Charges that Sheriff Sam Nolley had started the probable fatal cutting affray at Cisco Friday morning by attempting to slap L. J. Starkey without cause; that he had struck the legionnaire down with the butt of his gun when the latter hit him, and later attempted to shoot Starkey as he lay bleeding from a wound in his abdomen, are made in a statement from Ross Marchman, published in the Cisco News of Saturday. Marchman, who was cut in the back, declared that he received his wound from Mahaney's knife while he was grappling with the sheriff to prevent him from shooting Starkey.

On finding Nolley in Cisco, Friday shortly before noon, Starkey is said to have approached him in regard to a story said to have been told by Mahaney to the effect that the sheriff had slapped Starkey's face. He asked the sheriff to go with him to find Mahaney and straighten it out. Later, after a talk with Mahaney the sheriff told Starkey that he had not claimed to have slapped Starkey's face, but that he could, Marchman states. "Nolley drew back as if to slap Starkey, and the latter hit him in the nose," the statement continues. According to Marchman, Nolley later admitted that it was cowardly to "hit Starkey and then try to shoot him when another man had slashed open his stom-

lows in full: Ross Marchman, one of the proprietors of the auto service line operated by Marchman & Simpson, was seen at his home on East Twenty-first street this morning, and gave out a statement on the cutting affray Friday noon in which Sheriff Nolley, Newt Mahaney and L. J. Starkey were the principals.

Marchman himself received a bad wound in the back from a slash of Mahanev's knife, the muscles over his left kidney being severed. He will probably have to remain in bed for several days.

"All the service car drivers had left the passenger station following the arrival of the Sunshine Special yesterday morning at 11 o'clock," said Marchman. "Starkey and I parked our cars at the corner of Avenue D and Fifth streets, and walked up Avenue D toward Broadway.

"In front of Barnes' store I saw Nolley and stopped and talked to him for several minutes concerning his candidacy for re-election. Starkey at that time had crossed the street (Broadway) and was standing on the corner.

"Nolley and I walked on across the street and Starkey stepped up and said to me: 'Wait a minute; I want to talk to Wolley."

"To the sheriff Starkey said: 'I want to talk to you about a story that Mahaney has been telling, to the effect that you had slapped my face.' He asked Nolley to go with him to Newt Mahaney and straighten out the matter. Nolley said he would do

"Starkey and I walked on down Avenue D and stopped in front of Miley & Ledford's store. Nolley stopped in the drug store at the corner and talked to Mahaney.

"In a few minutes they came out and Nolley walked up to where Starkey was standing. Mahaney stood a few feet away, behind a post. Nolley remarked to Starkey: 'From what I can hear it is Nat Noel who has been telling that story.

"Starkey replied that it was too had that Noel's name had to be dragged into it. 'Well,' said Nolley, I never said that I slapped your face, but I can.'

"Nolley then drew back his hand as if to slap Starkey, and Starkey hit him on the nose. Sam then said, "Damn you, I'll get my gun and kill you.'

"With that, Nolley drew his gun and clouted Starkey over the head. Mahaney stepped up with a knife in his hand, and, reached around Starkey from the back, slashed him across the abdomen. Starkey hit at Mahaney but I do not know whether he hit him or
