

BANK BONDSMEN IN JOHNSON CO.

CLEBURNE, Texas, Feb. 10.—Recovery of more than \$1,000,000 in road bonds was ordered Thursday in an instructed verdict in favor of the plaintiff in the case of Johnson County vs. the Cleburne Bank et al., which has been on trial in Judge Ward's court for the last two weeks.

The suit grew out of the failure last year of the National Bank of Cleburne in which the county road bond money was deposited, and included two cases, recovery of \$947,141.04 in one case and \$83,818.97 in the other. Thirteen bondsmen are named with the bank in the first case and eleven in the other.

The county contended that since the funds had been deposited in the bank that the bondsmen, in view of default by the bank, should be held liable for payment. Attorneys for the defense questioned the legal liability of bondsmen, inasmuch as this is the first case of its kind to be brought up in Texas.

Attorneys for the defense assert that appeal will be made from the ruling by the district court and that eventually the question will be carried to the supreme court to test the question of law involved.







ANOTHER GIRL

NEW YORK, Feb. 10 .- An entirely new case against George L. Rickard the famous "Tex," known the world over as a fight promoter, is being lowing figures on the new institu-presented to the New York grand tion: 15-year-old school girl. The evidence laid before the grand jury by Ferdinand Pecora, chief assistant district attorney, concerns allegations that Rickard was indiscreet with another school girl, age 13, Anna Schoenfeld.

In the original prosecution of Rick ard the complaining witness is Alice Ruck, 15, whose story is supported by two other younger children. The Ruck case is to be heard Saturday night in the night court and on that ter. Pecora presented to the grand jury the statement of Anna Schoenfeld and also introduced Nellie Gasco age 17, as a corroborating witness This young woman disappeared recently and was found in Wappingers Falls, N. Y., in company with Nathan Podd, ex-prize fighter and profession al strikebreaker, posing as Podd's niece. Podd is held in \$10,000 bail or charge of giving a bribe to a witness in a pending criminal action.

The district attorney also brought in Herman Voch, janitor of an apart ment house in the tenderloin district in which the children said they were assaulted by Rickard.

Rickard has withdrawn from active direction of prize fights at Madison Square Garden since the charges were first made public and has made no statement except that the charges are to him amazing as they are false. IRON MOUNTAIN, Mich., Feb. 10. -Martin S.
