## MYSTERY MAN IN JURY SPYING REVEALED

### STEEL WORKERS OF PUEBLO GO ON GUARD DUTY IN STRIKE ZONE

#### EXPECT MORE MINERS TO RESUME WORK

#### Strike Throws Steel Mill Employes Out of Work.

DENVER, Nov. 12.—Under the protection of 200 workers from the steel mills at Pueblo more striking miners were expected to return to their work today in the southern Colorado coal fields.

The steel workers thrown out of work because of a coal shortage left for the strike zone late yesterday to offer themselves as guards for working miners.

Quiet prevailed through the coal fields over Armistice Day. Striking miners marched behind flags in parades.

#### PILOT KILLED, PUPIL HURT IN PLANE CRASH

#### Plane Falls on Paved Street in Residential Section of Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12.—Al Proctor, 28, airplane pilot, was killed and his aviation pupil, Elwin Baker, 23, was removed to a hospital in a dying condition after their airplane crashed late today on a paved street in the residential district. The plane dropped 1,500 feet and hit the pavement with such force that the engine and parts of the wings were forced through the hard street surface.

#### Two Members of Tanker Crew Are Reported Lost

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—With two members of its crew reported missing and a third severely burned the tanker Beta was expected in New York harbor today following an unexplained explosion in the forward part of the ship yesterday. The injured man was burned while attempting to smother flames which followed the explosion.

#### Court Impounds Ballots Cast At Cleveland, Ohio

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 24.—Common pleas Judge Frederick P. Walthers today ordered impoundment of all ballots cast in last Tuesday's municipal election and issued a restraining order prohibiting the board of elections from certifying the result of the city manager referendum.

The two court orders were the first steps of a faction led by former governor Harry L. Davis to declare last Tuesday's election illegal and force the court to set a new date for presentation of the issue to the voters.

#### Cardinal Lualdi Archbishop Of Palermo Is Dead

PALERMO, Italy, Nov. 12.—Cardinal Alessandro Lualdi, archbishop of Palermo, died today. He was born in 1858 and was consecrated in 1907.

Cardinal Lualdi was a close friend of the pope, with whom he was a seminary classmate.

#### YOUTH GIVEN FIVE YEARS IN ROBBERY

AUSTIN, Nov. 12.—Victor Wilson, 20 year old youth tried here for alleged participation in the robbery of the University bank on Aug. 22, was given five years by the jury which reported a verdict shortly after noon.

The bank was held up by a group of men who secured \$6500 cash and about \$2500 in securities including Liberty bonds owned by the University publication.

#### Naval Reserves To Be Organized In United States

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—So American commercial craft may be prepared for the next war, the navy department has ordered naval district commanders to begin preliminary work for the organization of a United States merchant marine naval reserve.

Under the plan certain ships will be designed for suitable use by the United States in case of war and officers and crew will be eligible for training for members in the reserve.

Congress has authorized formation of such a reserve, but has yet to vote funds for it.

#### Giles Flight To Australia Has Been Postponed

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12.—Adverse weather conditions have forced Captain Frederick Giles to indefinitely postpone his proposed flight to Australia.

Captain Giles had planned to leave here at noon today for Honolulu on the first leg of his flight.

#### LOUIS FIRPO COMING TO UNITED STATES AGAIN

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 12.—Louis Firpo has informed the United Press that he intended going to New York before May to establish himself as a contender for Gene Tunney's title.

#### REFUGIO GIRL KILLED AS SHE LEAVES DANCE

#### Witnesses Declare Death Due To Accidental Shot From Revolver.

SINTON, Tex., Nov. 12.—Miss Annie Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Johnson of Refugio, Texas was shot and killed as she was entering an automobile after an Armistice dance at Refugio at 2 a. m. today.

Two witnesses, a man named Craig and another McCarb, both of Victoria told officers the shooting was accidental.

They said Miss Johnson was in the act of entering the car when a revolver on the seat accidentally discharged. The men were retained at Refugio for further questioning.

#### STEPS TAKEN TO PREVENT SALE POISON LIQUOR

#### Prohibition Administrators Ordered to Tighten Vigil On Alcohol.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Prohibition administrators today were warned to increase their vigilance on industrial alcohol withdrawals to prevent poison liquor drinking during the holiday season. While prohibition director Doran believes the government has succeeded in deterring poisonous denaturants from commercial alcohol, federal officers will guard warehouses closely to prevent leaks of unwholesome for the bootleggers Thanksgiving and Christmas trade.

#### Bishop Hendrix Dies, Funeral To Be Held Monday

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 12.—Churchmen throughout the southwest today paid high tribute to the memory of the Rev. E. R. Hendrix, 80, retired senior bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church south who died at his home here late yesterday.

Service will be held here Monday afternoon, with burial at Mt. Washington cemetery.

#### Lindbergh Leaves Selfridge Field On Flight to N. Y.

SELFIDGE FIELD, Mich., Nov. 12.—Charles A. Lindbergh hopped off alone in an army pursuit plane at 10 a. m. in a non stop flight for Mitchell Field, N. Y.

Weather conditions were favorable and the flying colonel expected to complete his 500 mile journey in a little more than four hours.

#### Three Oklahoma Men Killed When Train Hits Auto

CUSHING, Okla., Nov. 12.—Three men, one a former state high school football star, were dead today as result of a grade crossing crash here late Friday.

Elmer Hancock, Guthrie, former football player and Earl Zumer, Cushing, were killed by an M. K. & T. train at an intersection.

Charles W. Newhart, driver, died in a hospital here last night.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 12.—Capture of General Hector Almada, chief advising leader in the recent revolt, is expected almost momentarily, it was said semi-officially today.

General Escobar, commanding federal columns pursuing Almada and his few remaining bands of rebels, was said to be hopeful of meeting the fleeing revolutionist shortly.

Federal troops have captured and executed Generals Jesus Sanchez and Felix Manchuca, it was announced.

#### PROVISIONAL AGREEMENT ON TARIFF MADE

#### New Tariff Rates of France Are to be Published Soon

PARIS, Nov. 12.—Minister of Trade Bokanowski, emerging from a cabinet meeting today, told the United Press that provisional tariff agreement had been reached with the United States.

New French rates on incoming American goods, Bokanowski said, would be published in the official journal within 48 hours.

Negotiations for a new permanent treaty would open afterward, he said.

#### Civic League Puts Flower Wreath On Memorial Fountain

As has been their custom for the past several years the Eastland Civic league on Armistice day placed a wreath of flowers on the soldiers' memorial fountain, placed some time ago on the Eastland county court-house lawn. The committee from the league that placed the wreath on the fountain Friday was composed of Mrs. G. W. Dakan, chairman, and Mmes. Will Martin Fanny Burkett and Earle Johnson.

#### SUBMARINE RAMS, SINKS BATTLE SHIP DRIFTER

WEYMOUTH, Eng., Nov. 12.—The submarine L-56 this morning collided with a "drifter" from the battle ship Revenge, in Portland harbor. The "drifter" which was carrying 56 persons sank immediately but all aboard were rescued. Damage to the submarine has not been reported.

#### GOVERNOR MOODY LEAVES TODAY FOR BROWNSVILLE

AUSTIN, Nov. 12.—Governor Moody returned today from the Armistice day celebration at Orange. He will leave Sunday for Brownsville to take part on the program of a South Texas chamber of commerce convention.

#### LORENA TRICKEY FREED OF MURDER CHARGE

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Nov. 12.—Lorena Trickey, famous rodeo performer, was found not guilty today by a jury in the Lake county court here of the murder of J. P. Harris, her common-law husband.

The jury was out slightly more than an hour.

#### EX-SOLDIER DISGUSTED WITH JOB AS SPY

#### Bares Secret to Former Governor Pinchot Pennsylvania

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—A conscience stricken young ex-soldier, William J. McMullin of Philadelphia was revealed tonight as the "mystery man" who tipped the government that the Fall-Sinclair jury was being spied upon. He passed on information he secured as a member of the Burns detective squad here.

