

CLINT SMITH IS GIVEN 30 YEAR SENTENCE

FORBES, COOK PLAN FLIGHT TO SOUTH POLE

One Purpose of Expedition Will be to Vindicate Name of Dr. Frederick A. Cook

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Nov. 30.—Charles R. Forbes and Dr. Frederick Cook, until last week cellmates at Leavenworth penitentiary, will be companions on a flight to the south pole, the former director of the veterans' bureau announced here today.

Col. Forbes told the United Press he would leave tonight for Washington "to forward our plans for the south pole project."

"The purpose of the expedition in one sense will be to vindicate Dr. Cook, whose discovery of the north pole was mistakenly discredited," said Forbes, who came here yesterday to visit his 93-year-old mother.

League Nations Convenes To Talk Disarmament

GENEVA, Nov. 30.—The league of nations preparatory disarmament conference convened shortly after 10:30 a. m. today.

With many threats of war echoing across Europe during the past two weeks, delegates from 23 countries gathered for a two weeks discussion of problems of armament.

The action taken by the conference may have an influence in quieting the war cries heard in Europe and may even prevent another world war, it is successful.

Maxim M. Litvinoff, leader of the soviet delegation of 16 was expected to outline the attitude of the Russian government in his opening declaration.

Two New Locations Reported Made In Gordon Pool Area

Two new locations in the Gordon pool add interest to that comparatively young Eastland county field, especially when coupled with the fact that a number of wells are drilling there.

