



The primary has taken a seeming-ly more important part in the nation-al scene than the I. & R., but it seems safe to predict that the latter even-tually will become a much greater influence. Referendums are held on issues. Elections center on men. To-day there seem to be no real partisan day there seem to be no real partisan issues between the two big national parties and the same condition is ften reflected in the states.

Such issues as are mixed up in ection campaigns only serve to omplicate them to the end that it is 'ten difficult to tell which issues he voters repudiated or endorsed, re-ardless of who was elected. Then, when when the important issues gain, many of the important issue again, many of the important issues are straddled because of their ten-dency to split parties—prohibition being a classic example, of course.