McMullin who was known as William V. Long went to former Governor Gifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania and told Pinchot he was disgusted with his assignment to watch the Fall-Sinclair jury. He had been working for the Burns agency only a few days and the jury spying was his first assignment. Pinchot sent him to Owen J. Roberts, chief of government counsel and since Oct. 24 he has reported the activities of the Burns squad to government counsel.

The revelation constituted the sensation promised yesterday by government counsel. It came after several days of high tension about the grand jury room which reached a climax today when Pinchot and "Long" both appeared before the grand jury.

#### STATEMENT IS ISSUED BY TREASURER

#### Declares State Comptroller Not in Position to Criticize Moody.

AUSTIN, Nov. 12.—State Treasurer Hatcher today issued a statement on state finances because of what he termed erroneous statements given out by the state comptroller and others leaving the impression that the failure to properly estimate the amount to be in the general revenue on Sept. 1 had been due to an increase of receipts and a lessening of disbursements, after the meeting of the state automatic tax board which fixed the state tax rate at 25 cents.

Hatcher asserts that the receipts for July and August, 1927, were \$122,000 less than for the corresponding months in 1926 and the disbursements \$1,000,000 more.

Hatcher said he did not criticize Governor Moody for having acted on the comptroller's estimate instead of his, when the tax was fixed, but that those figures having been acted upon he does not think the comptroller is in a position to criticize the governor for now trying to make amends "for the mistakes made by the majority of the automatic board at the instance of the comptroller."

#### Business Men's Commission Has Report Ready

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Gradual adjustment of the tariff to equalize benefits to farmers and manufacturers by lowering some industrial tariffs, creation of a federal farm board to aid in farm stabilization and other measures were resolved tonight by the business men's commission on agriculture through its chairman, Charles Nagel.

The report made after a year's study by the commission representing the national industrial conference board and the United States Chamber of Commerce has been awaited by President Coolidge and others for guidance in farm relief legislation.

#### SHIPS ALONG CORNISH COAST SENT TO SHELTER

PENEANCE, Eng., Nov. 12.—Storms which have been sweeping Great Britain, spread to the Cornish coast last night forcing 30 merchant ships of various tonnage and nationalities to seek shelter in Mounts Bay.

#### German Planes Preparing For Flight Today

HORTA, Azores Islands, Nov. 12.—Intense excitement was caused here late today by announcement from both pilots of the Junkers airplane D-1220 and the Heinkel plane D-1230 that they were preparing for a flight to the United States at daybreak.

#### Southern Pacific Engineer Killed In Coupling Train

VICTORIA, Tex., Nov. 12.—F. J. Barr, 35, San Antonio, Southern Pacific engineer was crushed to death here today while attempting to make a freight train coupling.

#### Negro Leper Is Held For Death Of Fellow Inmate

BATON ROUGE, La., Nov. 12.—A negro leper charged with murder will be tried in federal district court here Monday. So far as records here show it will be the first trial of a leper in the history of the United States.

The defendant Edward Payton, is an inmate of the federal leper colony at Carville, La.

He is charged with murder of Lloyd Richards negro, a fellow inmate on August 5.

Judge Louis H. Burns, of New Orleans, will preside over the case which also is the first murder trial in federal court here since 1884 when a sailor was tried for murder on the high seas.

#### Funeral Service For San Antonio Mayor Sunday

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 12.—Funeral services for Mayor John W. Tobin will be held at the municipal auditorium Sunday.

The body will lie in state two hours before the services.

Messages of condolence were pouring in from all parts of the U. S. and Mexico today.

The city commission will call a special election Dec. 10 to elect Tobin's successor.

#### FORMER PRESIDENT OF URUGUAY REPORTED DEAD

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Immigration of Mexicans Will Threshed Out

By RODNEY DUTCHER. NEA Service Writer. WASHINGTON—The latest immigration problem suggests the perhaps beneficial expedient of setting up immigration boundaries along state lines.

Congress probably would not consider such a proposal seriously, but it has possibilities.

Mexican immigration is the problem referred to. The present quota law, designed to restrict the great hordes of aliens from Europe, does not apply to Mexico or Canada.

Labor unions, Secretary of Labor Davis and certain congressmen have urged the inclusion of Mexicans within the quota law and the question will come before the next congress in the form of the Box bill, which proposes to place Mexican immigration on the same quota basis as European immigration.

There will be a fight over the bill, however, with areas along the Mexican border lined up against it.

The settlement behind the Box bill is based on the fact that Mexican laborers are penetrating the country to northern steel mills and railroads and doing the heavy jobs formerly performed by European workers.

Their work is mostly unskilled labor, but they are offering the same competition which the quota laws erected against Europeans was supposed to stop and their presence presumably aggravates unemployment conditions caused by our own surplus of labor.

The opposition to the Box bill and similar proposals comes most vigorously from California and South Texas, which areas depend importantly on Mexican labor for agricultural purposes.

Business men and representatives of agricultural and horticultural interests, banded together in the Association for development of California have appointed a commission to come to Washington and oppose the Box bill.

Secretary Davis has suggested limiting Mexican immigration to "skilled workers of the kind needed throughout the United States," which he believes could be effected by extension of the quota law, but this hardly would solve the question for the border farmers who may be joined in their attitude by some industrial employers of unskilled labor.

FEARS LEARNING IS BAD FOR NATIVES OF INDIA

LONDON.—Only six or seven people out of every hundred in India can read or write, according to Sir Chimanlal Setalvad, K. C. I. E., an Indian scholar and vice-chancellor of the University of Bombay.

Sir Chimanlal, who visited England recently, declared in an interview that "there are circumstances in which the ability to read and write is of little use, and even of greater harm than illiteracy would be."

At the time of the Indian Mutiny, he explained, the statesmen governing the country encouraged education by setting up most of the universities which now exist in India, but not without appreciating the danger of Indian students becoming reactionary in politics.

"There have been reactionary movements," he said, "but there has also been progress in understanding, and the risk their policy entailed has been proved worth while. Then followed lesser men, not so far-sighted who forsook the universities and urged that efforts should be primarily devoted to primary education."

"Now the state of affairs is bad as there are many learning to read and write—which is not of great value to some—while higher education is being neglected."

It is always safer to wait on our story, even if it is a few days late, because we are rapidly becoming recognized as the foremost authority on most anything.

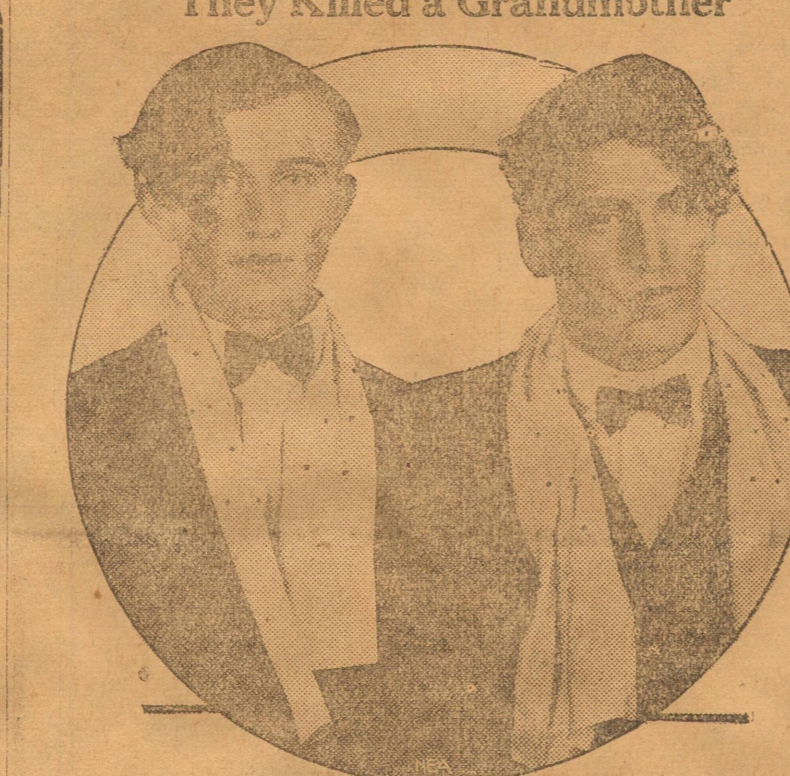

CRUSADER'S GHOST SEEN IN OLD ENGLISH CASTLE

PORTSMOUTH, Eng.—A ghost which takes the form of a Crusader is said to be haunting Portchester Castle, on the shore of the upper reaches of Portsmouth Harbor.

