### America's Youth Gets Chance To Work

WASHINGTON—Remember the days when Pop couldn't retire from business because his children came home to roost?

Well, today many a youngster is building his pop a home in the history of this organization so great an opportunity for unskilled labor.

The heads of that center say, "There has never been in the history of this organization so great an opportunity for unskilled labor."

Over at the Labor Department, statisticians figure that America will need "an additional 3 million workers before another year." And the Apprenticeship Unit of the de-

partment adds, "Youth, unskilled youth, will supply a large part of that need."

Even the kids in school are becoming breadwinners, in 29 states, during the first 6 months of 1940, more than 1,200 youngsters received certificates permitting them to do part-time work.

But, what about the kids working in non-defense plants which have to shut down because of priority difficulties? Where is their slice of the prosperity pie?

Heads of the Federal Committee on Apprenticeship declare these boys are rapidly absorbed in defense industries. The problem is not one of re-employment but of migration. In most cases the youngsters must move to distant cities and this intensifies the already serious housing shortage in defense centers.

What about opportunities for unskilled youth with no work training at all? Well, it so happens that the Federal Committee on Apprenticeship is especially authorized by Congress to fix things so that young boys, at work for the first time, may learn skilled labor while actually on the job.

Under this plan a young fellow goes to work for around 35 cents an hour. While he's learning the trade he's also speeding up the defense output.

During the last months of his apprenticeship, the youth gets as much as a dollar an hour.

Of course, there's many a lad who still isn't able to draw a week's pay today. It may be because he hasn't found just the kind of job he wants.

Then again, it might be because he just doesn't feel like rolling up his sleeves and getting his hands dirty.

Doesn't it seem more sensible?

### WHAT A NOTED JOURNALIST SAYS ABOUT JAN VALTIN

Edward T. Folliard Of The Washington Post Wrote

This Letter:

**THE WASHINGTON POST**

"Having interviewed Valtin several times, I would say that he has an abiding and searching hatred both for the communists and the nazis. That hatred is, of course, reciprocated. I don't know what Valtin thinks deep down about our own capitalistic system, but I would guess that after what he has gone through at the hands of the Russians and Germans, he must look upon the United States as a paradise.

"Valtin, as you undoubtedly know, is an exceptionally intelligent fellow. I suppose one could go further and say that he is downright brilliant.

"In his appearances here in Washington, he has made a very favorable impression. His off-the-record talk at the National Press Club was a triumph, marked by such applause as I have rarely heard in that sophisticated arena. He likewise made a good impression before the Dies Committee.

"There is no sentiment in official Washington for sending Valtin to a certain death in Nazi Germany. True, the deportation hearings have been held, but I don't think anything will ever come of them.

"The Department of Justice, it is reported, agrees with most people in Washington that Valtin is much more valuable here than he would be in the hands of the Nazi Gestapo.