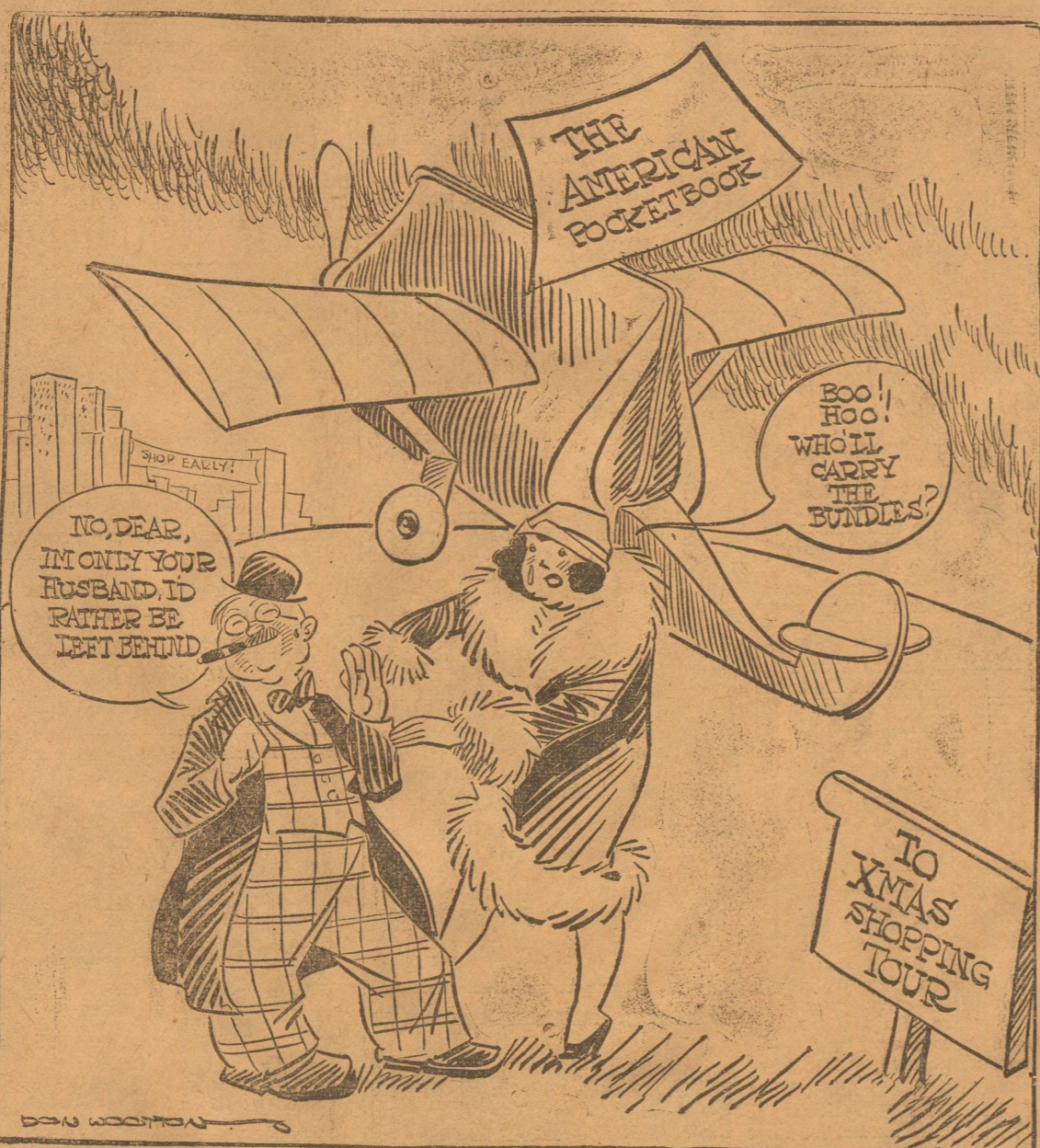

This well has made an unusual record, as it has drilled to this depth in 13 days without a stop.

DISARMAMENT PLANS TOPIC OF TODAY'S MEETING AT GENEVA

(United Press Correspondent)

GENEVA, Nov. 30.—The preparatory disarmament commission of the League of Nations, enlarged and rejuvenated by the last assembly, convened here today for the purpose of launching the League's new 1928 disarmament program.

Hugh Wilson, U. S. ambassador to Switzerland, represented the United States on the commission which now is composed of 26 of the leading nations of the world, including soviet Russia. The commission convened under the presidency of Jonkheer J. Lunden, Dutch minister to Paris, who has been one of the leading exponents of disarmament ever since the league's organization.

The immediate task of the commission will be the final linking up with the problem of disarmament the question of security, which the September assembly decided constitutes the only basis on which disarmament ever can be attained.

Under instructions both from the league assembly and the league council, the commission will proceed to the creation of a parallel commission that will prepare agenda regarding security for the eventual disarmament conference that the league hopes to summon.

This commission will be composed of expert jurists representing all of the nations now on the preparatory disarmament commission that are members of the league of nations, or, in other words, all of the members with the exception of the United States.

No provision was made for the United States being on the security commission for the reason that the American delegates have repeatedly stated in the past that the United States cannot participate in security pacts, and regional agreements on which the league hopes to attain a basis of security that will permit of reductions in armaments. Should, however, the United States express a desire to be on the preparatory security commission as well a place will be created for her.

As soon as the preparatory disarmament commission has arranged for the creation of the above commission it is expected to adjourn until next spring in order to let the security commission get its work under way. Then the two commissions working hand in hand hope to be able to present to the league assembly in September, 1928, the complete agenda for a first international disarmament nad security conference.

At the spring meeting of the preparatory disarmament commission the latter will proceed to a second reading of the draft disarmament convention which it drew up last spring.

In the meantime the security commission will work out a project for security based on the increase of as many regional security mutual assistance and arbitration pacts as possible, and secondly on perfecting the machinery of the league so that each league member may know to what extent it can count on league help in the case of aggression.

One of the latter points to be decided is to find out from each league member just how much of its military, naval and aerial armaments it could contribute to any common effort for the carrying out of league action against any aggressor state.

When the security commission has completed its project it will be coordinated with the draft disarmament project of the preparatory commission and the whole will be submitted to the league assembly for final decision relative to the date of convoking the disarmament conference. This will hardly be held before the spring of 1929, according to leaguers.

NO EMOTION SHOWN AS VERDICT READ

MARLIN, Texas, Nov. 30.—Thirty years imprisonment was the punishment fixed by a jury in district court here today for Clint Smith for participation in the robbery of the First State Bank of Otto, Texas.

The verdict was returned just after 10 a. m., after the jury had deliberated 18 hours.

Smith took the verdict without emotion. He testified in his own behalf yesterday that he was under the influence of liquor at the time he participated in the robbery.