One Portsmouth woman tells the following story: "When I visited Portchester Castle one day, rain compelled me to seek shelter inside. Reaching the second floor I passed into the south chamber, a gloomy room, when I was amazed to see the figure of a man kneeling on the stairs."

"He was tall, stalwart and good-looking, wearing the dress of a Crusader. I was spell-bound, too frightened to collect my thoughts, much less to reason on what I ought to have done."

SAYS CROESUS KEPT MONEY IN BIG HEAPS

DENVER, Nov. 12.—If, as legend has it, King Croesus who reigned in Lydia, Asia, about 560 B. C., was one of the richest men in world history, he probably never had the satisfaction of piling his money in neat stacks.

The money in those days was too hard to stack, so the king doubtless was content to arrange his money in great heaps, Allen Herrick, advertising manager of the United States National bank here believes.

Herrick has a collection of ancient coins, among which are eight pieces known as staters. They were minted during the reign of Croesus and represent the first attempt to mint money on a national scale.

They are irregular in shape, a little more than an inch long. On one side is stamped the crude design of a wolf and a lamb. The other side is smooth.

Each coin contains about the same amount of gold as there is in United States five-dollar gold pieces. The gold, according to history and Herrick, was taken from the sands by a system of placer mining.

BOOTLEGGING LOSES HOLD IN CLEVELAND

CLEVELAND, Nov. 12.—Having weathered eight years, the bootlegging industry of Cleveland bears little resemblance to that enterprise as it was inaugurated in 1919, when the state of Ohio was decreed dry, a suzerainty of the eight years of prohibition reveals.

Seven years ago the selling of liquors was a lucrative Main street business in Cleveland. Twelve hundred saloons flourished and as many saloon owners prospered day by day as the manhood of the city drank liquors little different from those of pre-dry days.

Now the bars are practically out of business. Out of those 1,200 prosperous "institutions" fewer than 50 remain.

"Good liquor costs too much" was the reason for the bootleg business slump given by one bartender whose place was confiscated recently in a raid. "They won't pay the price and I don't blame them," he said.

"They won't touch the cheap stuff, as they are afraid of being poisoned and a good many stay away through fear of raids. It doesn't pay to keep open for the few who still come."

WOMEN'S HIGH SHOES ARE SHOWN IN LONDON

LONDON.—High shoes reaching half way up the calf and reminiscent of styles of 10 years ago will be in vogue this year with English girls, judging from the exhibitions at the shoe and leather fair which was held here.

The models shown were plain in style and had none of the swash-buckling flare of the Russian boots. It is predicted that black or brown shades will be worn by the business girls while the ultra-fashionable women will prefer scarlet boots with three-inch heels or opalescent kid boots radiant with every color of the rainbow.

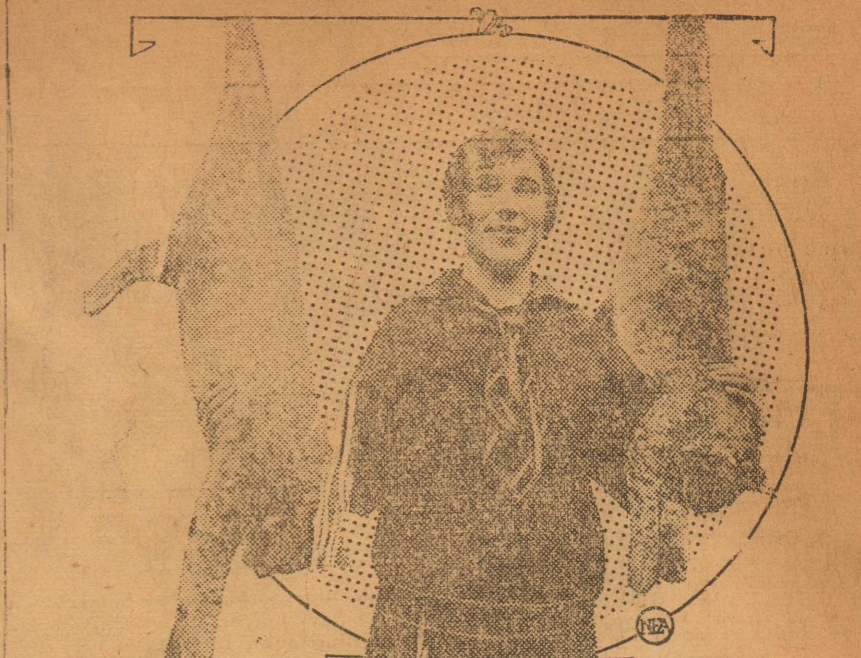

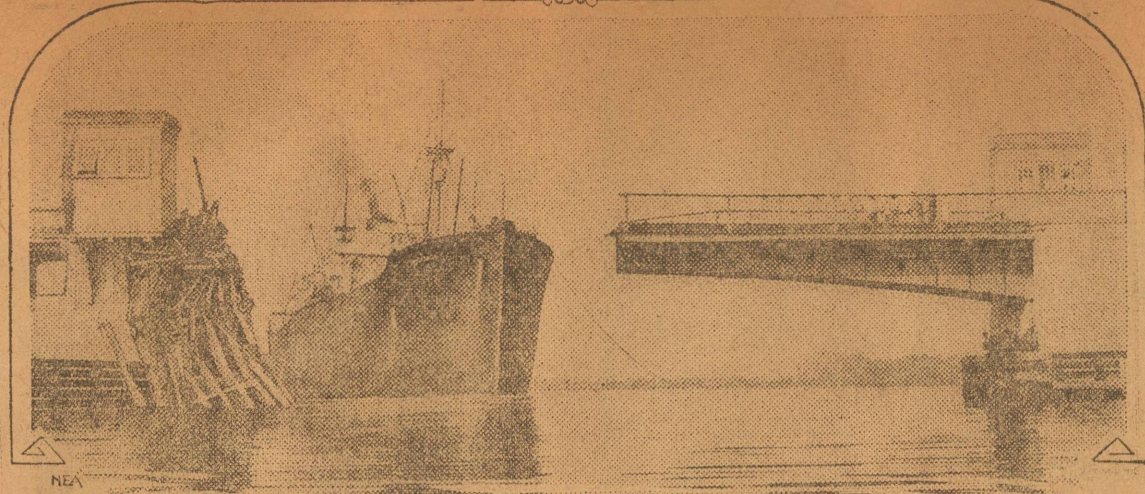

MSTANGS BEAT BAYLOR BEARS IN 34-7 GAME

Mustang Passing Combination Mann to Hume Functioned Perfectly Through Game.

The pass combination, Mann to Hume, was functioning perfectly this afternoon and time after time the "galloping ghost" grabbed the ball out of the air and tore down the field for substantial gains.

Near the end of the half Hume raced 44 yards around left end of the Bear 46-yard line. Mann carried the ball to the 31-yard line and a pass, Mann to Hume, sent Hume crashing over left tackle for seven yards and the second Mustang score. Hume kicked goal.

In the third period a lateral pass, Mann to Hume, sent Hume 55 yards down the side line shaking off tacklers as he ran for the third touchdown. The try for extra point was blocked.

Hume was hurt a few minutes later after running 44 yards to the one-yard line where he was forced out of bounds. He slid five yards with Washam and Newberry hanging to him. He remained in the game. Mann took the ball and dived over for touchdown. Hume kicked goal.

