department of the University of Texas. He was enroute home from Europe when the arson case was tried. Upon his return Ramsdell found she had employed 28 stenographers and had launched a campaign for a statewide historical association and a history magazine.

Two Ship Crews Are Saved From Atlantic Storm

NORFOLK, Va., Dec. 5.—Forty-eight men aboard two crippled steamers off the North Carolina coast were saved over the week-end in a treacherous storm.

Four men were lost. Thirty-six of the crew of the Norwegian steamer Cibao which grounded off Cape Hatteras were literally natched from death by being hauled four miles with lines and life buoys through raging seas to the safety of the beach. Twenty-four of the crew of the disabled Greek tanker Paragua, driven onto the rocks were saved by coast guardsmen. Four of the Paragua men were lost but the others were brought safely off.

Towns Selected For Next Year's W.T.C.U. Meetings

STAMFORD, Dec. 5.—One of the most famous and wonderful scenic spots of the nation, some of the outstanding beauty spots of the state, and many of West Texas' real substantial cities are slated to be host to West Texas chamber of commerce conventions during the 1928 season.

Eleven town hosts for 1928 have been set, which, including the mammoth annual convention, will make a convention for each month of the new year. Exact dates of the district meetings will be announced later. The big annual membership gathering is already slated for June 11, 12 and 13 at Fort Worth.

Early in the new year, Colorado will be host to the West Central district of the West Texas chamber of commerce. This meeting will be followed shortly afterward by the Oil Belt District convention at Dublin, Lamesa will entertain the South Plains meeting which is usually held in April and Quanah will be next host when delegates of the Lower Panhandle section gather there, these during the spring season.

The most unique 1928 district convention will be that of the Pecos Valley inter mountain section which will meet in the famed Carlsbad Caverns, near Carlsbad, New Mexico. Another picturesque gathering will be that of the Big Bend district at Balmorhea. Both of these meetings will probably be held in July or August, thus assuring a good delegation of vacationists.

