DETROIT, Dec. 30.—Victor Berger, Milwaukee socialist, attacked the American Legion in a speech last night as the "catspaw of capital."

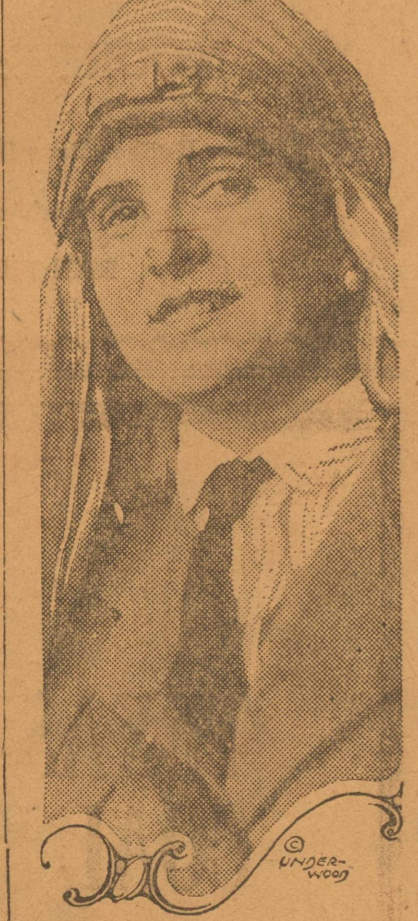
Johnson Seeks Endorsement of South Dakota

Hippodrome

If your memory runs back to the time when the Colonial was catering to the public taste for amusement, you will no doubt recall that one of the exceptionally good shows that played the up-street house was Jewel Golden's company. Since that time Golden has been going the country over, always aiming to be a little better than he need be in the show business, to get by, and after four years absence he comes to the Hipp at the head of a company of sixteen of just about as nice show folks as you will meet up with anywhere. Golden himself is a Bostonian, and prides himself in the place of his birth and all the traditions associated with it. One has only to hear him make the announcement before the curtain to know that he is a different sort of fellow with an edge and polish that is seen and felt throughout the bill. In the opener he is seen as a Hebrew character, and without over-making up he proceeds to be the typical character so thoroughly that one easily becomes interested in him. He is assisted in carrying the comedy, by Conrad Hipp, a likable worker who gets funnier the longer he is before you. The lines are well written, and the humor is continuous. The scenes in the cabaret in which the lady with taking ways gets tipsy on Vivian Dare is well done, Mildred Jewel taking the part meditated style of delivery putting a strong punch to the dry sort of comedy. Exceptionally good is the work of Lillian Bessent, who appeared to such advantage in "When Rosa McCool," etc. She was even better in her blues number, and is the best blues singer ever heard at the Hipp, not excepting the clever Vi Shaeffer. Lillian is as pretty as a peach with a smile that will win you from the first and a roguish twinkle in those eyes that is a hypnotizer.

Barney Greenwald is another clever member of the company, specializing on the violin. From the classic masters to ragtime wasn't too much of a span for the versatile young fellow, and he was just as much liked in his difficult selection comprising "Poet and Peasant," "William Tell" and "Il Trovatore" as he was in the Dixie rag. He also worked in the trio which was one of the best heard for some time. Conrad Hipp and Clarence Maurer were the other members. Their last number was a pleasing Hawaiian tune that nicely led up to the dance of pretty Hazel Welch. Dances of this character are frequent, by off-color for mixed audiences, but the little dancer kept close to the original native dances, and was easily entertaining without being vulgar. In the difficult role of female impersonator, Clarence Maurer who was here recently was pretty well received with his vocal offerings. It is unusual to see a line up of eight girls in the chorus, but Golden has them right along, and they are all good looking, well costumed, and handle musical numbers and stunts with ease and grace. All the way through the offering is an excellent one, and both houses were crowded yesterday and last night.

OPERA HOUSE

Dual role stories are of course not new to motion pictures, but it is seldom that one is seen in which the star is called on to play two such different characters as Richard Hattor and Richard Olwell in "The Fire Flingers," which will be seen tomorrow at the Opera House. This adaptation of W. J. Neidig's Saturday Evening Post story, made by Universal, presents Rupert Julian first as a wealthy, profligate publisher, who is about to desert his wife for another woman, and later as a repentant ex-convict, who, to save his chum and himself from the electric chair, impersonate the publisher after the latter has been killed.