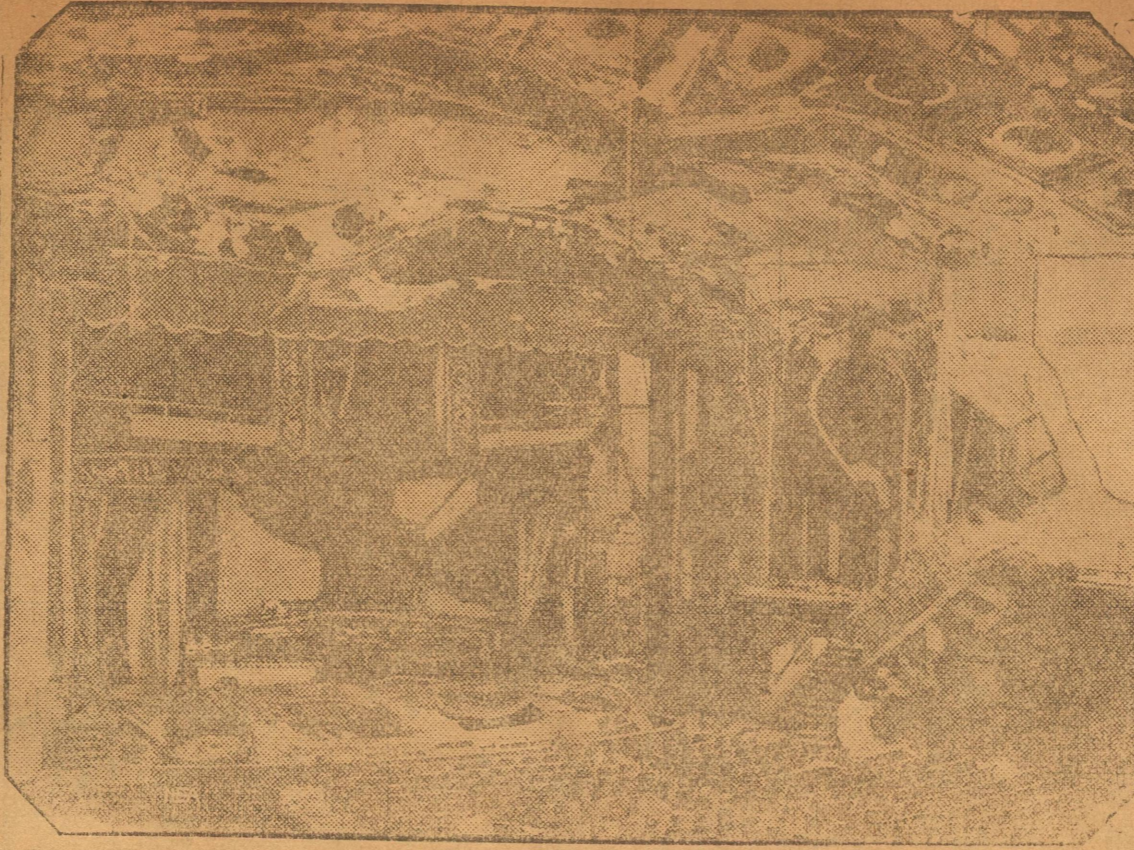
In the beginning of the last period Mann requested to be replaced by Reed so the latter could earn a letter this year. Coach Morrison granted his request.

Barring of Earl Sande May Bring Some Loud Cries

The drastic action of the Maryland Jockey Club in barring Earl Sande from riding in any track in that state and seeking to prevent him from getting a mount anywhere, doesn't set very well with the sport-loving public.

So far, the only evidence that has been submitted against Sande pertains to rough riding. The urge to win was too strong and in trying to put over his mount, he crowded a horse that was trying to get by him.

Sande did nothing crooked. He didn't pull his mount, had no connection with sure-thing gamblers. He simply tried too hard to win and in so doing was guilty of foul riding.

Perhaps Sande did foul one of the other jockeys. That is no great crime. However, it should be punished, but not by suspension for life.

If Sande has done something other than give his mount as well as some of the other jockeys a rough time of it, the public should be apprised of the additional facts.

Public Wants Facts Given a hearing to offer any evi-

dence he had that might cause the Maryland Jockey Club to reverse its decision, the officials of the club turned thumbs down on his plea.

The only statement given out was that Sande's story at the trial differed widely from what he said at the close of the race, when summoned before the judges.

The public is entitled to a recital of both stories, all the facts in the case. This would give them a chance to pass proper judgment on the dispute between the jockey club and Earl Sande.

Unless the public gets the true facts, it is going to be with Sande and feel that he has gotten a raw deal. This feeling isn't going to help the running game, now in disfavor in many states because too many jockeys

do not always try to win, as did Sande.

Earl Sande, premier jockey, deserves a better fate unless he has done more than merely crowd a horse that was trying to overtake his mount.

Will Fight It Out Sande left the conference with the officials of the Maryland Jockey Club in tears. That is easy to understand, for with Sande his reputation for honesty was always paramount.

Earl Sande has "guts." He proved that by his memorable comeback a few years ago, when no one conceded him a chance. Suffering an accident that resulted in eight broken ribs, a leg broken in three places and a fractured collar bone, Sande didn't quit.

He returned to the turf to even greater triumphs.

I do not believe Sande is the type

to sit idly by and take an unfavorable decision if he feels that he has been unjustly dealt with. The facts in the present ruling certainly makes it seem that way.

It might be a good thing for the turf game if the officials in charge were more alert to other flaws in the sport than merely rough riding in an effort to win.

# MAVERICKS GO DOWN BEFORE ANGELO, LOBOES TRIM BULLDOGS

## EASTLAND SORE FROM TILT WITH EAGLES, LOSES

San Angelo Emerges With Long End of 21-13 Game, 4 First Win of Year.

Before the largest crowd ever to witness a game in San Angelo, the San Angelo Bobcats took advantage of a driving wind and established a lead in the first quarter that the Eastland Mavericks could never overcome, and the Bobcats won their first conference game in two years by the score of 21 to 13, at San Angelo Friday afternoon.

It was an inspired bunch of Bobcats, imbued with a desire to hang the black crepe onto one of the conference leaders, that beat the crippled and sore Mavericks.

The Mavericks, still suffering from the terrific conflict with Abilene last week, started the game with four stellar players watching from the sidelines. It was a new thing for the San Angelo fans to see, as it was the first time they have witnessed the Bobcats in the lead when the last gun was fired.

The first quarter was played in a real West Texas sandstorm and the Bobcats put over two touchdowns in the first frame. The Mavericks were never able to overcome the one touchdown lead that they established. Baldwin for San Angelo, gained a total of 42 yards on two off tackle plays to put over the initial touchdown and Baker kicked the extra point from placement. The second touchdown came a few minutes later in the same quarter when Eastland made a costly fumble and Munn recovered for the Bobcats and ripped off 50 yards for the second touchdown. Baker again added the extra point from a place kick.

The Bobcats again crossed the Maverick's goal line in the second quarter to end their scoring for the day. Morrison, San Angelo, took the ball on a double pass and went around left end for a 50-yard run and a touchdown. Baker again directed the ball through the posts for the extra point.

With the wind in their favor the Mavericks were able to put the ball across for a lone touchdown in the second quarter. After Eastland had sent a long punt deep into the enemy's territory, the Bobcats returned with a punt, and line bucks by Johnson and Jones netted 25 yards and a touchdown when Johnson went over. Johnson kicked the extra point. The half ended with San Angelo 21 and Mavericks 7.

The Mavericks, sore in body and mind, came back in the second half with a determination to smother the possessor of the cellar position. They outplayed the Bobcats throughout the second half but were unable to overcome the lead, although they did manage to put over an additional

Bull Johnson, Red Jones, Jimmy King and Vaughn were the outstanding jewels of the Maverick's squad. Johnson played his usual driving offensive game but was without the support of Smith and Osbourn, when the Bobcats put over the winning markers.

Red Haley, who has been a serious threat to stronger teams all season, was the outstanding player for the Bobcats, with Baldwin and Munn the runnersup.

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## BULLDOGS AND LOBOES BATTLE THROUGH GAME

Weight and Experience Of Lobos Finally Win Out In 22 to 0 Score.

