Texas Baptists Get \$725,000 In Fund Campaign

DALLAS, Nov. 9.—Total cash receipts for the conquest campaign of Texas Baptists, which was organized a year ago for the purpose of paying off debts on Baptist institutions in the state, have reached \$725,000, Dr. F. S. Groner general secretary of the Texas Baptist convention, announced. Pledges last spring reached more than \$1,100,000 and Dr. Groner believes that by the time the annual convention opens at Wichita Falls, November 16, \$800,000 of this amount will have been paid.

Efforts to increase the pledges and cash contributions, and to collect pledges already made, will continue without interruption, at least to the last of this year, at which time Baptist officials believe that more than a million will have been received.

One of the important considerations at the annual convention, November 16 to 19, will be the question of continuing this campaign through another year, or indefinitely, as a move to wipe out all debts on all hospitals, colleges, and other institutions

which receive assistance of the convention.

Letters, phone calls and many indications point toward a record attendance at the annual convention. Special railroad rates are being provided by roads over the state.

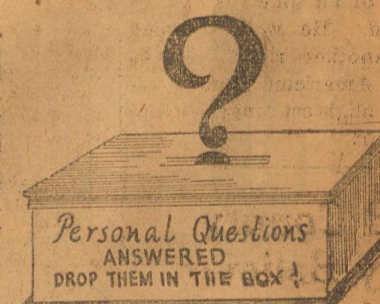

The Lobos were encouraged this week by the decision of the interscholastic league district committee which ruled Jobe eligible. The end, who had been counted upon to take Jenkins' place when the former Leonard star was ruled out, was himself brought into question when contradictory statements were found in his eligibility cards. The true facts have been brought to light and in the face of these Jobe was approved. He may start against the Bulldogs Friday.

Considerable interest in the Ranger battle has been manifest in Cisco where reserve seat tickets are said to be going fast. SPORT DOPE AS SEEN BY RANGER FAN

Having been asked this question so many times and by so many different people, it has occurred to us that a little discussion in attempting to partially answer the question might be interesting to a great many fans. Not that we claim to be an authority nor anything like that but, having been rather close to the boys and their coaches this fall, we do consider ourselves in a fair position to know their attitude.

In the first place, it will not be necessary here to name all the losses through eligibility causes, but it is well to mention that with the loss of each good man the boys that were left on the team felt that they were just a little farther out in the wilderness. They have felt that their own individual task was increased, yet they have felt that their ability to cope with the job could only be increased by experience and the only way to get that experience was through trial by fire.

Overconfidence was the big factor in their defeat by Eastland, and we can say that without detracting one iota from the wonderful show of the "will to win" and fighting spirit shown by the Mavericks.

Abilene trounced the Bulldogs while Garland Hinman was only a shadow of his normal self and Reeves crippled, too. The new men on the team had a real trial by fire then, but, at the same time, they were conscious of their weakness and felt somewhat lost without Garland back there behind the line of scrimmage talking it up.

The fact that they made no better showing against San Angelo than they did is partly due to the fact that the Bobcats had two real men in there that were not in their game against Cisco or Breckenridge.

And now they are being groomed to meet the Big Dam Cisco Lobos. It is conceded, even by no less authority than Tom Whitehead of the Cisco Daily News, that the Lobos look by far the best on paper. In their comparative showings they seem to have shown more stuff than the Bulldogs in every department. They are more experienced, and that counts in any line of business, athletics or what not.

Bulldogs just lack one man to enable them to meet the Lobos half way and carry the fight to them. This deduction is made after noting that when Garland Hinman plays his old tackle position it makes a line that holds, and when he is taken out and played in the backfield, the line is weakened but the backfield strengthened proportionately. It's the left side of the line that has been causing the worry, for Turkey Hinman with the help of Tackett takes care of the right side without much trouble. Mitchell has been going fine at left guard, but so far no running mate for him has shown on left tackle. The game with Cisco will give Blackmon and Love each a chance to fill the hole, and if either can do it (or will do it) then the famous Eddleman will find rather slim pickin's for his plunges.