Selection of a jury to try Henry Hawkins, also charged with complicity in the Otto robbery, began at 11 a. m. The jury was expected to be completed by tonight, and hearing of evidence will begin tomorrow.

American Citizen Held for Ransom May be Killed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Thomas W. Thompson, American citizen, was captured by Mexican bandits Nov. 25, near Capala, Simioha and is held for \$200,500 ransom, according to consular reports to the state department today. He has been threatened with death if the money is not paid, the consul reported.

AGRICULTURAL TRADES OPEN CHICAGO MEET

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 30.—Bitterly denouncing cooperative marketing in a warning against radical legislation as a means of farm relief, W. F. Jensen, Chicago, opened the annual convention of the agricultural trades economic conference here today.

Practically every phase of agriculture was represented by delegates from all parts of the country.

Meanwhile plans were completed for the reception of farmers, cotton growers, cattle ranchers, truck gardeners, and grain growers, from every state in the union who will gather here Monday for the three day meeting of the American farm bureau federation.

The five full objects of the farm bureau—efficient production, better merchandising methods, higher living standards, a well rounded community and an equal opportunity for all—were expected to fill the major portion of the program.

Air Mail Pilot Is Killed In Storm Body Found Today

KENDALVILLE, Ind., Nov. 30.—The body of Ed Asberg, Chicago-Cleveland airmail flyer, killed last night when his airplane crashed during an electrical storm, was found today eight miles east of here.

Asberg was reported lost on his east-bound trip from Chicago to Cleveland and the body was found in the wreckage of the plane on a farm shortly before 10 a. m.

GOOD FELLOWS PLAN TO RAISE \$1,000 FUND

Will Co-Operate With Child Welfare Club In Providing Christmas Cheer for All.

Christmas is right here. Tomorrow is Dec. 1, and in 25 days Old Santa will have made his rounds and gone back to the land of the reindeer. There are hundreds of homes in Ranger that Santa always finds; there are others he surely would miss if it were not for the help of charity organizations.

This year the Good Fellows are coming to the assistance of the Child Welfare club in making Santa Claus possible to many children and bringing Christmas cheer to those who might not know it was Christmas day unless they looked at a calendar.

On Tuesday afternoon at the Gholson hotel, B. H. Murphy, S. P. Boon, Louie Davis, representing the Rotary club; Bill Cardy, the Lions club; Wayne C. Hickey, the Chamber of Commerce; Boyce House, the Eastland County News, and Mrs. Rena B. Campbell, the Ranger Times, met and formally organized the Good Fellows. B. H. Murphy was made chairman and Mrs. Campbell, secretary-treasurer. The goal was set for \$1,000 and no amount is too small or too large to be accepted by the Good Fellows.

Just before Christmas all the money that is collected will be turned over to the Child Welfare club for their Christmas cheer fund.

In the meantime, half-gallon fruit jars will be placed in the bars, florists, seven drug stores, six cafes, picture show, two confectionaries, five barber shops, the men's clothing and department stores. Boyce House was instructed to have his paper prepare stickers for these jars, which will read: "Ranger's Good Fellows Christmas Cheer Fund. No amount too small or too large. Must raise \$1,000."

Heads of stores and other places of business where these jars are placed are asked to round up their employees and get the fund started off by their own offering. These jars will be emptied of their contents several times a week and the money placed in the bank. There will be no expense attached to the campaign, as everything connected with its launching is gratis.

A committee consisting of W. C. Hickey and Louie Davis was appointed to confer with J. T. Hughes, manager of the Liberty theatre, in regard to a benefit picture show, for which it was suggested the Boy Scouts be lined up to sell tickets.

The matter of a benefit dance loomed large and will be given, provided one can be arranged without the Good Fellows putting out any money.

People who do not wish to put checks or money in the jars are asked to send their contributions made payable to the Good Fellows Fund, to the Ranger Times or Eastland County News.

All jars will be numbered and a check kept as to the amounts turned in from each jar. In this way, at the end of the drive the jar that was the most lucrative will be publicly announced.

RAPID ADVANCE MADE IN PICKING COTTON CROP

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Good advance was made in picking the remaining cotton crop due to excellent weather conditions for field work which prevailed in all portions of the belt, the weekly government weather report on cotton stated today.