After being held scoreless for the first half, the Cisco Lobos came back in the second half with a series of running plays and passes and defeated the Ranger Bulldogs 22 to 0.

The fast end runs of Little and Keys, the line plunging of Eddleman, the passing of Pippen to Keys and the interference run by the whole backfield was too much for the lighter and somewhat crippled Bulldogs and the Lobos arrived one step nearer to the championship of the district.

Early in the second half the Lobos received a punt on their own 40 yard line and started a drive that won the game for them then and there. Keys made 17 yards and first down on the first play around left end and would have gone for a greater gain had not Dodo Tackett nailed him. Pippen then made another 17 and first down before Garland Hinman got to him.

With four downs to make four yards Eddleman failed to gain through left. Little no gain around left end and Eddleman made a bare yard through the line. Pippen then skirted left tackle and dove over the pile of players for a touchdown. Smith missed goal. The score 6 to 0.

From then on Hubbard, Bulldog quarterback, realized that his team was crippled and took plenty of chances at making back the loss and had several passes incomplete and three intercepted, one of which happened to be by Little who carried it 70 yards for a touchdown.

The Cisco Lobos earned everything they got from the Bulldogs, who fought them at every turn and contested every yard they made. It was a case of grim determination in young and inexperienced men against the same grim determination of experienced and heavier men. According to natural laws, the latter won.

A complete play by play report on the game shows that every man on the squad made a tackle or so with the majority going to G. Hinman, Hammett, Tackett and Bohanan. But this is no indication that the rest of the boys were not in their playing. T. Hinman afforded the opposition much entertainment by inviting them to come through his side.

Nourse played his first full game and gave good account of himself. Mitchell played a peach of a game at guard, and Tackett was all over the place. He was the first man to stop the famous Little.

David Whitehall was crippled when he went in, but stayed in and battled as long as he could. Arkansas McLaughlin was just a little light to break up the interference of Eddleman and Pippen, but turned them, with a smile and came up for more every time.

Seth Hubbard played his usual heady game at quarterback and played several minutes with blood streaming from his nose caused from a reckless tackler who tackled his nose.

Hinman Marked. Hammett did his part at passing, punting, running and tackling. He played the last half with a broken hand which forced Hubbard to pass, but Hammett went down and snatched a couple of nice ones from the air.

Ernest Whitehall was tough as a boot while he was in there, but went out injured in the first quarter only to come back and get some more of it in the third.

Charlie Hamilton played the best game he has played this year and at times it looked like he might get away. He also made some good tackles. Ray Trammell was in there too, for a while and worked like a Trojan to save the day.

Then comes Garland Hinman. He didn't have a chance. Recognizing him as the most deadly man on defense in the district, the Lobos had two men delegated to watch him. In spite of that Garland made some nice tackles and smeared several plays and once Little ran into him, only to be lifted up and allowed to dangle in midair a second and then dropped to the ground.

# BOWIE WOMAN ELECTED HEAD OF FEDERATION

### Mrs. W. R. Potter Unanimously Named at Closing Session of Convention.

Mrs. M. H. Hagaman of Ranger was defeated in her race for president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs on the closing day of the thirtieth annual convention held in El Paso.

Mrs. W. R. Potter of Bowie was unanimously elected to the position, receiving a decision of 177 to 317 votes. The result came as a surprise to the supporters of Mrs. Hagaman and Mrs. B. L. Stephens of Anson, who felt sure that an extra night session would have to be held in order to have a run-off. The final count revealed that Mrs. Hagaman received 51 votes and that Mrs. Stephens received 89 votes. There were 322 delegates that were entitled to vote in the race.

Mrs. Potter made a sweeping victory and received many floral offerings and a great many congratulatory telegrams when she, with the other newly elected officers, mounted the stand.

Mrs. Frank Tompkins, Corpus Christi, won the race for first vice president over Mrs. C. D. Kelley of Groesbeck. Mrs. Frank Friend of Ozona was elected second vice president; Mrs. Fred Fleming was elected recording secretary and Miss Ollie Bird, Denison, was elected treasurer. Mrs. J. U. Fields was defeated by Mrs. Maggie Barry, College Station, in the heated race for Texas director to the general federation.

Immediately after the results of the election were given out many of the visiting delegates started on the homeward journey. The Eastland county delegation will in all probability arrive home late Saturday night or Sunday. Some of the delegates stayed over in El Paso in order to take advantage of what is known as "play day." The day included a trip to Mexico, Friday night, and a trip to Carlsbad cavern scheduled for Saturday morning.

The election Friday closed one of the stormiest meetings ever held by the federation. There was some discussion on the validity of music clubs belonging to the federation and the election was a political one from many standpoints.

The Wednesday club of Fort Worth won the first prize offered by Mrs. Julian Oppenheimer of Fort Worth, to the club presenting the best reason why music should have an important place on the club program.

Agents are licensed only for companies having permits to operate in Texas.

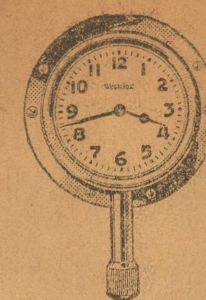

## FOR SECOND TIME IN LAST CENTURY CARDINAL QUILTS

Cardinal Billot Resigns Creating Unusual Drama In Catholic Church.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Yesterday he was Cardinal Billot, a prince of the Roman Catholic church.

Today he is simply Father Billot in a novitiate at Galloro, on beautiful Lake Nemi between Ariccia and Genzano, Italy.

Yesterday—if he wished to—he wore the cardinal red and ermine; he was received with semi-royal honors; he was one of the small body of men who assisted the pope in administering the affairs of a world-wide church.

### Plain Priestly Life.

Today—by his own will—he wears a simple black cassock; he is simply a Jesuit priest in any army of Jesuit priests; he dwells in a simple priestly cell, burning the midnight oil over his precious books or writing the manuscripts which have given him fame among the theologians of his church.

It's one of the most dramatic recent happenings in the history of a church, full of human drama.

A famous condemnation by a pope led to Ludovic Billot being made a cardinal. An equally famous condemnation by a pope has led to his giving up the cardinalate.

Billot is one of the many Frenchmen who entered the church and

served it with their cultured brains and skillful pens. For years he was professor of dogmatic theology in the Gregorian University in Rome. He combated the modernists in the church.

### Cardinal's Hat.

When Pope Pius X issued his famous condemnation of modernism in 1911 he insisted that Billot, who had never been a bishop, should accept a cardinal's hat.

The Jesuits always have avoided public or ecclesiastical honors. They become bishops in foreign missions, only when there is no one else to accept the responsibility.

Father Billot wanted to remain simple Reverend Father, but he was overruled. Even then he hardly changed his method of living. He wore the robes of a cardinal only on great state occasions in the church.

Ordinarily he wore a simple black cassock, without even a single red button to indicate his rank. Etiquette prescribes that cardinals shall move around Rome in carriages. Billot went afoot like the simplest country priest, freely mingling with the populace by whom he was known and loved.

He took a simple apartment in the South American college. It was a small flat without luxury of any kind. Its walls were adorned with a few cheap religious pictures such as the humblest citizens can buy in Rome. On a cheap wardrobe was hung a big crucifix. He ate at the refectory with the professors of the college.

His devoted servant begged him to have his meals in his apartment as do other cardinals. Billot always replied that what was good enough for the professors and students was good enough for him.

### The "Camelots de Roi"

Now in France there is a paper "Action Francaise" which is Catholic and Royalist. It supports an organization of young hot-heads, the "Camelots de Roi" who want to see Bourbon restored to a throne in France. The editors are Charles Maurras and Leon Daudet. The latter is a Catholic, Maurras is a pagan, who admires the church as a world power.

On the eve of the World War, the pope was about to issue a condemnation of the books of Maurras, but was dissuaded from doing so by Cardinal Billot. Later the condemnation was actually written, but was not issued.

In September last the aged cardinal Andrieu of Bordeaux issued a condemnation of the "Action Francaise" and its editors. The latter issued a spirited reply. The pope sent a letter of warm praise to Cardinal Andrieu.