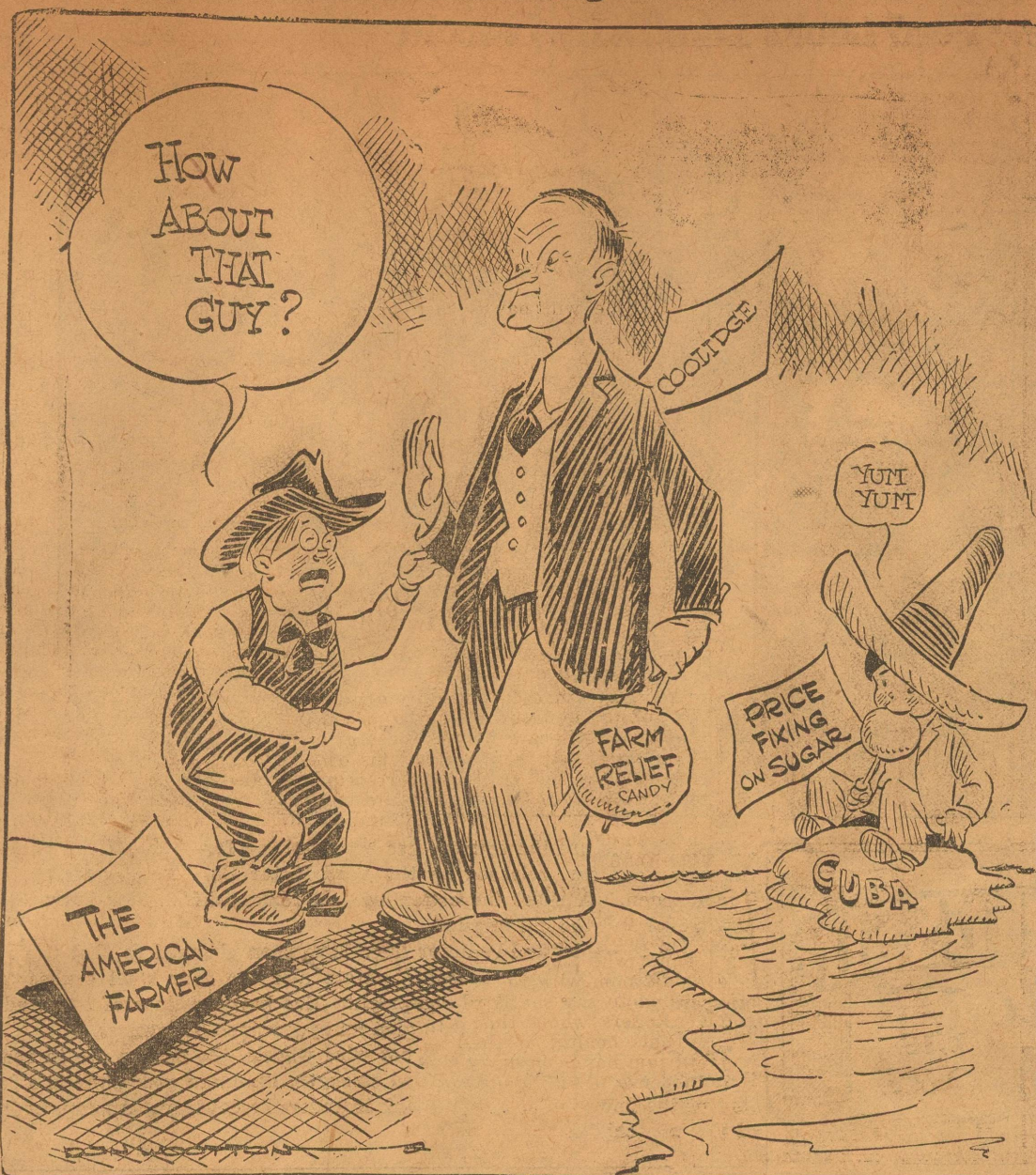

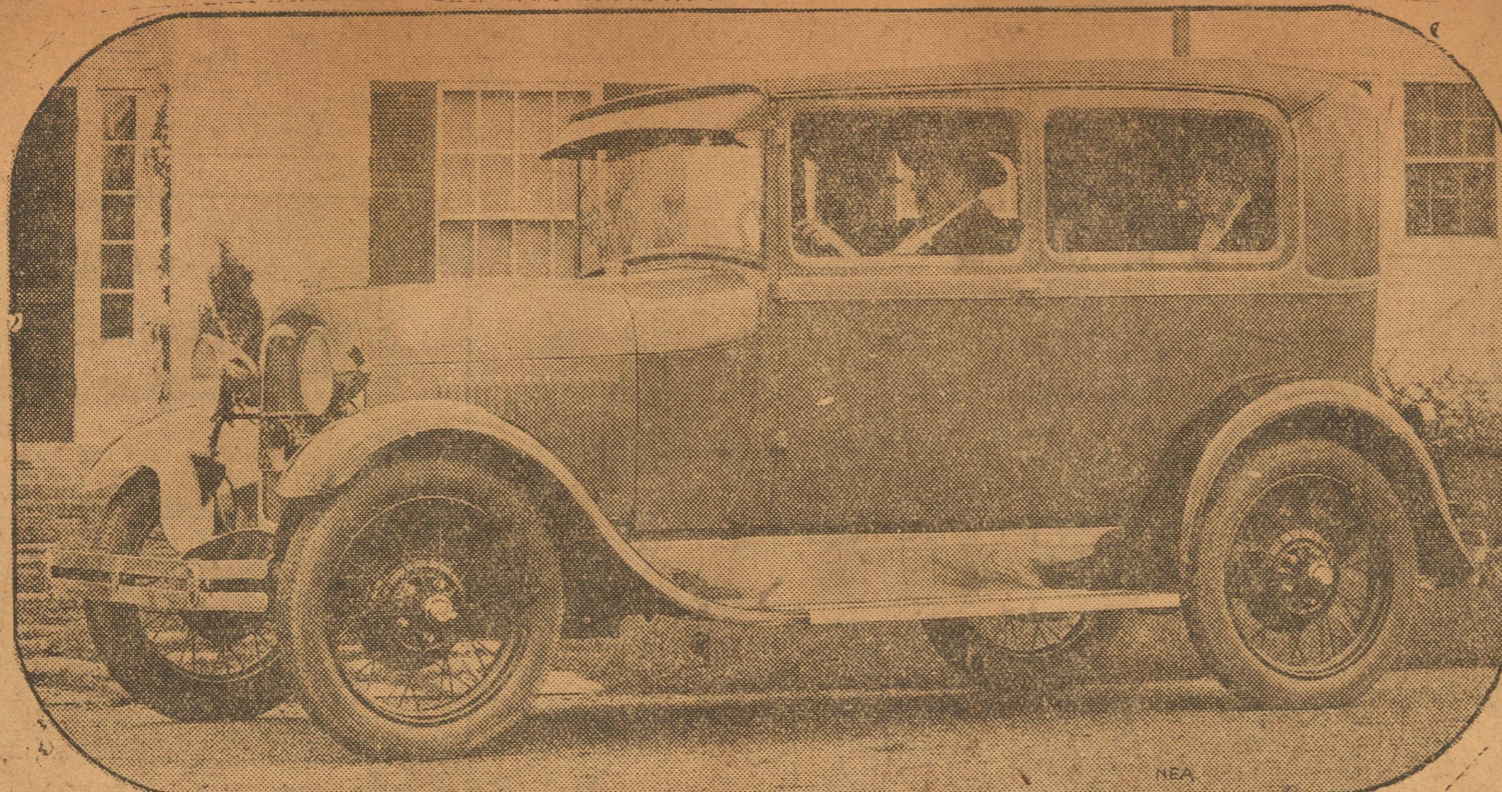

Here is the picture the country has been waiting for—the official photo of the new Ford car, released by the Ford Motor Co. This shows the new Tudor sedan. A short inspection reveals radical differences between the new model and the old "lizzie". Note how the hood and radiator lines have been changed so that the Ford now resembles a "baby Lincoln." Note also the four wheel brakes and bumpers which are standard equipment. See how the lines of the windows and doors have been changed to give an appearance of lowness. Final Appeals Made For Funds Salvation Army

Mr. A. F. Hartman, Ranger chairman of the Salvation Army Home Service Appeal which opens tomorrow makes the final pre-campaign statement.

"On the eve of the opening of the fund raising campaign for the Salvation Army, I would like to clearly state a few features of the Army's budget system that may be a trifle misunderstood by some.

"First I will say that the Salvation Army would very gladly dispense with the services of a campaigner, if the citizens would arrange, organize and go out and secure the necessary fund on their own responsibility.

To save every dollar of expense we are going at top speed ourselves and urge the cooperation of our friends so we can get the job done quick.

"The call is for \$2,900 and we have done our best to make clear to all that the fund, when raised, will be in the hands of the local advisory board and not one—not even the officer in charge of the local Corps can touch one dollar except by the authority of the local board expressed in the signature of our treasurer.

"Only \$250.00 is allotted to Army work outside of Ranger, distributed as follows: For the State Women's Maternity Home and Hospital, where any unfortunate girl from any city, town or hamlet in Texas may go and find refuge, sympathy and love of a true home, \$150.00; for Aged and physically disabled officers of this southern territory, maintenance fund \$50.00; for the Southern States Training College, where young men and women are sent for ten months of intensive training for officership, \$50.00.

"It will be seen that Ranger participates in the benefit of these expenditures. But, should only a part of the budget be secured, then only a proportionate part of the \$250.00 allotment for outside institutions will be taken.