Assuming that these boys will come through, the Bulldogs lack the above mentioned one man to give the backfield the punch. Garland Hinman can do his part of every-

thing, but not alone. Seth Hubbard is just a little too light to supply the punch. Hammett does the kicking and passing and it won't do to take too many chances with him carrying the ball. It remains then, for one of two men to supply the necessary punch and that lays between Ernest Whitehall and Charlie Hamilton. Ernest Whitehall led the team in gaining ground at San Angelo, while Hamilton was second. Ernest is a little light and this is his first year out, but he tackles like a demon and puts everything he has into every play.

Hamilton looks like the best bet for one reason alone. That one reason is that he has the physical build to be the outstanding halfback of the district. He played the full game at San Angelo and put up the best game he has played this season. It just appears that the success of the Cisco game depends upon how well Charlie will carry out his assignments and how much of the old "stuff" he will put into his work.

This will be just about the last story in which we can say that the boys are inexperienced. They have been in three conference games this year and are becoming to know "what it's all about." They have no doubt had a little stage fright and a little sort of an inferior complex because of their lack of experience, but this seems to be passing off and it don't look like they are much afraid of the Big Dam Lobos. If they can just make up their minds to put out the stuff they have in them they will come off the field next Friday happy and secure in the knowledge that they did come through and did uphold the reputation of the 1926 West Texas champions.

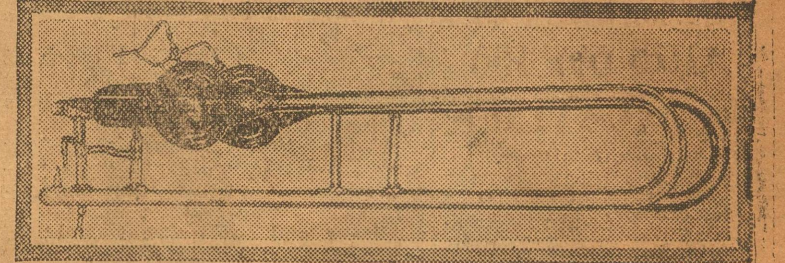
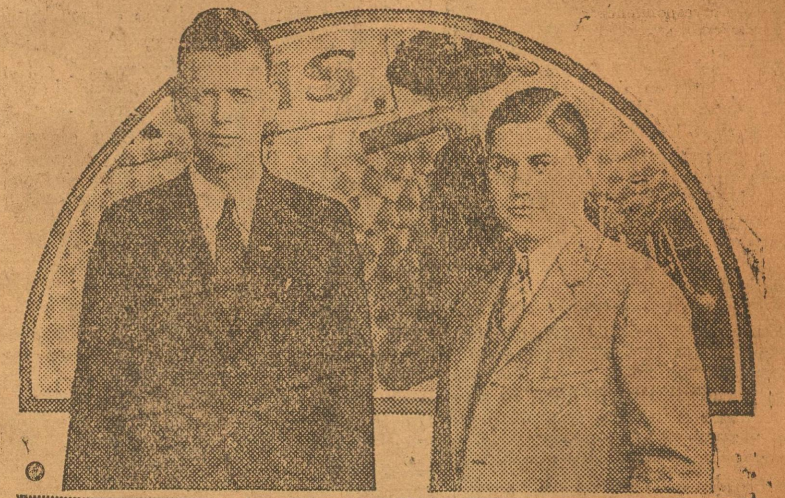

