The inevitable result of this service was a weeding out of the weaker teams leaving a few strong weaker teams leaving a few strong ones standing out prominently as undisputed leaders in their respective sections. Yielding to the requests of these schools, the League arrangd a sries of eliminations, and although the championship was not decided the first year, it was because the two teams that went to the final, Cleburne and Houston Heights, played a tie.