It is almost impossible to believe that the two men seen on the screen are the same. Every gesture, every attitude of Julian Olwell, the publisher, speaks of wealth, arrogance and assured position in the world. Olwell is a brute by instinct beneath the veneer that civilization has placed on him. He is cruel to his wife. The woman with whom he is to elope fears as much as loves him.

Hattor is at the opposite extreme of human nature. One pities him from his first appearance. His humility, his voiceless resignation in the face of unmerited misfortune, his determination to make a man of himself and to see that his own dear likewise strike a note of real pathos. Among those supporting Julian are Jane Novak, F. A. Fincher, Clyde Fillmore and F. A. Warren. Waldemar Young wrote the scenario and Julian himself directed the picture.

THE LONE STAR

It is a dramatic slice of real life that has been put entertainingly upon the screen in the picture which opened a two days' run at the Lone Star Theater last night. Enid Bennett is the star, and the film is called "What Every Woman Learns." The title is significant and means this: A woman doesn't become really acquainted with the man of her choice until after she has married him and lived with him in intimate private life. In justice to the males, however, let us hope that what the woman learns is seldom so unpleasant and disillusioning as it was in the case of the gay Miss Portesque.

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Funny, isn't it, how many things are blamed on America? The "reds" blame us for living in such a land, under such a government. But now, the latest thing blamed on America is the Fiume trouble. We suppose America told Gabrielle D'Annunzio to go into Fiume and take possession of that city? General Robilant of Italy says Anglo-American capitalists, ambitious for control of Fiume as a means of penetrating Central Europe for commercial purposes, opposed Italy's claim to the port. America isn't worried, however; we're all too busy to let mere trifling accusations stop our progress.

And now the "reds" are extending their activities to the army of the United States. Reports of the intimidating of soldiers come out of Chicago, and a company is said to have been materially reduced in number as a result of the threats of the "reds." This is enough in itself to cause the denigration of every radical in the nation, but this happens to be only one of their many offenses.

It has been a prosperous year for New York thieves—the best in the history of the city. They got away with \$25,000,000 in 10,000 separate among the popular institutions visited and yielded up rich returns to the looters.

With the reopening of the Kansas coal mines, apparently the country has at last got back to a normal production basis—that is to say, a start has been made in that direction. I will be many months, however, before we can expect a normal output as the coal strike has crippled mine production to an alarming extent.

Britain and France have made up their minds they are going to get the kaiser and have him tried. Extradition proceedings are to begin soon after the peace treaty becomes effective, say press dispatches. Holland has declared the kaiser shall not be taken out of that country; he is a refugee, a private citizen, and cannot be extradited. Of course, a little thing like a threat from Holland should not stop the allies; there is such a thing as "armed diplomacy."

WHY NOT HAVE PEACE?

Chicago Tribune
Undoubtedly Europe wishes the United States would determine what agreements it will make under the covenant of the league of nations and proceed to enter into such relations. That is what French statesmen tell Tribune correspondents in Paris.
The heart of the world will not be broken if American agreements contain the reservations necessary to American security. The French wish that the United States senate and President Wilson would agree on something. No one in Europe is attempting to dictate what the United States shall do for Europe. Mr. Wilson is insisting that the nation shall make unqualified pledges, which a majority in the senate will not accept.

So important a Democratic senator as Underwood indicates his impatience, saying that the country is needlessly retarded in its endeavors to recover from war by the stubbornness of extremists in the senate. The nation is in an absurd position.
Ex President Taft, formerly a jot and tittle defender of the covenant, now says that the genius of our government is found in the ability to make necessary and reasonable compromises. That genius is not operating.

President Wilson, who declined to consult the senate while the covenant was being prepared and who declined to give the senate a copy after the agreement had been prepared, now declines to facilitate any compromises and declines to deal with the senators.
Our government cannot operate satisfactorily in that fashion. There is more than a two-thirds vote in the senate which will ratify the treaty with Germany and the covenant of the league. Europe is willing to accept whatever the senate agrees upon. The United States needs an agreement in order that its reconstruction can proceed. The world needs it for general stability. The senate could reach an agreement. The isolation of the president and the uncertainty of administration followers create a situation which, as Senator Underwood says, is becoming intolerable.