In the meantime, at the Vatican, Cardinal Billot was defending the "Action Francaise." He was not listened to, for the pope issued a bull putting the paper on the index, probably the first time in history that a newspaper has been thus treated. A document endorsing the pope's action was signed by 117 French cardinals, archbishops and bishops.

### Audience With Pope.

Cardinal Billot was not in sympathy with the extreme movement against Maurras, Daudet and their paper. This, coupled with the fact that he never cared for princely honors in the church, led to his having a personal audience with the pope and

begging him to be allowed to resign. He had done so several times long before the Maurras affair and the pope had always refused to agree. But this time Billot's wish was heeded.

Only once before in the past century has such a thing happened. In 1838 Cardinal Carlo Odescalchi resigned and he, too, entered the Society of Jesus.

Plain Father Billot, delighted at the shedding of his honors, expects to spend his declining years at the

task he loves best—writing theological works which have great authority in his church.

### LANCASHIRE MAIDS GIVE UP KISSING CUSTOM

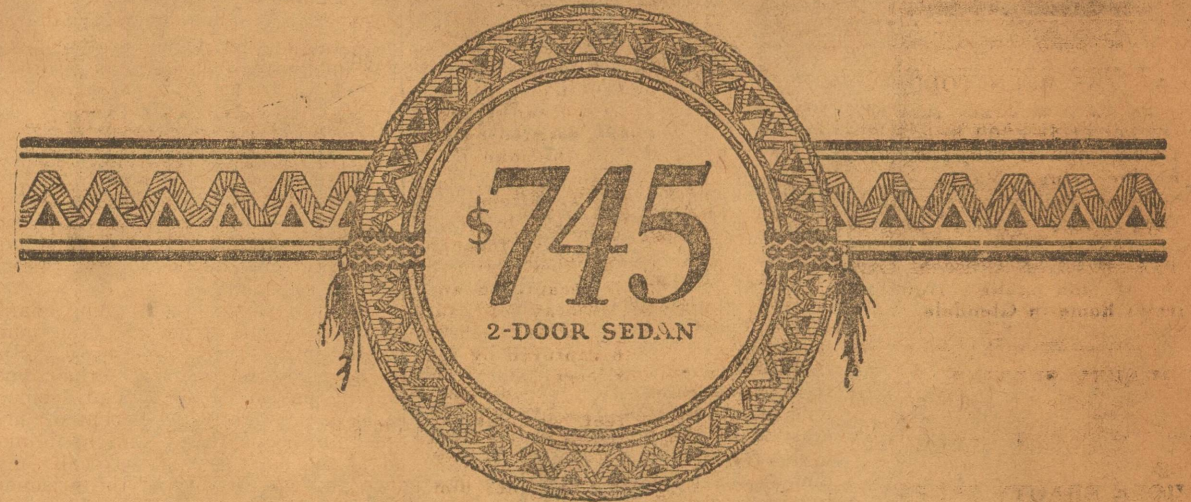
MANCHESTER, England.—Lancashire is shortly to lose one of its oldest and best loved customs.

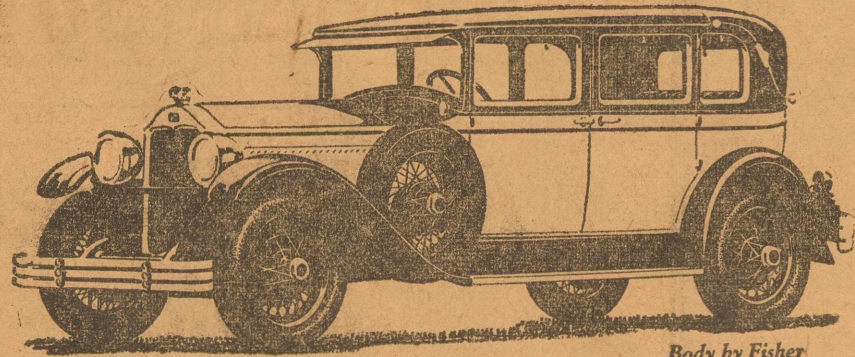

## Dodge Brothers Have Put Out Two Millionth Car

DETROIT, Nov. 12.—At 10 a. m. Saturday, Nov. 5, the 2,000,000th car which Dodge Brothers have made came off the final assembly line, just 12 years, 11 months and 21 days after the first car was built by John and Horace Dodge on November 14, 1914. No. 2,000,000 is a standard, four cylinder leather upholstered sedan and was shipped immediately to W. L. Eaton, Seattle dealer, who purchased it nearly eight years ago upon failing by six months to get in his order in time to get No. 500,000. The passing of the 2,000,000 mark by Dodge Brothers sets a new record

for the automobile industry as no other company manufacturing cars that sell in or above the Dodge price class has yet approached the point of making 2,000,000 cars in the short period of less than 13 years.

A measure of the vastness of the automobile industry and what it means to the prosperity of the nation and to Detroit in particular was furnished by President E. G. Wilmer in commenting upon Dodge Brothers' record. He pointed out that Dodge alone, in less than 13 years of existence has produced products whose retail value is estimated at \$2,200,000,000, a sum greater than the entire amount of capital invested in automobile manufacturing plants in the United States.

He also stated that Dodge Brothers has paid its employees in wages during this 13 year period approximately \$345,000,000, a sum over one half of the total wage bill of all motor car and truck factories in the United States in 1926.

"Dodge Brothers, which last year was third in the production of cars and trucks," said Mr. Wilmer, "has been undergoing an extensive transition during the past 18 months and has been engaged almost exclusively in a readjustment of manufacturing facilities. We have been getting our dealers in a position to offer their customers a complete line of fours and sixes in passenger cars and trucks and Dodge Brothers will be prepared to enjoy in 1928 the biggest business in its history."

A bit of the romance of the automobile industry characterized the final steps in the assembly of the 2,000,000th car as four men who have been identified with the Dodge interests over 35 years were given the honor of tightening the last nuts, testing the motor and making the final inspection tests. These men were associated with John and Horace Dodge, the founders of the now great automobile business that bears their name, many years before the

brothers even thought of venturing into the automobile business and they have been identified with the making of Dodge Brothers cars since No. 1 was built.

As the assembly of No. 2,000,000 was completed Al Livermore, the oldest employee in point of service, with a record of 37 years of continuous employment, took the wheel and with the next three oldest employees, Bill Wohlfel, Al. Andrich and Otto Graul as passengers, drove the car to the loading docks where they were greeted by President E. G. Wilmer, vice presidents A. Z. Mitchell, H. H. Springfield and A. T. Waterfall and other company officials and congratulated on their remarkable records.

Mr. Wilmer pointed out that Dodge Brothers has been able to make 2,000,000 cars only through the loyalty of its thousands of employees whose careful workmanship has enabled Dodge cars to attain a name for sturdiness and dependability wherever automobiles are driven.

An enterprising statistician has figured that the 2,000,000 cars which Dodge Brothers have built and sold in the past 12 years must have traveled a total distance equal to 600,000 trips from the earth to the moon. He estimated their total mileage at 150,000,000,000. If placed end to end they would make a line that would extend from New York City to San Francisco and back as far as Indianapolis, a total distance of 5,550 miles, he says.

carries steel shavings and chips from automatic screw machines to a "chip washer" 500 feet away and is capable of handling 120,000 pounds during a ten hour day, the engineers declare. The steel is carried away by creating a tremendous pressure of air driven by powerful ventilating fans, similar to those used on a smaller scale for ventilating any efficiently directed public school or theatre. To carry away the steel, more than a half million pounds of air are pumped every day through the conveyors.

Before this system was installed the steel shavings and chips were handled by trucks through aisles and passageways in the buildings. This not only required trucking equipment but a number of men and the big disadvantage was the leaking of oil from the trucks onto the floor, which made it necessary to continually cover the floor with sawdust so as to prevent accidents. The oil that dripped through onto the floor was lost as it could not be reclaimed while with the pneumatic system now in operation all of the oil is reclaimed, the engineers say.

The conveying system supplements other systems of controlled air used for collecting fine dusts resulting from grinding and polishing operations as well as a system of fans and air filters or ventilating the actories to protect the health of workmen.

