## YANKEES HAVE WALKOVER IN THIRD GAME

### PRIVATE RESIDENCE AT TERRELL DEMOLISHED BY EXPLOSION

#### POLICE HAVE NO CLEW TO HELP IN WORK

#### Two Explosions Three Minutes Apart Wreck Home And Auto

TERRELL, Oct. 7.—Police were without clews today to the identity of the perpetrators of two terrific explosions at the home of W. N. Paul, master mechanic of the Texas Midland railroad here early today. The explosion were about three minutes apart and demolished the Paul home and automobile. Fragments of the automobile were scattered more than a block away. Paul could furnish no motive for the explosions.

#### Charley Birger Is Granted Stay Of Execution

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 7.—Charley Birger, notorious gang leader, sentenced to be hanged for murder, today was granted a stay of execution pending review of his case by the Illinois supreme court. Birger was sentenced to be hanged Oct. 15 for complicity in the murder of Mayor Joe Adams of West City, Ill. His attorneys filed application for a writ of error. The supreme court under its ruling today will review the case to determine whether Birger's trial in Franklin county was fair.

#### Widow and Beach Are Indicted In Doctor's Death

MAYS LANDING, N. J., Oct. 7.—Indictments accusing Mrs. Margaret Lillendahl, widow, and William Beach, poultry dealer, of the murder of Dr. William Lillendahl, were returned by the Atlantic county grand jury today. Both are under arrest.

#### Humble Company Gets Submerged Land From State

AUSTIN, Oct. 7.—The Humble Oil and Refining company of Houston received practically all of the more than 450,000 acres of submerged land placed on lease, Sept. 30 by the state. F. M. Newton, New York City was awarded all of the tracts not bid in by the Humble. The leases brought bids totaling \$71,000 for the year. The largest single bid was \$4,400 on a 29,000 acre tract in Matagorda Bay leased by the Humble company. All the land is submerged.

Cramp in behalf of the labor party's executive committee in which he opposed the resolution on the grounds that the International is still retaining its extremist attitude.

#### Texas Christian University Hold Song Contests

FORT WORTH, Oct. 7.—All alumni and former students as well as the present student body and faculty members are eligible to compete in a contest which Texas Christian University is planning to hold for two new school songs. A prize of \$50 will be offered for a new Alma Mater song and a like amount for a new athletic song. Tentative rules for the contest have been framed under the direction of Levora Sims, student president, but details have yet to be passed upon by the student body. It is proposed to hold a preliminary contest to close Dec. 20. No song entered in the contest shall be pronounced in public until after the preliminaries. All melodies must be original, submitted under a mark or non-de-nigme, and will become the property of T. C. U., subject to revision by a music committee. The student body is also fostering a plan to form a T. C. U. song book. It is proposed to accept other songs than contest songs to be used in this school song book.

Remus waived preliminary hearing in police court and acting as his own attorney asked that another trial be arranged. The county grand jury meets Monday and will consider his case first.

He charged that profiteers were spreading alarming rumors in order to inflate prices. Railroads were ordered to give preference to food stuff new on the way to the capitol.

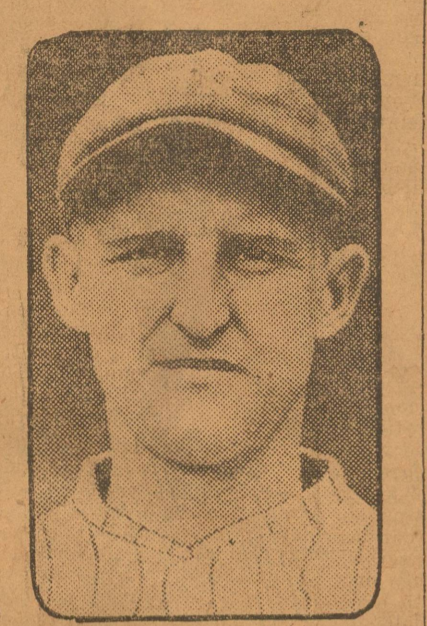
#### Creager Reports Calles In Control Mexican Affairs

#### GRAVE MALADY SWEEPS TOWN OF UNALASKA

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Seven hundred persons in the little settlement of Unalaska, on the west coast of Alaska, face possible extermination in a mysterious epidemic sweeping the village, according to a wire-less report received at coast guard headquarters here. The coast guard cutter Northland is rushing full speed to Unalaska in answer to the urgent medical call. The Northland reported this morning she was 700 miles away. Unalaska has no doctors or nurses and the Northland has but one doctor and a hospital corps to combat the epidemic.

#### Rebel Forces Take Last Stand Today

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 7.—On the chest-like summit and up the densely wooded slope of Cofre de Perote, a mountain 13,416 feet high, rebel forces under General Arnulfo Gomez and General Hector Ahnada today took their last stand against overwhelming odds. Closing on them in wedge formation were two columns of federal troops each of which outnumbered the combined strength of the rebel forces. Although surrounded by federal soldiers the rebels have the advantage of position as the mountain is traditionally a point of great strategic importance in Mexico warfare, dominating from its height the cities of Perote, Jalapa and Orizaba. The decisive battle of the revolution was expected to start today with the storming of the mountain.

