

clave in Dallas. The college yell offered as an ali-bi for the difficulty experienced by the minors in getting players, was laid to the activities of the majors.

It is claimed the major league scouts, with their unlimited bank roll tie up the college stars and make it impossible for the minor leagues, particularly the smaller ones, to do business of any kind.

The minors also point to the fact that the major league clubs, 16 of them, with a player limit of 400 each, control 640 ball players at the begining of each season

All of which is true. However, the majors, as a matter of self preserva-tion, have been forced to do this because of apparent inability to agree with the minors on various questions pertaining to draft and price. In order to meet the situation facing them, the majors have gone into the matter of scouting players in a most extensive manner.

Barnard Has Plan.

Because of the need of a place to develop these players, a great many major league clubs are buying minor league franchises of various classification to take care of their assorted

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