### TEXAS UNIVERSITY WILL GIVE INFORMATION ON MARKETING

AUSTIN, Nov. 12.—A service which will be general in scope and which, it is estimated, will be highly valuable in its application by the Texas business men to diagnose their individual marketing problems is to be inaugurated by the department of marketing of the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas. The department has been recently organized and is headed by Dr. W. J. Reilly, marketing specialist who until recently has been research specialist for the Proctor & Gamble company of Cincinnati, Ohio. Dr. Reilly has already begun the work of gathering statistical information, from which he will arrange his service.

"Like every other state in the union," says Dr. Reilly, "Texas is almost wholly lacking in basic statistics covering wholesale and retail trade, for which within the past few years there has been an increasing amount of attention. Business men throughout the country have become vitally interested in any information that will help them to diagnose their individual market conditions as well as any information that will even in that part explain these conditions. The outstanding need for market information was emphasized

by the National Distribution conference held under the auspices of the chamber of commerce of the United States at Washington, D. C.

"One factor which has handicapped the gathering of information in the retail and wholesale field is that much of the desired information is more or less confidential in its nature," according to Dr. Reilly. "For this reason the work of gathering this data must usually be done by some impartial public service institution in which all businesses of the state have confidence. The organization of the department of marketing of the bureau of business research has created just such an institution for the gathering of such state-wide information, and the department is now fortunately in a position to begin work of gathering information for the collective benefit of the retail stores of Texas," said Dr. Reilly.

Letters requesting actual sales figures have been sent out to the merchants of twenty-eight leading Texas towns as a beginning of the service. Replies to these letters will be kept in strict confidence and the figures will be summarized and presented in the form of percentage increase or decrease in sales; so that

### Chrysler People Outline Service Plan For Winter

At this season the prudent motorist, taking time by the forelock, is beginning to consider the approaching changes in driving conditions and is planning how best to put his car in order for winter months.

Chrysler service experts, following the Chrysler policy of assuring to owners the fullest possible enjoyment of their cars throughout the year, have outlined a program of preparation. They advise motorists to make use of service station facilities, wherever possible. But as there are always a certain number of owners who prefer to condition their own cars for the winter, these suggestions will be read with profit by many.

The first step advised is to remove from the oil pan any accumulated sludge and to refill the pan with fresh oil, taking care that it is of good quality. Frequent changes of oil upward, in conjunction with proper adjustment of crankcase ven-

tilator, will continue to safeguard oil circulation.

Next, the chassis should be completely lubricated and the oil changed in the transmission and differential. The generator should be thoroughly inspected and cleaned and any worn parts replaced. With this done and the battery checked and recharged, the electrical system will have plenty of "punch."

The starting motor should be removed and cleaned, and worn parts, if any, replaced. Cleaning the starter driving mechanism is stressed as being of particular importance, both on the starter and the gear of the flywheel, as accumulated oil gets gummy and in time prevents gears from engaging, or, once engaged, from disengaging.

Connecting cable terminals of the entire electrical system should be cleaned and those at the battery, generator, starting motor, starting switch and ground greased to prevent corroding.

In the ignition system it is important that the distributor and spark plug points should be cleaned and adjusted, rotor and distributor cleaned, cables inspected and replaced if necessary and timing reset.

Other important items on the schedule include cleaning of gas tank vacuum tank and carburetor and gas lines and adjustment of the carburetor to proper winter setting. The cooling system should be thoroughly flushed, worn hose replaced and antifreeze solution poured in.

As a finishing touch, wheels should be aligned to prevent tire wear, and body bolts and spring clips should be tightened to safeguard against body squeaks and spring breakage. With the adjusting of the clutch, brake pedals and brakes the work of preparing for cold weather driving will be completed and the car owner can feel confident that he has saved himself a great deal of difficulty later on.

### COL. BARBER WILL SPEAK AT HIGHWAY CONFERENCE

Uniform Motor Code Will Be Urged Upon Attendees at Fort Worth Meeting.

FORT WORTH, Nov. 12.—Col. A. B. Barber of Washington, D. C., manager of transportation and communication department of the United States Chamber of Commerce, will be the principal speaker at the Southwestern States Highway conference to be held in Fort Worth Nov. 28 and 29, it was announced here today by J. J. Foley, of Dallas, chairman of the program committee.

The conference is being sponsored jointly by the Highway Club of Texas and the Oklahoma Good Roads association. Five states, Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico, are to be represented and the purpose of the conference is to discuss highway and traffic problems which are common to these commonwealths.

Roy M. Johnson of Ardmore, a former member of the Oklahoma Highway Commission and now president of the Oklahoma Good Roads association, as chairman of the committee on invitations, has extended invitations to the conference to highway commissioners and other executives of the five states, as well as hundreds of good roads enthusiasts and members of automobile associations and other organizations which have an interest in the problems to be considered.

Expect Thousands. Preparations are being made to entertain at least 1,000 visitors, according to W. T. Wheeler, general manager of the highway club.

Simplification and correlation of the various laws dealing with highways and traffic control in the five states is to be stressed at the conference, and as a means to this end resolutions are to be offered advocating adoption by the several states of the uniform motor code worked out by the National Conference on street and highway safety under the direction of secretary of commerce, Hoover.

Rapid increase in interstate motor traffic in the last few years and the multiplicity of highway and traffic laws in the different states has caused motorists endless confusion and it is to remove this annoyance that the uniform code is being advocated. Several states already have put it into effect, but the conference to be held in Fort Worth is the first concerted movement for its adoption in this section of the country.

One improvement to be advocated by the conference which is not covered by the uniform code provides for the uniform marking of interstate highways. All of the states now have their designated highways numbered, and the systems in vogue are said to be entirely satisfactory for purely intrastate traffic, but a source of delay and confusion for the interstate traveler. The Bureau of Public Roads has worked out a national system of number designed to rectify this condition, and adoption of this plan is to be urged at the conference.

Motor Code. Colonel Barber's address at the conference is to deal primarily with the uniform motor code, and he probably is the best qualified man in the United States to discuss the topic. When the National conference on street and highway safety was

organized, Colonel Barber was designated by Secretary Hoover as its director, and he was largely instrumental in bringing to a successful conclusion the task of drafting the code.

Colonel Barber's connection with the United States chamber of commerce has brought him in close contact with all phases of transportation—railway, highway and waterway—and he has had a wide engineering experience in the transportation field in this country and abroad.

He is a graduate of West Point and soon after the outbreak of the war was sent to France with a railway commission to report on the needs of the French railways in supply the allied forces. Later he was assigned to General Pershing's staff in connection with the organization of transportation and overseas shipping. After the armistice he supervised the transportation of supplies to various countries of Eastern Europe for the American relief administration and in 1919 was nominated by Secretary Hoover, upon request of the Polish government, to assist in the organization of the railways, coal industry and other technical services of the republic.

Colonel Barber's address is to be delivered at the opening session of the conference and he will be the guest of honor at a banquet that evening.

