MEXIA, Feb. 3.-Martial law was extended today to include all Freestone county, according to a proclamation issued today by Governor Neff. Advance headquarters will be established at Teague.

The same conditions of lawlessness which caused the declaration of martial law in Mexia was said to have caused the extension. The governor's proclamation made martial law effective at 5 a. m. today. Rangers, federal agents and some national guardsmen will be sent to Teague. The national guard camp and guard house at the Winter Garden will continue to be operated. The Winter Garden is between Mexia and Teague. It was learned on good authority


that the extension was made in order to break up the manufacturing of illicit liquor to supply the oil field demand. Reports are to the effect that the moonshiners are heavily armed and a clash between rangers and moonshiners may occur.

Airplanes have been used in reconnoissance during the last two weeks and several stills have been discovered in this manner. The drive against moonshiners now planned is the most extensive yet taken against prohibition violators in the state.

Standard Lease Protested. The Standard Oil company secured

control of important fields in Northern Persia on a fifty-year lease, but the action of the Persian administration in granting the concession has been protested by the Russian government, and also by the British minister, as incompatible with the Russian-Persian agreement of Feb. 26, 1921, which it is claimed gave Russia prior rights.

Americans also have secured important concessions in Jugoslavia Czecho-Slovakia and Rumania, under stipulations providing for investment of several millions of American dollars in development work, which these countries cannot under-

Negotiations have been begun be-tween the Americans and Russian representatives for leasing the Russian fields, and putting them upon a productive basis. At the same time the Russians are seeking to secure German machinery for their oil fields, without which it is reported many of the works must close, resulting in permanent damage to certain fields and heavy losses to the Soviet government.

Former wealthy oil owners and promoters, now Russian exiles here, have been participating in these negotiations.




