BELIEVED UNITED STATES ARE OVERCOME BY SMOKE

"Law Infractions Should Be Punished Regard- NOLLEY SAYS HE less of Person, Position or Station," Judge Hill Says in His Charge.

EASTLAND, Feb. 7 .- "There are none so high but what they can be reached by the law," Judge E. A. Hill of the Eightyeighth district court told the grand jury this morning when it convened in special session to thoroughly investigate the encounter in Cisco Friday, in which L. J. Starkey, service car proprietor and legionnaire, was knocked in the head by Sheriff Sam Nolley and possibly fatally cut by Newt Mahaney, former deputy sheriff. "You probably have never had a more weightier duty or responsibility than now, under the present conditions, rests upon your shoulders," the court continued.

The grand jury in response to the court's call convened at 10 o'clock this morning, were sworn a second time by Judge Hill in order that their obligation and responsibility might be the more clear before them, and following a brief charge retired to begin the investigation of the Cisco affray from every angle.

HIT STARKEY IN SELF-DEFENSE

Self-defense is the explanation offered by Sheriff Sam Nolley for his part in the probably fatal cutting affray at Cisco Friday in which L. J. Starkey, Cisco legionnaire, was struck down by the sheriff's gun and slashed in the abdomen and side by Newt Mahaney.

The sheriff explains that he had no dea that Starkey was going to strike him until "he almost knocked me blind," and that he was "only attempting to defend himself in doing what he did." The sheriff states that he was attempting to settle some difference between Starkey and Ma-haney at the time and had no ill feeling at all toward Starkey. Mahaney, he states, had not been a deputy sheriff for five or six months prior to the cutting-"Mahaney is no more to me than Starkey and I am willing for the law to take its course."

In reply to the accusations of the American Legion post at Cisco, the sheriff "courts the fullest investigation" of the charges that he has protected bootleggers and gamblers and declares that he is ready and anxious to aid in any way possible to stamp out bootlegging and any other crime. The statement follows in full:



RIGHT TO DRILL IN RIVER BEDS NOW ON TRIAL

AUSTIN, Feb. 7.—There was called today for trial in the Travis county district court the case of state of Texas vs. A. A. Atkins, et al., involving the constitutionality of the act of 1917 authorizing the state land commissioner to sell mineral permits on the river beds of navigable streams in this state. The land involved is in Clear Fork of the Brazos river in the Stephens county oil district.

In the days of the Republic of Texas the constitution declared streams of the width of thirty feet or over to be navigable and that declaration was carried into the constitution of the state of Texas. It gave the republic and the state jurisdiction over the beds of such streams and the ownership thereof. Acting under that constitutional provision, the legislature in 1917, enacted the law empowering the land commissioner to issue mineral permits on the beds of navigable

Attacks Constitutionality.

Mineral permits were issued to the river bed in Stephens county and the riparian land owners have objected and sought injunctions to prevent the state's permittee drilling and the state, through the attorney general, s seeking to protect its permittees. The riparian owners contend that the 1917 act is unconstitutional; that the permittees would suck the oil from under the surface of the adjacent riparian landowners. For the purposes of this litigation the parties at bar agree that the river is more than thirty feet in width and comes within the definition of navigable streams controlled by the state.

The issue, therefore, is whether the 1917 law is valid. This case and two others are now pending in the supreme court. One is styled Clements against the land commissioner, which shine Oil company, and also a companion mandamus suit brought by


