

ODESSA GETS FIRST DEAD BANK BANDIT

PRISON MUTINY LEADERS REVEALED, PLACED IN CONFINEMENT

TANKS WILL BE USED TO SUBDUDE GANG

Weapons Are Seized And Charges Are To Be Filed

FOLSOM PRISON, Calif., Nov. 25.—Six of the seven prisoners who led by Anthony Brown, 28-year-old San Francisco thug, precipitated an attempted break which resulted in nine men being killed and 22 wounded, were identified here today and were placed in solitary confinement.

Brown will be charged with assault to commit murder and others with conspiracy to commit murder. Conviction on either carries the death penalty.

Brown was serving 15 years from San Francisco for robbery. The prisoners surrendered five guns and a number of knives which they declared were all the weapons they had. Four of the guns were taken by the prisoners from four guards taken prisoners at the time of the break.

Arrival of two tanks from San Francisco was awaited by military and prison officials before launching a general assault on the main cell block of the Folsom state prison.

Within the cell block 1,200 prisoners were at large. Seven armed leaders of the mutiny were barricaded in the prison hospital commanding the main entry to the cell block.

The seven had successfully defied efforts of prison officials and national guardsmen to dislodge them for 18 hours.

Nine men lay dead and 23 others were wounded as the result of the fighting in the prison.

Nine hundred men were ready to join in the assault if necessary to capture the convicts.

An inner defense line of 200 men was formed by prison guards, state highway police, sheriffs, deputies and other peace officers.

When the two tanks arrive they will be driven to the rear door of the cell block under the plan of campaign mapped out shortly before dawn.

Men inside the tanks will be armed with rifles and hand grenades. The mutineers will be given five minutes to come out from behind their barricade peacefully. If they refuse, the tanks will batter down the doors of the entry to the cell block and start shooting right and left, it was said.

Six guards were held prisoners in the cell block with the ring leaders of the mutiny threatening to murder them at the first sign of another attack.

An unidentified convict died early today from wounds received in the firing as the attacking forces attempted to storm the cell block early last night.

Smuggled Furs Turn Out To Be Fire Sale Stuff

BEAUMONT, Nov. 25.—Gold bricks may be out of style but a man with the odor of salt water about him can sell anything from Chinese idols to alleged imported, home-made fur coats at a handsome profit, according to Beaumont police records.

Police recently were called upon to investigate a report that an auction sale of imported goods on which no duty had been paid was going on in the basement of a downtown building.

A man wearing a sailor cap and expressing his views in nautical terms had spread word around town that an auction was to be held on rare fur coats. Several men had spent time in Labrador trapping animals. In Quebec the fur had been made into coats. With much trouble and rare luck the fine fur coats had been smuggled into this country without paying the high duties.

Upon arrival of police the two men conducting the auction hastily produced sales slips and other papers to prove they had bought the goods at a New York fire sale.

Soldier of Fortune, Aged 100 Would Choose Flying Today

DETROIT.—In a Detroit poorhouse sits a soldier of fortune, now minus the fortune, who can authentically lay claim to the following experiences:

He saw the charge of the Light Brigade.

He was nursed by Florence Nightingale.

He was a gun runner for Garibaldi.

He pulled the Empress Carlotta out of a ditch by her ankle.

He was present at the Indian Mutiny.

Captain Doland Walpole, member of the British family of that name, is now 100 years old. He sits a little apart from the other inmates. A Scotch cap is set rakishly on his head. On his breast are medals with bars that bear historic names—Crimea, Alma, Balaklava, Ikerman, Sebastopol, Lucknow, Delhi, Peking, Egypt.

Educated as a soldier, he lived to fight under five flags. He was a student in military engineering at Pfort, Saxony, when he started the career of volunteering which lasted him throughout his active life. He joined the Turkish service under Omar Pasha and took part in the principal Crimean battles.

During one of the campaigns he was a patient of Florence Nightingale

for 16 days.

He next saw action in Persia and later took part in the Indian Mutiny. He was sent back from the East on sick leave, but within 24 hours of reaching England he was on his way to Italy as a volunteer for Garibaldi, the patriot.

The Italian rumpus over, he went to China to become a general under Li Hung Chang.

The American military observer in the Crimea, General George B. McClelland, wrote him that there was a sizeable war on in the United States and said the Union Army had need of technical officers.

