CARSON CITY, Nev., Jan. 31 .- Arguing that everybody concerned in the Mary Pickford-Owen Moore divorce case is happy except Attorney General Fowler of Nevada, Gavin McNab, chief counsel, yesterday afternoon placed the matrimonial fate of "America's Sweetheart" before the final court of appeals—the supreme justices of the

McNab characterized Fowler's course as a gratuitous and meddlesome act, without any precedent at law.

"There is no aggrieved party to this act," said McNab. "It is a plain civil suit between two parties and if both are satisfied, there is no provocation for a third party action."

The case, which comes to the supreme court on an appeal in which the attorney general disputes the legality of the divorce, was taken under advisement. A decision is not expected for two or three months.

### Check Mailed Today to Retire Answering Edison's Questionnaire Wins Issues Maturing on

Feb. 10.

A check for \$45,000 was mailed to New York today by City Secretary George Hemmingson to retire that amount in municipal bonds, maturing on Feb. 10. The bonds to be retired include: \$2,000 fire station bonds; \$3,000 in sewer bonds; \$19,000 in street improvement bonds and \$21,000 in funding bonds. The latter bonds are those sold by the city to redeem warrants issued for improvements in 1919.

The bonds maturing on Feb. 10 are the first falling due since a year ago. A check for the full amount was signed yesterday by Mayor Gholson and it was decided this morning to mail the check at once, in order that the New York bond house

BOSTON, Jan. 31.—Renzi Murray, negro, who shot and fatally wounded a policeman and then barricaded himself in a south end apartment house, was captured after a heavy revolver battle with scores of policemen and firemen. The battle lasted nearly an hour and hundreds of shots were fired.

With the police unable to get near the house because of the rapid fire directed two high-pressure streams of water into it, which drove him to the roof, where he was captured by a score of policemen.

# Jersey Man Place in Inventor's Family

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.-When Thomas A. Edison formulated his famous and much abused questionnaire, he had no idea that the only man who would answer it correctly would win his way into the Edison family. But Samuel A. Halsey of Newark, N. J., will tonight marry Miss Charlotte Hawkins, sister-in-law of Charles Edison, the only son of the inventor. The wedding will take place at Charles Edison's home in West Orange, N. J.

Halsey, who is now manager of an Edison concern in this city, was one of the first to get the famous questionnaire, issued in February of last year. Instead of ridiculing, he answered it, listing the correct answer to every question, and was given an A-1 grading by the inventor himself. He was given a job juggling figures at the Edison factory, but didn't stay there long. In his advance he reached the post of chief of the personnel staff and met Miss Hawkins, who was doing welfare work in the Edison plants.

Thompson, 30, drilling contractor of Ranger, died early this morning at the Clinical hospital from burns received early Monday morning in a gas explosion at the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company's Copeand No. 1, thirteen miles north of Caddo, in the Tomcorbett vicinity, which destroyed the entire rig. The blaze was extinguished without great difficulty.

The well had come in several days ago, flowing oil and gas and was beng drilled deeper at the time of the accident, company officials state. A quantity of gas had collected about the well but it is not definitely known just how it became ignited. Thompson and his tool dresser were working at the well at the time of the explosion and it was stated at the Texas Pacific offices that neither had any idea as to the cause. Thompson is said to have been in the engine house at the time.



## DECEMBER WAS RECORD MONTH FOR FAILURES

DALLAS, Jan. 31.—Retail sales increased 42 per cent and collections 15 per cent in December over November, twenty-two department stores in the Eleventh federal reserve district reported, according to the monthly statement of business conditions in the district made public today by the federal reserve bank in Dallas. While part of the increase was ascribed to the lull in November, it was taken to indicate the public was responsive to well advertised sales of holiday goods and winter comforts, although there was curtailment due to continued depressed conditions in agricultural and livestock industries.

"Following the turn of the year however, there has been a notable picking up in both wholesale and retail lines, and if the present movement continues most branches of trade will show a much larger volume of business for the month of January, 1922, than was booked for the corresponding month of last year," the