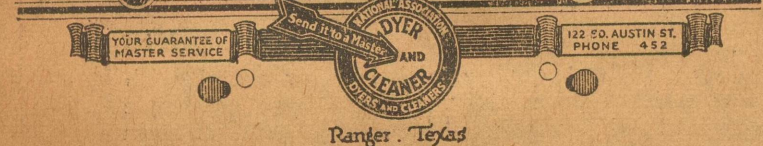

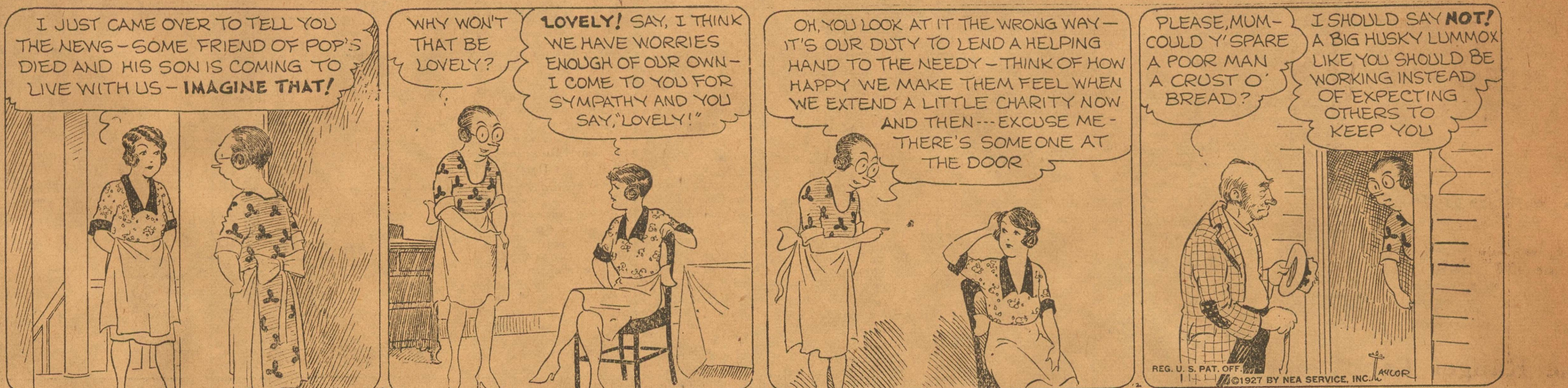
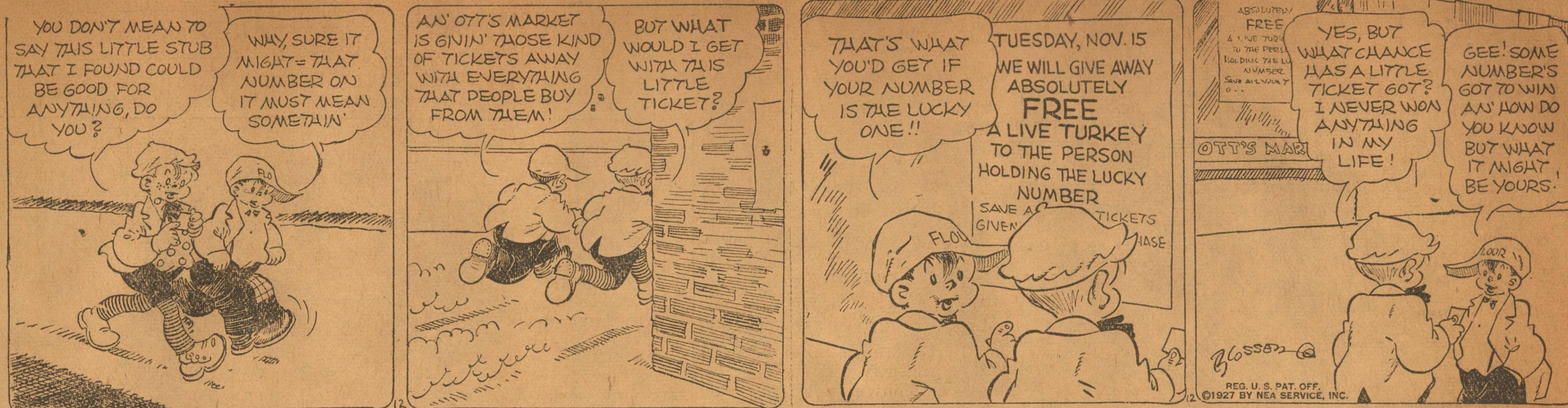

**Only One of 45 Funds Of State Is Overdrawn**

AUSTIN, Nov. 12.—Texas paid out \$7,403,114 last month, it was shown by the monthly report of State Treasurer W. Gregory Hatcher but still has more than \$6,000,000 cash on hand.

A single fund of the 45 kept by the treasurer is overdrawn. That is the Confederate pension fund. It is \$229,801 "in the red" but will be replenished as the annual payment of taxes gets underway.

The general revenue fund has a net balance of \$948,288; highways, \$4,100,000; special game fund, \$400,000; University building fund, \$127,000; permanent school fund, \$400,000 and available school fund more than \$300,000.

The state text book fund will be overdrawn if all of the \$203,517 outstanding warrants come in before the fund is replenished. It now stands at \$81,861.

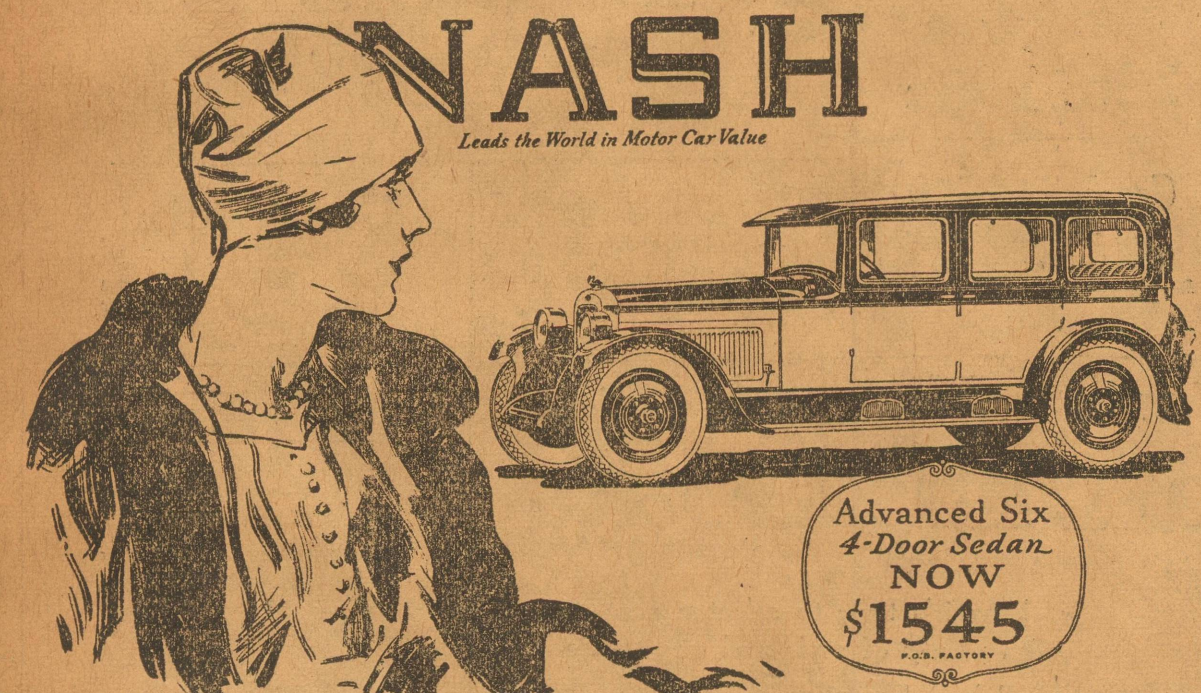

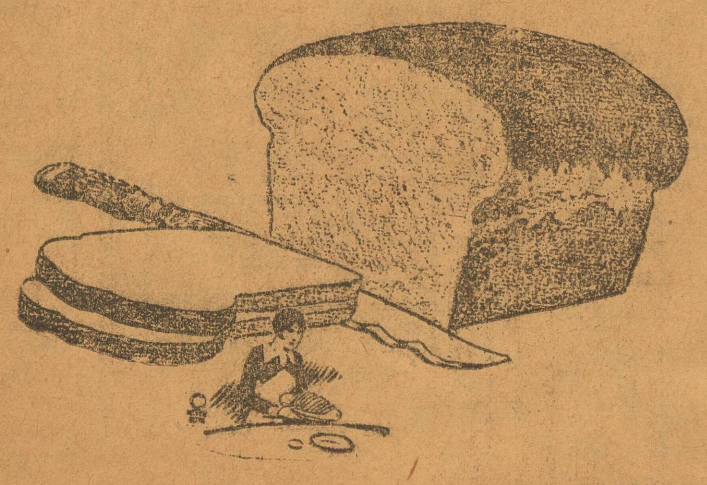