Walpole packed his grips and became a cavalry officer under Custard. Later he served under General Butler in the Bremaud Hundreds. He went 20 miles within the Confederate lines to prepare the topographical maps upon which the Battle of Gettysburg was based.

When the gallant stripling of 71 presented himself for service in the Spanish-American War, he was told that he was too old.

"If I had another 100 years to live," he told the United Press, "I would go back to any war I could find. But it would be in the air service. Science has ruined warfare and only in the air would I find the pageantry of what, in my day, was war."

Texas Bankers To Send Club Boys Training Camps

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 25.—Funds have been donated by the Texas Bankers' association for two free trips for Texas farm club boys to the club training camp for boys and girls to be held in Washington, D. C., next June. C. S. E. Holland, Houston, chairman of the agricultural committee of the bankers' association, has advised Sterling C. Evans, state boys club leader, extension service, A. & M. college of Texas.

The boys to make the trip will be selected Jan. 1 on records for outstanding work as farm club members for the last three years. They will be graded on basis of 1925, 1926 and 1927 reports, participation in club activities, leadership and stories of their experiences as 4-H club members.

Similar trips were sponsored by the bankers' association last year and Mr. Holland has written that the association was so pleased with the results that it was decided to repeat the offer.

INTERNATIONAL STOCK SHOW OPEN TOMORROW

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—A "students judging contest" will open the twenty-eighth annual international live stock exposition tomorrow, at the Union Stock Yards. More than 20 teams from colleges in the United States and Canada will try for honors.

The Ontario Agricultural college at Guelph, Canada, three times winner, is among those listed. Successful American schools are: Oklahoma, Texas, Indiana and Nebraska.

The main team trophy offered is a huge cup from the Union Stock Yards & Transit company. Individual awards also are to be given for placings in cattle, horse, sheep and swine contests. Twenty scholarships will divide the \$5,000 offered by the Pullman company. Meat judging also will be rewarded by the Pullman company.

Decision of the junior contests will be completed the first day. Children enter stock fed by themselves in this event.

A crowded program necessitates holding the junior state championship contests today.

Dallas Meeting May End Cotton Rate Hearing

DALLAS, Nov. 25.—Completion of the taking of testimony in the hearings conducted by the interstate commerce commission into freight rates was expected to be completed at the hearing opened here today by Commissioner Thomas F. Woodlock.

Representatives of the various organizations of the cotton industry expect to present testimony showing that rates on cotton are excessive. The cotton growers will save more than \$12,000,000 a year if the 20 per cent reduction in rates asked by the cotton industry is granted.

The hearing into shipping rates was launched under the Hoch-Smith resolution adopted by congress. The case opened at Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 26, moved to Gulfport, Miss., Nov. 18, then to Oklahoma City. It is expected to be completed here.

Officials of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association will present arguments tending to show the federal rate-making body why they consider cotton rates excessive. The case is the most important involving raw cotton that has been heard in recent years and represents the most drastic cut in freight rates ever proposed in the cotton industry.

National Dairy Meeting May Be Held In Texas

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 25.—Indications are that Texas stands a good chance of getting the 1928 meeting of the National Dairy association, in the opinion of A. L. Darnell, dairy husbandry department, A. & M. college of Texas, who was chairman of the committee of nine that had charge of arrangements for the Texas exhibit at the National Dairy show in Memphis, Tenn., in October.

Directors of the National Dairy association will meet in Chicago, Dec. 2, to decide whether the association will hold its next meeting in St. Louis and, if not, to consider the question of holding the 1928 meeting in this state, Mr. Darnell said.

The committee from Texas which is working to get the national dairy meeting for Dallas in 1928 will be represented at the Chicago meeting by A. L. Ward, Dallas, educational director Texas Cotton Seed Crushers association; J. W. Ridgway, Fort Worth, secretary-manager Mistletoe creameries; and J. E. Stanford, Longview, agricultural director East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Remus' contention has been that he was sane before the crime, insane during its commission, and sane shortly afterwards.

SHOT DOWN BY OFFICERS AT BANK DOOR

Second Is Expected To Die, Neither Is Identified

ODESSA, Texas, Nov. 25.—Glowing posters advertising a \$5,000 reward for the bodies of dead bank bandits had their effect here today in the death of one man and the probably fatal injury of another.

Acting on a "tip" Sheriff Reeder Webb, a deputy, a state cattle inspector and sheriff of an adjoining county waited near the rear of the City National bank early today.