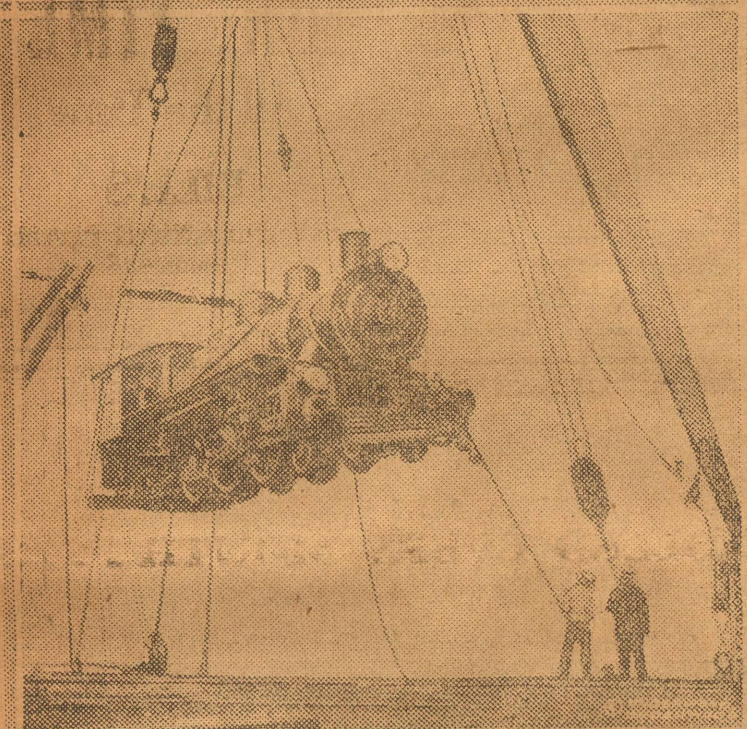

150,000 Pound Engine Is Easily Weighed Today



SIZE and shape are no longer barriers to accurate weighing. Large locomotives and equally cumbersome objects nowadays are weighed as easily and accurately as a pound of beef. As a matter of fact, Mother Earth has been weighed, but this was done on theoretical balances only. Among some of the more intricate weighing problems which have been solved recently for various industries, according to the Toledo Scale Company, are methods of weighing the sand on sandpaper, drinks, the finish on automobile tops, the moisture in wool and cotton, and the distortion in optical lenses, if any. Automatic scales, are also used now to count great quantities of nuts and bolts; to find the center of mass of pistons and to verify the thickness of the paper used in making United States money. Ninety percent of what we eat comes to us over the scales.

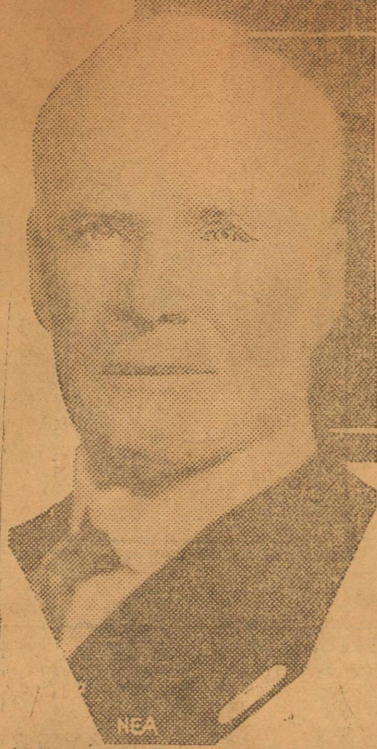

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Government Of Soviet Enters Its Tenth Year

MOSCOW.—The Socialist Soviet government of Russia, in spite of active and passive hostility of most of the governments of the civilized world, is ten years old today.

week we will have lasted longer than the Paris Commune." The Commune set up after the French revolution was the closest historical parallel to the experiment undertaken in Russia in 1917. The Soviet experiment in Russia did last longer than the Paris Commune. If Lenin's remark in 1917 means anything, it means today that the Communists who created the Soviet state of Russia should be as much astonished as anybody else at their successes. Russia under its Communist and Soviet government is incomparably stronger and more stable today than it was ten years ago, or five years ago, even two years ago. No one can live in Russia without knowing that to be true. In a material way, Russia is go-

ing ahead. It is a slow progress, accompanied by much lost motion, a great deal of talking and frequent relapses. Russia's industrial development under a system of state ownership and operation, consumer co-operatives and deliberate discouragement of private enterprise, seems to be improving gradually. In agriculture, on which everything in Russia depends, progress also can be noted. The government claims that agricultural production is restored to its prewar quantity, a level which the national industrial production is also claimed to have reached. A great effort has been made to end the gloomy ignorance of the Russian people and, while the enthusiasms of the government have

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run ahead of its accomplishments, it seems to be true that illiteracy has been very much reduced. The internal financial condition of Russia is only fairly good. The lack of capital is staggering. Money loans command as much as 12 and 16 per cent of yearly interest. The external financial record of the Soviet government shows an "unbroken" record of meeting every money obligation with prompt and full payment. The credits offered to the government abroad are usually short and the prospect of an issue of Soviet bonds in foreign markets is so distant that it is seldom even mentioned. The foreign relations of the Soviet Union cannot be said to be satisfactory.

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