The survey will be complete much earlier than usual the report said. In Oklahoma practically all cotton has been picked in the eastern portion of the state, and probably 90 percent has been gathered in the west.

A little top crop is still being harvested in the lower Rio Grande.

COURTROOM, MAYS LANDING, N. J., Nov. 30.—The state today called its much heralded "mystery witness" in a determined effort to prove that Willis Beach was at the scene of the murder of Dr. William Lillendahl, Sept. 15, 1927.

The mystery witness proved to be Harry Sanders of Sidney, Ohio. A quiet-spoken plump person, Sanders testified that he was driving along the road near Hammonton, N. J., the day of the murder and saw a "blue coupe", such as Beach owned in the lane where Lillendahl was killed.

Swindled of Life Savings by Con Men, Negro Dies

CORPUS CHRISTI, Nov. 30.—Brooding over the fact that two young negroes had swindled him out of his life savings, which amounted to \$900, Harold Ellis, aged negro, died from worry here today. Ellis was swindled nearly two months ago.

Police have thus far been unable to locate the two negro "con" men.

The negro was shot by the mob, which formed a half circle around him. Gasoline was poured on his body and it was then set afire.

City Commission Of Ranger Plans Water Expansion

SPECIFICATIONS NEW FORD CAR TELLS STORY OF AUTOMOBILE

After six months of saying nothing but "sawing wood," Henry Ford today announced the specifications of the new Ford car which succeeds his famous Model T. A bare listing of those specifications presents a picture of an automobile that in performance, appearance and mechanical features has heretofore been associated with a considerably higher price class. Unusual speed and acceleration are among the outstanding features

of the new car. It is announced as being able to make 55 to 60 miles an hour, with ease. In recent tests it has made even more without difficulty. What is more important, it is stated that when traveling at such speeds, it holds the road easily, and with comfort to driver and passengers. It is also stated with equal positiveness, however, that it performs in an equally spectacular manner on bad roads. In its design, Mr. Ford has held to his original idea of a car which can meet all conditions and types of roads.

Appreciating the constantly increasing importance of acceleration, the Ford Motor company has given a great deal of study to this feature of the new car. In high gear tests with two passengers in a Tudor sedan it has shown an acceleration of from 5 to 25 miles an hour in 8-12 seconds.

Four Wheel Brakes.
The new Ford car also introduces a new type of four-wheel brakes. An exclusive Ford development, they are of the mechanical, shoe-expanding type and are self centering. The brake pedal and the hand brake each operates all four brakes. It is also stated that this is the most reliable and simplest type of four-wheel brake and also the easiest to adjust, all adjustments being made from the outside without removing any parts. An engine that is practically vibrationless develops 40 horsepower at 2,200 revolutions per minute. This low revolution speed in ratio to the high horsepower is illustrative of the unusual efficiency of the engine. Also, it means longer life, the lower engine speed insuring less wear on engine parts. The low revolution speed is also a substantial factor in lessening vibration. The bore is 3 7/8 inches, stroke 4 1/4 inches. The unusually large crankshaft, which is both statically and dynamically balanced, weighs 28 pounds. This balancing, combined with the lightness of aluminum alloy pistons, further combine to reduce vibration and increase riding and driving comfort and safety.

In addition to freedom from vibration, it is announced that the car is unusually quiet, a great deal of attention having been paid to this feature by the Ford engineers. In the engine, the timing gears are made of bakelized fabric which is much quieter than metal. The cams on the camshaft have been so designed as to prevent valve clicking.

Fine Coachwork.
The coachwork of the car is as distinctive as its performance. There is a noticeable European touch in line and contour. It is not only designed for exterior beauty, but has as well the interior roominess, convenience and luxurious appointments to be found in much higher priced automobiles. On an instrument board of satin-finished nickel are mounted the speedometer, gasoline gauge, ammeter and ignition lock, with a dash light in the center. The new military-type sun visor, with crown roof and round corners, are features of the closed models. Unusually narrow pillars and very wide doors and windows give maximum attractive ness, while choice of four colors in pyroxylin finish are offered. Simplicity in design also has been carried to the ignition. There is only one coil in a waterproof case. There are no vibrators to adjust, and no exposed cables to work loose or short from water. The distributor is located in a readily accessible position on top of the engine. Centrifugal water pump, large radiator and airplane propeller-type

fan provides a cooling system which makes the car very difficult to over-heat, except from abuse, such as running without enough oil, or dry radiator.