When two men arrived at the bank and one of them shattered the glass door, the officers opened fire with shotguns.

One man was killed and one other is expected to die. Neither have been identified.

Both appeared to be about 45 years old.

Webb is sheriff of Ector county. With him were his deputy, Tom Jones, Sheriff Aubrey Francis of Midland county, and C. E. Hogan, state cattle inspector.

The four officers fired as soon as the robbers appeared at the rear of the bank. The robbers carried an iron bar which was used to shatter the glass in the rear door just before the officers fired.

A quart of nitroglycerin, three sticks of dynamite and a set of tools were found by police near the men.

The officers had lain in wait for the bandits practically all night, taking turns standing guard.

The robbers appeared about 3 o'clock this morning.

The attempted robbery followed a mysterious explosion about 12:30 a. m. which Sheriff Webb believed was intended to divert attention from any noise caused by wrecking the bank safe.

Sheriff Webb and the officers were hidden in an alley near the telephone office. The bank entrance was four doors away.

A Chrysler roadster drove up to the bank and two men alighted, placing on the sidewalk a bottle containing nitroglycerin, three sticks of dynamite and a set of burglar's tools.

One of the men broke the glass door and had inserted his arm to open the door when the officers opened fire.

The automobile used by the two men was stolen from the home of Roy Parks, wealthy ranchman at Midland.

Eugene Blunt East Texas Banker And Legislator Is Dead

NACOGDOCHES, Texas, Nov. 25. Eugene Blunt, 45, prominent East Texas banker, died suddenly at his home here early today.

Blunt was a member of the legislature during the Ferguson administration.

Blunt was chairman of the appropriations committee during his term in the legislature. He was one of the leading orators in the state and his name was mentioned prominently at one time in connection with gubernatorial race.

Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon from Blunt's home. Doctors reported cause of death as acute indigestion.

Tidal Wave Sweeps Away Small Port In Southern Chili

Isaiah Teaches True Worship

Isaiah prophesied during the reign of Uzziah, Ahaz, and Hezekiah kings of Judah. The period of his ministry was a critical one. The kingdom of Judah flourished in much wealth and worldly greatness. With this prosperity, however, came luxury; ease, licentiousness, drunkenness and immorality of all kinds; idolatry; oppression of the poor; vain confidence in man and a corresponding lack of confidence in God.

The Lord gave Isaiah a true insight into the condition of affairs, the cause and the remedy. Therefore, he speaks boldly and with the majesty becoming the herald of Jehovah. "Hear the word of Jehovah, ye rulers of Sodom; give ear unto the law of our God, ye people of Gomorrah." History has its monuments of warning. The names of Sodom and Gomorrah have terrific significance to us; they were cities destroyed by a rain of fair, because they were unworthy to exist.

The names were fraught with even greater foreboding evil than they now. Any city or land which forgets God and lapses into sin may expect to hear some voice of doom, to experience some such dire consequence. "What unto Me is the multitude of your sacrifices?" saith Jehovah: "I have had enough of the burnt offerings of rams, and the fat of the fed beasts; and I delight not in the blood of bullocks, or of lambs, or of he goats." Sacrifices as merely outward acts, are worthless.

The people pleaded their religious zeal, devotion, service and sacrifice as a bar to the prophets severe verdict upon them. But, their prayers and words were an abomination to God, because they oppressed the poor, the widow, and the fatherless, and their hands were full of blood. "And when ye spread forth your hands, I will hide mine eyes from you; ye shall not hear; your hands are full of blood." The Pharisees were excessively careful about the outside of God's worship. The body of religion was large and monstrous, but without a soul. God would not be bribed then, neither will he be mocked now. God requires sincerity in worship. When intelligent affections of the heart are involved in devotion to God, sin is not practiced, is not effective, divine law is not violated and sacrifices and prayers are pleasing to the Lord. "Wash you, make you clean; put away the veil of your doing from before mine eyes; cease to do evil; learn to do well; seek justice, relieve the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow."

Repentance was the remedy then, it is the remedy now. Turning away from evil with the proper fruits of a contrite heart not only brings pardon, but a wealth of glory in the great beyond that is indescribable.

Note the anxious appeal of the loving Lord, "Come now, and let us reason together," saith Jehovah; though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool."

