COOLIDGE ASKS FARM AID, FLOOD RELIEF, BIGGER NAVY

Annual Message to Congress, Tremendous in Scope, Touches on Needs.

High Points in President's Message

Outlines farm relief plan based on a federal farm board, with revolvng fund to loan money to co-operatives at low rates. Favors flood control by higher, stronger dikes and spillways, but insists flood states must bear part of cost.

Advocates more cruisers, submarines and aircraft. Urges economy and insists on keeping tax cut low.

Advocates turning merchant marine to private hands quickly. Favors good roads, with government aiding trunkline projects. Opposes any cut in protective tariff.

Urges building up federal farm loan system. Suggests sale of Muscle Shoals nitrate plants. Suggests Boulder Dam project for flood control and irrigation.

Recommends anti-lynching law. Says government will continue prohibition enforcement. Asks board of mediation and conciliation for coal disputes.



WASHINGTON—A slight decrease in the size of the United States army for the last fiscal year was shown in the annual report of Major General Lutz Wahl, made public recently.

The aggregate figure was given as 133,268, compared with the 1926 strength of 133,443, and a 1913 figure of 92,035. The army nurse corps and West Point cadets bring the present strength to 134,861.

An increase of 6,185 for the year was reported for the Officers' Reserve Corps, the present size being 110,014.



cess, says:
"This attack and the sudden alleged discovery that British propaganda was rife in the schools, is typical of the simple-minded directness of Big Bill as well as his astonishing political astuteness.

"But how do people swallow such guff? I am asked. The answer is that it rings true to the vast majority of the peasant immigrants who constitute such a large section of Chicago's voters. As for 'Big Bill' himself I find him hard to describe. The man is so amazingly naive that he actually believes that his threats have sent King George into hiding behind double guards within one of his pal-

aces.

"It is true, of course, that the

troublesome waters do not originate on the land to be reclaimed, but it is also true that such waters have a right of way through that section of the country and the land there is charged with that easement. It is the land of this region that is to be

"Because of the expenses incurred and charges already held against this land, it appears that some revision will have to be made concerning the proportion of cost which it should bear. But it is extremely important that it should pay enough so that those requesting improvement will be charged with some responsibility for

"If the sources directly chargeable cannot meet the demand, the government should not fail to provide generous relief. This, however, does not mean restoration. The government is not an insurer of its citizens against the hazard of the elements." Turning to the debt question, the message continued: message continued:

"Because we are not now physicalbecause we are not now physically at war, some people are disposed to forget that our war debt still remains. "The nation must make financial sacrifices, accompanied by a stern self-denial in public expenditures, until we have conquered the disabilities of our public finance."







Great Britain has refused to guarantee present European boundaries. That they will be changed eventually is regarded as certain in most of the European capitals. Even Paris must believe it sooner or later, for if peaceful negotiations carry no relief, war will become inevitable. This, however, is an issue postponed for the time being in France. Domestic problems are more pressing, for France is poor, with a rich man's ambitions.



His appeals won over the jury in both cases referred to although both defendants not only accepted full responsibility for the murders but boasted of them.



Forest Fires Do Heavy Damage In California

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 5.—One forest fire raged uncontrolled in southern California today after fire fighters had brought under control another blaze which caused estimated damage of more than \$2,000,000.

About 1,000 men battled the flames in the San Bernardino region, which threatened thousands of acres which threatened thousands of acres of forest land and many homes. Shortly before midnight 1,500 volunteers and drafted men conquered a blaze in Tuna and Tujunga canyons after it had burned over 8,000 acres and destroyed more than 100 houses. The fire still was burning after the 30-hour battle but seemed to be under control

The San Bernardino blaze had burned over more than 5,000 acres of valuable timber land. Scores of mountain cabins were destroyed but no lives were lost reports indicated. The fires were said to have been

caused by sparks from a rubbish burner in the forest.

Two deaths resulted from automobile accidents when the drivers of machines were blinded by dust.