Fuel Consumption
From 20 to 30 miles to a gallon of gasoline, depending upon driving speed, is the gasoline consumption announced. Feed to carburetor is by gravity.

The oiling system, also a distinctive Ford design, is a combination of pump, splash and gravity feed. The new transmission is of the selective sliding gear type, with standard shift three speeds forward and one reverse. The main shaft runs on ball bearings. The counter-shaft on roller bearings and the reverse idler on bronze bearings, a power-saving design unusual on light cars. Shifting of gears is noiselessly and easily accomplished, at the pressure of a finger.

Multiple dry-disc clutch, rear axle of three-quarter floating type housed in electrically welded steel, and spiral bevel gear drive are interesting features. The axle shafts carry none of the weight of the car, the wheels running on roller bearings on the housings. Newly developed springs of the transverse semi-elliptic type and hydraulic shock-absorbers prevent excessive up-and-down movement and remove side sway.

Irreversible steering gear, which prevents shocks from being transmitted back to the hands of the driver makes handling exceptionally easy. Maximum steering safety is further provided by a gear housing of welded steel forgings, and a steel tube steering column welded into the housing, making a sturdy and exceptionally safe one-piece unit. Ford-designed steel spoke wheels, completely welded into a one-piece assembly, are provided.

There are six models of the new

car. They are the phaeton, roadster sport coupe, coupe, Tudor sedan and Fordor sedan.

Local dealers are preparing for a public reception next Friday, when models of the new line will be shown in photographs and charts.

T. C. U. Freshmen Turn In Another Perfect Season

FORT WORTH, Nov. 30.—Coach Leo "Dutch" Meyer of the T. C. U. freshmen football team plotted his Pollywogs through their third consecutive undefeated season this year. The freshmen are allowed four games each year, one away from home and the other three here.

This year the frosh met the Ranger high school team in Ranger for their first contest and downed the champions of Coach Blair Cherry, former T. C. U. star athlete, by a decisive score. Their next game was with the Decatur Baptist college eleven which resulted in another one-sided victory for the Pollywogs. They met Weatherford college next and downed them in like manner. The freshman season was closed the day before Thanksgiving when they swamped the Ranger junior college team 51 to 0. The Ranger eleven is coached by Tricky Ward, also a former T. C. U. football and base ball star.

In 1926 the frosh were victorious in all four of their contests and in 1925 they won two and tied two games, the year Meyer became freshman coach. The frosh had no definite schedule or plan for games in 1924 as that was the first year that T. C. U. was placed under the freshman rule as a southwest conference member.

Meyer has brought out some real promising material in his work with the freshmen. The coaching the men receive in their freshmen year and charge of Coach Blair Cherry, Madison Bell, will determine to a great extent the kind of varsity men the players make in later years. An especially promising crop of freshmen athletes will graduate from this year's frosh eleven to the 1928 varsity. Outstanding among these are Griffith, Hopkins and Currin, three huskies who hail from Dallas. Griffith is one of the most promising defensive men ever seen here. He also is a powerful offensive driver in the fullback role. Currin is a speedy halfback who can pass and punt. Hopkins was used as a tackle this year and looks like he is headed for a varsity berth in the near future.

Cleburne was well represented in the frosh team by Copeland, versatile quarter, and Clark Lee, half-back and punter. Yace also is a drop-kicker of ability. Ed Sain, former quarter at Arlington Heights high of Fort Worth, has a good chance of developing into a varsity back next year. Dennis of Memphis turned out to be Meyer's most versatile back and looks like he may land a first string berth in 1928.

Other fancy-stepping backs are Roberts, Leland, Griffin, LeBus and Wells. Robertson is a powerful end who will make somebody hustle to land a varsity wing position next year. Butler and Martin are nice looking guards who stand a good chance in varsity company as will Swofford, Ranger tackle and Hirstine, center from north side high school of Fort Worth.