A scientific lecturer, who was explaining the process of paper-making with the iron dyes, said, "the most troublesome of all are Turkey-red rags." If the rags are dipped in the solution, its red is paler, but still strong, and if steeped long enough to efface the color entirely, the fiber will be destroyed, and useless for manufacture. How then are the red rags disposed of? They are made into red blotting paper.


God inspired Isaiah to write, not, "Though your sins be as green as grass or as black as night," but he chose the very color which modern science with all its appliances, finds to be indestructible: "Though your sins be as scarlet . . . red as crimson, they shall be white as snow."

The Jews regarded white as a symbol of purity, but red was crime, of cruelty and murder. No sin repented of is too deep-dyed to be cleansed by the precious blood of Christ. "If ye be willing and obedient, ye shall

eat the good of the land; but if ye refuse and rebel, ye shall be devoured with the sword; for the mouth of Jehovah hath spoken it."

Oh, the long outreachings of God for sinful man. Like as a father pitieth his children, so does God pity and go out after His straying ones. But Israel and Judah refused to turn from their iniquity. With all of God's pleadings, they followed Satan to sad misfortune. They preferred their debauchery, worldly pleasures and corruption instead of heavenly protection and purity of life. May we learn, for our day, the lessons of that distant, troubled time.

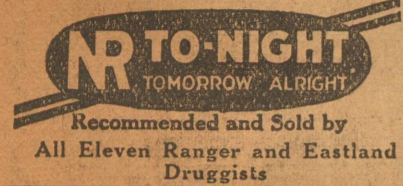

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BILLY EVANS' SPORT TALK

This has been a tough year in football for some of our leading coaches as well as some of our very best teams of last season, touted as champions for 1927.

Dr. John Wilce of Ohio State has been the target for much criticism by the alumni. Gil Dobie of Cornell has felt the sting of the chronic kickers. Tuss McLaughry, who tutored Brown's "11 iron men" of last year, going through the season undefeated, has six successive trimmings to explain.

At various times during the past five years there have been rumblings at Ohio State against the Wilce regime but the good doctor has always emerged on the top of the heap, more secure than ever.

I have it that he has tired of the criticism that is directed at him when State slumps and has already resigned, same to be announced at the conclusion of the football season.

There is no question but that Dr. Wilce knows his football. Ohio State alumni seem to believe his greatest fault is inability to get close to his men.

Great Teams That Failed
Getting back to the strong teams of last season, doped to be outstanding this year, we find these interesting facts:

Alabama, three time champions of the south, have been defeated by

Florida and Georgia Tech and held to a scoreless tie by Louisiana State. Coach Dick Hanley of Northwestern, who made a great start by winning his first Western Conference game, against the then supposedly invincible Ohio State eleven, has been in trouble ever since.

A series of unfortunate and serious injuries over which the coach has no control, has played havoc with the Northwestern schedule since the Buckeye victory. First there was the tough break in losing to Illinois by a one-point margin, followed by reverses at the hands of Missouri, Purdue and Indiana.

So great a team as Stanford has black spots on its record in defeats by St. Mary's and Santa Clara, small colleges, comparatively unknown outside of California.

Coach Bill Roper of Princeton was right when he said the forward pass had made many smaller colleges loom big as far as football is concerned.

In Defense of Coaches
However, when three big institutions such as Brown, Ohio State and Cornell, do a complete flop, it is only natural the critical, often referred to as the chronic kickers, should inquire into the situation.

I seriously doubt if the attitude taken by many of the Ohio State alumni, the bombarding of Coach Wilce in mid-season, was a good thing. It not only upset the coach but the morale of the team as well. It would have been better to have awaited the close of the season.

It has been hinted that fraternity politics handicapped the Ohio State team. The difficulty in the election of a captain for this year bears out

that belief. That, of course, is a situation the coach must handle and usually in a drastic manner.

The Cornell Daily Sun in defense of Coach Dobie says:

"Too many lounge lizards who grace fraternity portals and the drawing rooms of girls' dormitories is Cornell's trouble rather than lack of proper coaching."

Yes Sir! The season of 1927 will go down in the football records as a tough one for many of the leading coaches and supposedly championship teams.

The twenty-seventh district of firemen of Texas, will meet in Strawn on November 29, fire chief George Murphy, of Ranger announced today.