GERMAN INDUSTRIES DOING BIG BUSINESS

By Associated Press
COBLENZ.—German industries generally this fall have been doing the greatest business in more than five years, according to German newspaper accounts. Foreign orders have been coming in for months, various industrial centers have reported. Many factories are said to have on hand more orders than they will be able to fill in six months or more. On all sides employees are demanding increased wages, and many labor difficulties have arisen, with indications of unrest among the German workmen for at least some months.

No extensive sales of German goods to foreign buyers are recorded in the German newspapers, but American army officers who keep account of the industrial and economic situation assert that it is an established fact that foreign buyers are taking advantage of the low value of the mark to purchase wherever possible. In Coblenz, Belgian buyers recently have been purchasing chinaware, kitchen utensils, aluminum ware, furs and other articles of general use.
The situation has reached such proportions that the ministries of economics and finance have been discussing the advisability of establishing a duty on exports on the ground that "a large part of the German exports is being sold at sacrificial prices."

The Cologne chamber of commerce, in calling attention to the large purchases of goods by foreigners, says that in view of the low value of the mark, these foreign purchases constitute nothing more than a "commercial plundering of Germany." The chamber, as well as others in Frankfurt and elsewhere, have advised German merchants when selling to foreign buyers, to charge prices somewhat in proportion to the actual value of the goods in the markets of the world.

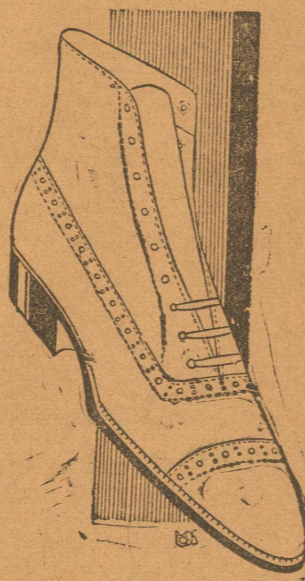

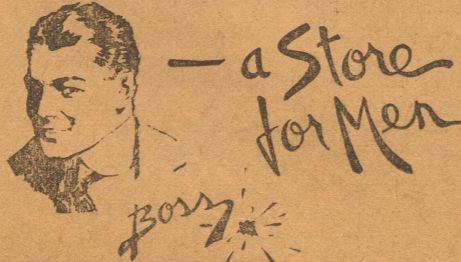

Cuba's Great Monte Carlo Ready in Another Year

New York World:
The oft talked of plan for establishing a "Monte Carlo of the Western Hemisphere" in Cuba which shall be the wet rendezvous for thirsty and sportive Americans after Prohibition has dried up the well-springs of inspiration, is not a mere rumor but a going concern with plenty of capital and backing.
The contemplated great resort, which is expected to outdo the Old World Monte Carlo in size and in number of variety of games of chance, has been definitely located in the little watering place of San Diego Hot Springs, a few miles west of Santiago. There is only a small hotel there now, but by the winter of 1920-1921 there will be two large new hotels, a great casino, and any number of smaller attractions. A few acres of some 1,200 acres will be in shape for hunting by those who care to spend time in that fashion.
The concession for the resort has been granted by the Cuban Government to the Compania Balnearia de San Diego, which has put up \$600,000 in gold as an evidence of good faith. The company has taken a 99-year lease on the resort site and has already, it is said, awarded the contracts for the building of the casino and the hotels to American firms.

MORE SHIPPING IS NEEDED BY SOUTH AMERICA

With America we have had important commercial associations and much machinery in Chile is of American or German manufacture."

Chile was the first South American nation to submit to arbitration, in 1903, when we accepted King Edward's solution of the difficulties with the United States. "The Monroe doctrine, of which the world hears so much from time to time, means continental policy, for America, North and South. It originated, it is said, in the brain of the

English statesman, George Canning. At the time of the holy alliance in Europe he instructed the British minister at Washington to suggest it to the American government. An exchange of letters followed between Monroe, Jefferson and Madison in 1823. The Monroe doctrine was the outcome."

A large number of consumers have not paid their bills. January first cut-offs will be made where bills are unpaid. If the bill is paid to the cut-off man an extra charge of \$1.00 must be made as when service is discontinued. The business will not to justify the added cost of a collector, and no business can continue unless bills are paid.