#### TAX VALUATION IS INCREASED OVER LAST YEAR

Eastland county tax roll prepared by County Assessor W. J. Herrington and approved today by the county commissioners court, place the assessed valuation of property in the county for 1927 at approximately \$37,075,000 as compared to approximately \$35,800,000 last year, making an increase of approximately \$1,275,000 for 1927. A further increase of around \$2,000,000 in valuations is in sight for next year. Revenue derived from the increase in valuation this year for the county will total around \$40,000. Of the total assessed valuation for the county, \$71,000 is for rural schools. Of the total tax to be raised for the assessed valuation above \$71,000 is for rural schools; \$248,398.66 goes to the state; and \$685,877.47 to the county. The state tax rate is 67 cents and the county rate, including the levy for the new courthouses, is \$1.85 making the total rate \$2.52, or seven cents higher than last year. Two cents of this increase being on the state tax and five cents on the county. Poll tax assessed for 1927 total 11,350.

JUBILEE PREPARATIONS**

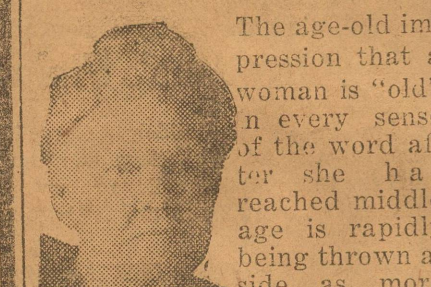

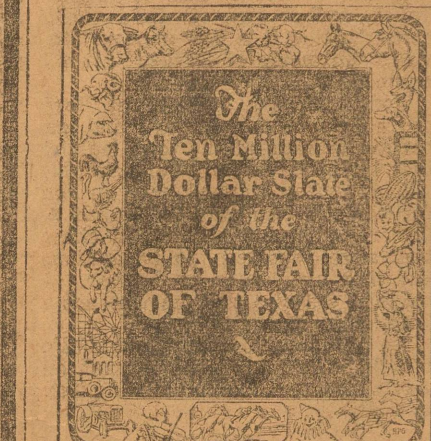

Only Texas Tribe  
Will Attend Fair**

**DALLAS, Oct. 7.**—Braves from the Alabama Indians, Polk county, Texas, and the only tribe to reside on a reservation in Texas will attend the State fair of Texas, Oct. 8 to 23, and display their curios from heathen days, basket weaving, bead work, and other tribal products, it was announced today by Harry Olmsted, president of the state exposition.

The Alabamians are settled on two sections of land deeded them by Sam Houston when he was president of Texas. No white man has ever built a structure on their reservation and their women folk do not speak the English language. Only one white woman has ever learned their dialect. They pride themselves on the fact they have never fought the white man, and their history for the past 300 years, is one of peaceful pursuits. The Indians were great friends of the French and left Alabama and Mississippi when the English gained control of those states from the French. They left Louisiana, coming to Texas, when the United States made the Louisiana purchase.

But few people in Texas know of the Indian reservation. They will form a part of the Polk county exhibit and are being sent to Dallas by the Livingstone Chamber of Commerce.

The Mountaineers arrived here today for a final workout before tomorrow's game. While not as heavy as the College Station team they are fast and have been pointed for this game.

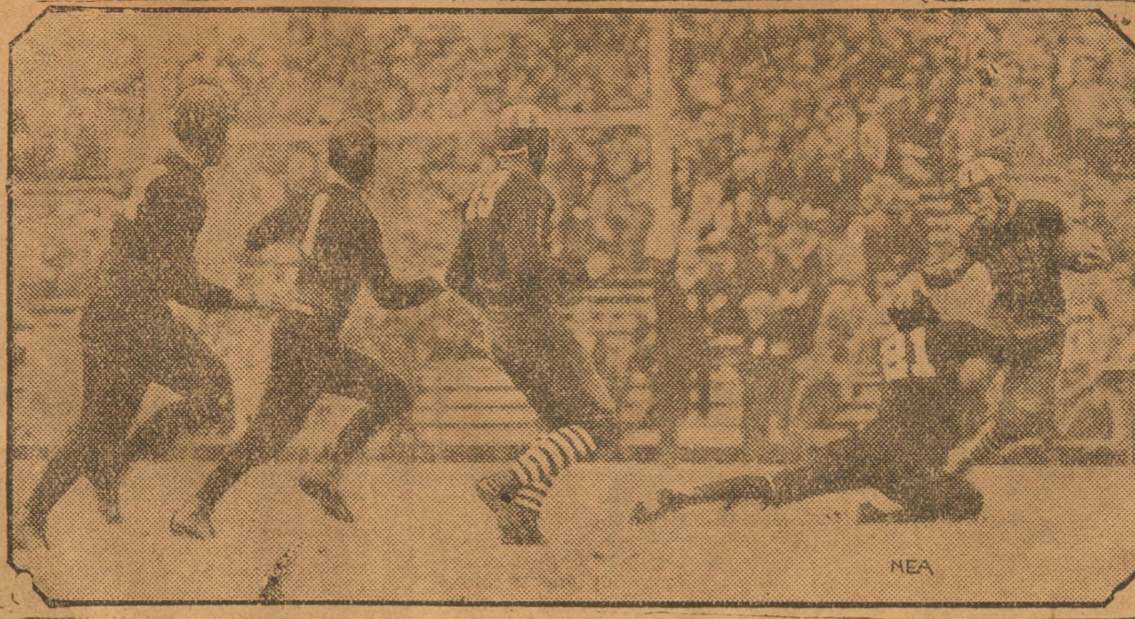

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
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
