



### FOUR MERCHANTS INDORSE PLAN FOR LIGHTING UP MAIN STREET

Four of the downtown merchants this morning expressed themselves as favoring the establishment of a white ray for Rdnger under the special rate offer of the electric light company on a series of 100-kilowatt lamps in front of the stores.

E. M. Humes favored the plan if a better one could not be evolved and stated that he expected to call a meeting of the Retail Merchants association to take up the matter on his return from New York. A. Joseph, proprietor of the Boston store, J. M. White of J. M. White & Company, and F. A. Hanshaw of the S. & H. store were all heartily in favor of lighting up Main street. Mr. Hanshaw pointed out that the installation of 100-kilowatt lamps in front of the stores would eliminate the need of part of the window lighting

and would decrease rather than increase the merchants' lighting bill.

Under the special 6-cent rate for each kilowatt hour, offered by the Oil Cities Electric company, it would cost only 6-10 of a cent an hour to burn each lamp, or a total cost for twenty lamps, (ten on each side of the block) of twelve cents. The twenty lamps, burned two hours a night would cost but 24 cents and so on, proportionately for the number of hours required. Based on a thirty-day month and two hours illumination each night, the monthly bill would be but \$7.20 for twenty lamps or 36 cents for each merchant, when pro rated. The light company also offers to install these lamps in front of all the stores at cost. Under the tentative plans all the lights would be on one meter and turned on and off simultaneously.

### HUSBAND HELD AFTER SALT LAKE CITY WOMAN IS BEATEN AND BURNED

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 13.—A coroner's jury today reported that evidence pointed strongly to Omar Woods as the slayer of his wife, Mrs. Myretta Woods, who was found burned to death in her bed and badly beaten.

It was shown that Mrs. Woods was killed, probably by a blow, before her body was set afire and that her husband had sufficient time to escape or give an alarm that bandits had en-

tered their home as he told police. Woods told authorities he saw no blow struck by bandits.

Detectives allege Woods killed his wife by a blow from a milk bottle. Two of her teeth were knocked out and an abrasion was found at a post-mortem examination.

GERMANS TO LOSE LUXURIES.

BERLIN, Jan. 13.—Dr. Walter Ratheneu, in an interview with a German newspaper correspondent at Cannes, said he had informed the reparations commission that the German government was prepared to abolish subsidies, intended to lower the prices on essential foodstuff and close her doors to the importation of luxuries.

### PENITENTIARY SYSTEM BROKE, GOVERNOR TOLD

AUSTIN, Jan. 13.—B. H. Arnold, auditor of the state penitentiary system, who is here today to confer with Governor Neff regarding prison financial conditions, said he would tell the governor at the conference that the system is "broke"—that it has no funds with which to continue operation after March 1.

Governor Neff said several weeks ago that a special session of the legislature to finance the system would not be necessary.

## BLANTON WILL STICK TO PLACE IN LOWER HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—Congressman Thomas L. Blanton late Thursday gave out a formal statement announcing that he would not be a candidate for the United States senate, but would again be a candidate for congress from the seventeenth district of Texas. The statement follows: "Although when making thirty speeches in my district, by rising vote about 90 per cent of the people in each and all my audiences indorsed my work in congress, and pledged me their support for the United States senate, I find that I am financially unable to campaign the state, hence will not make the race for the senate. I shall be a candidate for re-election to congress in the Seventeenth district of Texas."

## HOWAT TELLS MINERS TO GO BACK TO WORK

PITTSBURG, Kan., Jan. 13.—Alexander Howat, ousted Kansas president of the United Mine Workers and arch enemy of the Kansas industrial court, today has surrendered conditionally. Howat issued and sent a statement from the jail at Columbus, calling on his "rump" miners to return to work providing operators take back all the former employees. Where the mine operators refuse to take back Howat's men, the strike will continue.

## PREHISTORIC STONE MAN IS KIDNAPPED IN AUTO

PARSONS, Kan., Jan. 13.—The petrified remains of a prehistoric cave man, which were dug from a coal mine near Bluejacket, Okla., a few days ago, were missing today. Somebody had "kidnapped" the stone giant, from the barn of Claude Jenkins, where it had been lying in state, waiting for scientists and archeologists who are now on their way here to inspect it. Investigation revealed that the "cave man" had been spirited away on his first automobile ride as far as Joplin, where all trace of the relic was lost. Search was being made, however, in Oklahoma City, St. Louis and Kansas City, for it is believed an attempt will be made to sell the stone man to a circus or carnival company.

## JAPAN DENIES YIELDING ON SHANTUNG QUESTION

TOKIO, Jan. 13.—Japan has not yielded in any way, nor has it made any concessions in the Shantung negotiations, according to an official statement issued today by the foreign office. The statement declared that Japan's previous position remains unchanged.

