Raymond Poincare Accepts Post Tendered Last Night By Millerand.

PARIS, Jan. 13 .- Raymond Poincare, former president of France, today formally accepted President Millerand's invitation to form a new cabinet to succeed that of Aristide Briand. The appointment was tendered at 8 o'clock last night.

Poincare's formal acceptance is taken as an indication he has been successful in his efforts to complete a ministry.

COUNCIL BREAKS UP AS BRIAND RESIGNS

CANNES, France, Jan. 13-The allied supreme council adjourned indefinitely Thursday night after receipt of news of the resignation of the Briand cabinet.

Adjournment was taken after Walter Rathenau, German financial expert, had finished addressing the council, and no action or comment was made upon his remarks concerning Germany's default of her January reparations payment.