"The raising of this budget of \$2,900.00 will mean that the Army will be able to accomplish from two to three times as much practical, constructive and uplifting work in Ranger as has been possible with the limited funds available annually in recent years. Let us give the Salvation Army something, to do something with."

Texas Tech Closes Very Successful Gridiron Season

LUBBOCK, Dec. 5.—With only one game that wasn't a real battle the Texas Technological college football team has closed its third and most strenuous season of its short history. Of nine games played, five of these were won and four were lost, one of the losses being to the powerful A. & M. machine, Southwestern Conference champions, and the other to the strong Texas Christian University eleven.

Tech collected a total of 134 points during the season while her opponents

were making a total of 100 points. Due to the heavy schedule, Tech suffered greatly from injuries during the latter part of the season, losing to Abilene Christian college 6 to 3 and to the West Texas State Teachers college of Canyon 12 to 9 when the team was in a crippled condition.

Ewing Y. Freeland has been head coach of athletics at Tech since the founding of the school. He is assisted by G. H. Higginbotham and Victor Payne. Figures for the three seasons are as follows, of the 28 games played during the three seasons Tech has won 17, lost 6 and tied 5. Of the five games tied the scores of 4 were 0-0 and one was 3-3. Three of the five games lost were to Southwestern conference eleven, two of these being T. C. U. and one to Texas A. & M.

Although not yet in a conference of any kind, the department of athletics at Tech has approximately lined up to all the rules of the Southwestern conference. In fact comparative figures indicate that Tech has probably lost more letter men through ineligibility than any Southwestern conference eleven. Of the 23 letter men the first year 12 became ineligible, and during the last two years the percent has been about the same.

During the last game of the season, between halves, appreciative fans in the city of Lubbock presented a beautiful watch to the head coach, Ewing Y. Freeland, expressing their esteem and appreciation of the high standards in athletics which he has carried out at Tech.