Methodists Lead Denominations At A. & M. College

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 25.—Religious census of the student body of the A. & M. college of Texas show the Methodists leading with 718, the Baptists next with 588, and the Presbyterians third with 261.

This census, which is made annually by the college Y. M. C. A. is begun at the opening of the college year, each student being asked to indicate his religious affiliation or preference. This year's census was as follows: Methodist 718, Baptist 588, Presbyterian 261, Christian 153, Episcopal 144, Catholic 129, Church of Christ 73, Lutheran 39, Jewish 15, Christian Science 12, congregational 6, Protestant Methodist 6, Mohammedan 4, Evangelical 2, Unitarian 1.

In addition to the regular Sunday morning convocation services for the entire student body conducted in Guion Hall, the college auditorium, under the auspices of the college, religious services are conducted on or near the campus by the following groups: Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian, Christian, Catholic, Episcopal, Jewish, Church of Christ, Lutheran.

The religious census given shows a total of 2151 students with religious affiliation or preference out of a total enrollment of around 2400. Students who reside on the campus number in excess of 2100, the remainder being day students.

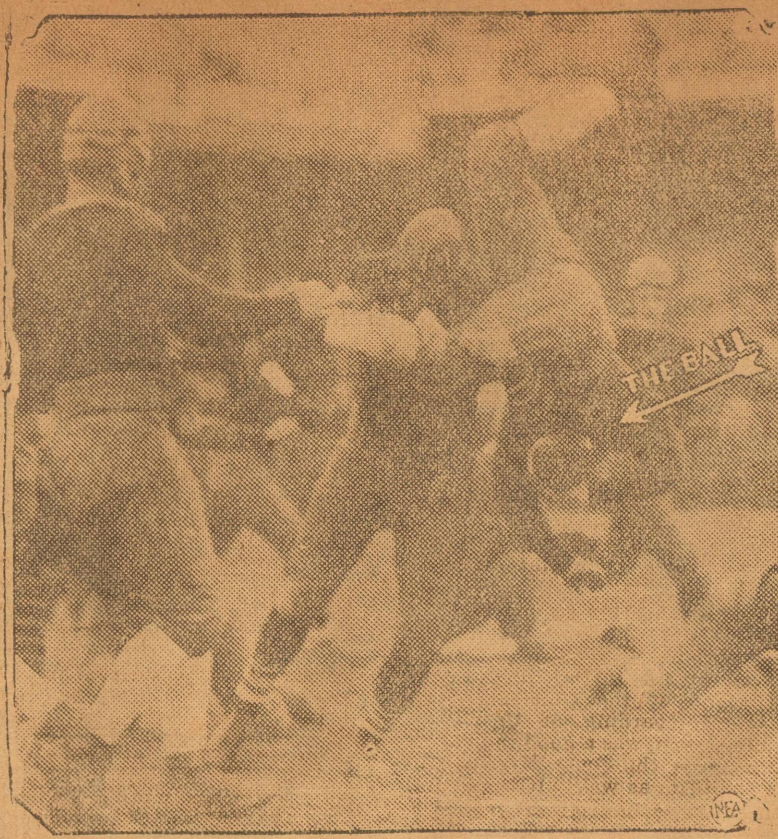
RANGER DOWNS BRECKENRIDGE IN 7-6 BATTLE

Whitehall, Tackett, Ray Trammel, Seth Hubbard and Byron Reeves were told that they were going to start the game and were going to be let stay in there as long as they hustled, and hustle they did.
Garland Hinman played a real game as fullback in that he was a

consistent ground gainer and a stone wall on defensive.
Charlie Hamilton had hard luck as a ball totter, but redeemed himself with his fierce tackling and interference running, while Gene Nourse, Turkey Hinman, Bohannon and Mitchell were carrying out their re-

spective assignments in great style. The defensive work of the team is plenty noticeable in that the Bucks only made a net gain of 29 yards from running plays from scrimmage.
Summary of the game:
The score, Ranger 7, Breckenridge 6. First downs, Ranger 16, Breckenridge 5. Forward passes: Ranger attempted 11 passes for a net gain of 87 yards in live completions and one was intercepted and four incomplete. WILL RUN AERIAL TAXI.

STOCKHOLM.—An aerial taxi service charging two dollars and a half per passenger each trip is to be inaugurated in Stockholm by H. G. Ring who has previously served as a mechanic at the army's flying field at Malmslaett and with the Aero-transport company.