## MURDER FARM OWNER MUST SERVE SENTENCE

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 13.—The Georgia supreme court Thursday affirmed the life sentence given John H. Williams, proprietor of Georgia's "murder farm," when it refused to grant a writ of error on an appeal. Williams was convicted of having directed wholesale slaughter of negro employees on his Jasper county plantation. The supreme court decision, it was said, definitely closes the case.

For financial reasons, if no other, Ranger should take definite steps toward extermination of its rat population. These predatory nuisances for the last several months have roamed at large and with no fear of interference except by a few individuals and a few dogs. They have intelligence, it must be admitted, and traps are not successful. Therefore, their number and the extent of the damage wrought by them continually grows greater.

One groceryman has said that they average \$10 a night damage in his store, despite every effort he can make. There is no house in Ranger, probably, that is not more or less infested by them. Figure even an average damage of a few cents at each place, Ranger's tribute to these nauseous pirates and scavengers will reach an immense total in a year's time. And it is taxation without representation. When men protest paying for the needs of government, but allow themselves to be mulcted daily in this manner, they should take second thought. Because they get something for taxes and nothing of any benefit from rationing the rats.

Rangerites individually can do nothing in this matter. Rangerites in the mass probably can do little by using stereotyped and casual methods of fighting this pest. But with experts who know of wholesale methods of destruction directing a campaign, results could certainly be accomplished. At least they are accomplished in the seaport towns, where the rodent influx is even greater than here.

It would pay Ranger in dollars and cents, to say nothing of the prevention of possible epidemics, if men who know how are brought here to exterminate this pest and teach us how, by continued efforts to keep their number to a minimum.

The rat we will have with us always, it seems. But by starting right and working periodically at the task, his number and his depredations can be cut to a very small per cent. Let's take a course in rat removal.

STEPHENS COUNTY PRODUCTION SLUMPS

WICHITA FALLS, Jan. 13.—The Burkburnett oil pools showed an increase of 2,500 barrels daily and the Electra and Kemp-Munger-Allen pools also showed slight increases, according to daily pipe line reports for the last week. The increases follow the report of last week when the total production of Wichita county showed a decline of 300 barrels daily. Stephens county pools showed a decrease of over 2,000 barrels while Young county made a daily gain of 300 barrels. The daily total of 135,000 barrels for all the fields of North Texas is practically the same as last week. Following are daily runs based on pipe line reports: Stephens county,

49,000; Burkburnett, 35,100; Young county, 9,200; Electra, 11,750; Comanche, 5,500; Kemp-Munger-Allen, 2,900; Ranger, 12,400; Moran, 270; Coleman, 120; Brown, 500; Petroliah-Strawn, 600.

## RIVER BED SUIT SET DOWN FOR TRIAL FEB. 6

AUSTIN, Jan. 13.—District Judge George Calhoun sustained the state in the preliminaries in the case styled State of Texas vs. Atkins et al., involving the rights to the river bed of the Clear Fork of the Brazos in Stephens county. The court refused to modify the injunction previously granted the state restraining others from interfering with the state's permit and his assignees in developing oil. It also declined to sustain a plea of privilege and granted time to file a brief in behalf of the plea in abatement filed by others. The case will now come to trial on its merits on Feb. 6.  
Before taking the above action the court allowed disclaimers entered by

the Humble Oil & Refining company, N. A. Moore and R. A. Chapman, which was acceptable to the state.

### Large Area Involved.

R. C. Brewster is permittee from the state and has assigned his permit to the Inland Oil company, which has erected a derrick and is preparing to drill for oil. A large area is involved, being the river bed for a long distance in Stephens county. The state, by these proceedings, is seeking to protect the rights of its permittee.

Adjoining property owners are attacking the state's permit, alleging the mineral act of 1917 void in so far as it attempts to allow permits being issued to river beds, on the ground that by drilling on such narrow strips the oil would be drained from under the surface of the adjacent land. The validity of this provision of the act will be determined by the higher courts.

A conflicting claim for the river bed is held by the Humble Oil company, which has a permit from the state board of water engineers to erect a dam and impound water for

domestic uses. The position of the attorney general is to protect both the permits, for oil and gas issued by state officials, but that the oil well must not be permitted to pollute the water, if an oil well is brought in.

### LEAKING TRANSPORT DUE IN NEW YORK SATURDAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—The leaking transport Croke, with 900 men of the army of occupation aboard, but in no danger, will reach New York Saturday or Sunday, it was said at the transport service office today.

The court changed his name to Louis Leon Lomar.

A barbecue will be given Jan. 17 to celebrate the beginning of this well, and Colonel Humphreys has been invited to attend and go over the Hubbard territory.