Ring has purchased an amphibian plane from the navy. The machine has been approved by the government's inspection bureau to be used for passenger traffic. Aside from the regular taxi service, Ring also considers going in for sky-writing and other publicity stunts.

Pipe Man Shot At Breckenridge Is Known In Ranger

John Glenn, 35, owner of the Clean Pipe and Supply company of Breckenridge, who was shot and fatally wounded at 7:30 o'clock Thursday night, in front of the Sager Hotel, on Breckenridge avenue, was well known in Ranger and spent Armistice Day here. The deceased is reported at one time lived here, but that report was not verified. However, he did formerly live in Healdton, Okla., where he was well known by J. C. Smith of Ranger, who saw and talked to him here on

Armistice Day.
C. B. McBride a drilling contractor who is reported to have been arrested following the shooting, is known to a number of oil men here. Glenn was taken to a doctor's office immediately after the shooting, and an effort was made to stop the flow of blood. From there he was carried to a hospital, where he died about 8 o'clock. According to officers, the shooting occurred after a quarrel over drilling tools.
A .32 caliber revolver was used and the bullet went in under the shoulder blade and passed out through the neck severing the jugular vein.
Glenn is survived by his wife and two neices who made their home with him.
It was reported in Ranger today that McBride lives at Cisco.

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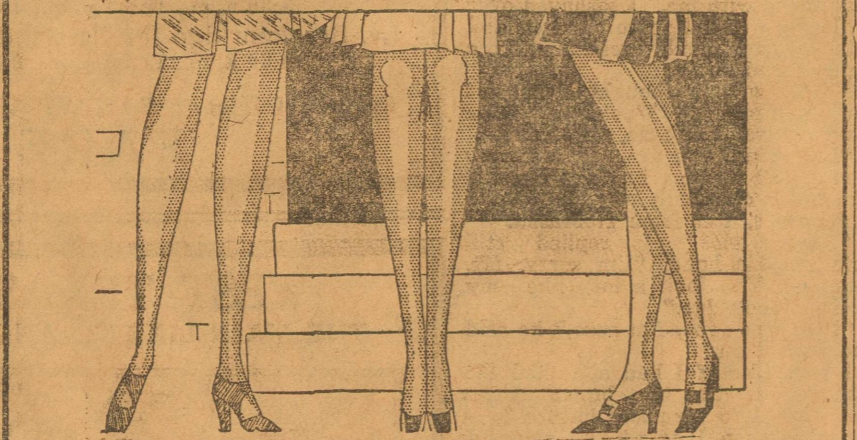
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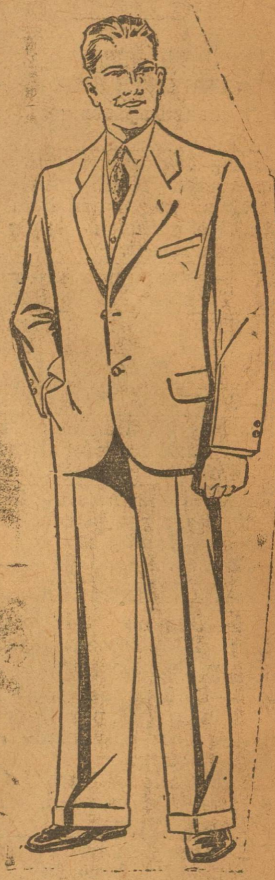
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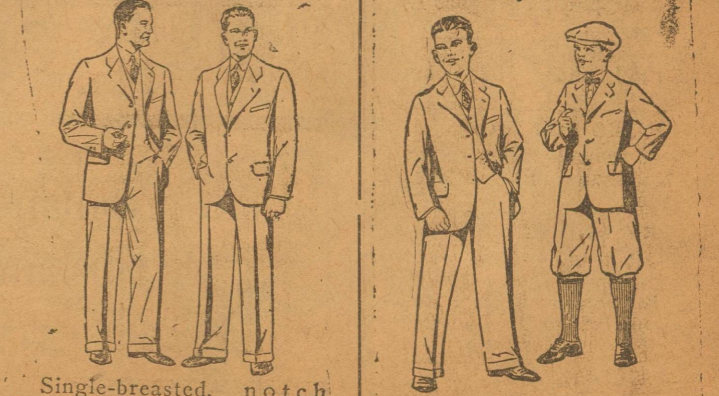
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
