Sailing high above the land and water fighting units, the ships of the air may travel in comparative safety, except from other ships of the air, and drop tons of intensive explosives and quantities of deadly gases that will quickly destroy the proudest navies and kill every warrior in the greatest armies, topple cities from their foundations and even snuff out the life of every creature in the enemy territory.

This is no word picture of a possibility; it is a statement of fact the next great war will prove. The people have more sympathy now than then—at least, it seems so to those of the present; they have learned hidden secrets of nature and science and in a manner have attained greater civilization, but evil remains and the temptations of the devil are as powerful as ever, and war will continue unless and until war becomes extermination, and nations must stop fighting because war means national death.

Eastland's 1924 Fire Loss Totaled \$26,121

The total fire loss for Eastland in 1924 was \$26,121, according to a report made by Chief Michaels of the Eastland fire department to the State Firemen's association. Of this amount \$15,150 was on buildings and \$10,971 was on their contents. During the year of 1924 the department answered 17 fire alarms, 13 of which were fires. The value of the buildings in the 13 fires was \$149,850 and the value of their contents was \$18,730. The total property value being \$168,580, and the total amount of insurance carried, according to the report, \$150,600.

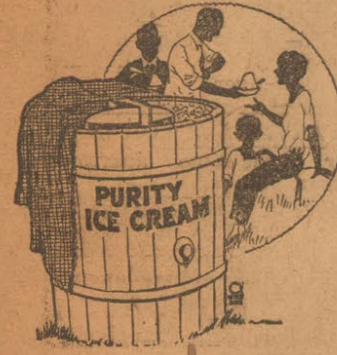

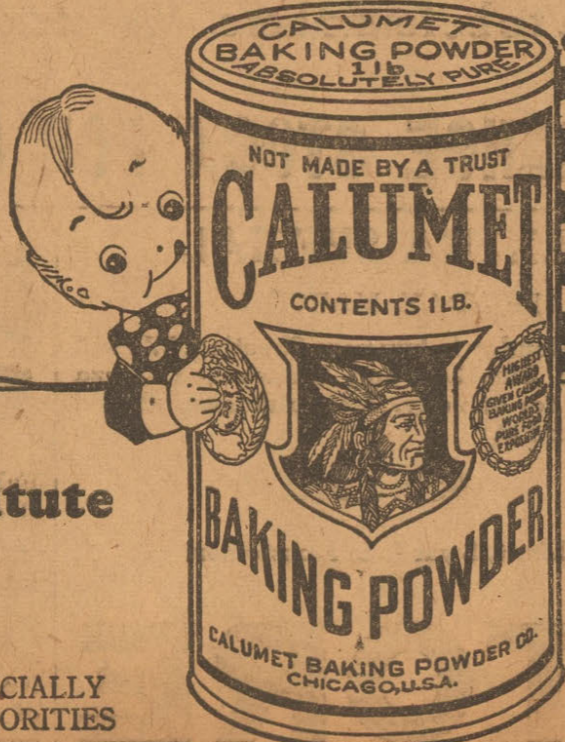

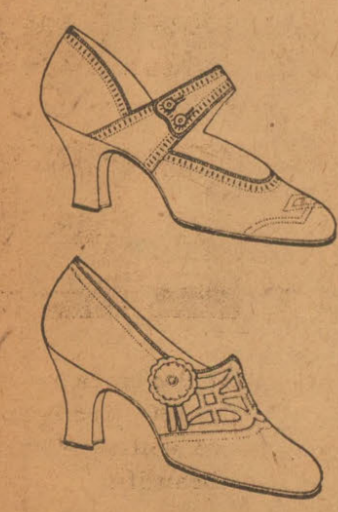

### STEEL FABRICATORS CONVENE AT DALLAS

Special Correspondence.  
 DALLAS, March 11.—Methods of lowering the cost of fabricated steel construction was outlined to Texas fabricators, architects, engineers, contractors and others interested in

construction, at a meeting here today. The meeting and banquet were arranged by the American Institute of Steel Construction.

Lee H. Miller, chief engineer of the institute, principal speaker, outlined the manner in which standard specification for the fabrication and erection of structural steel makes possible a saving of 12½ per cent in the amount of structural steel re-

quired for any specific job. The specification, as well as the code of standard practice, have been developed by the institute in an effort to bring about standardization throughout the industry, both in the fabrication and erection of structural steel.

The institute has a membership of more than two hundred fabricators of structural steel in the United States and Canada, representing

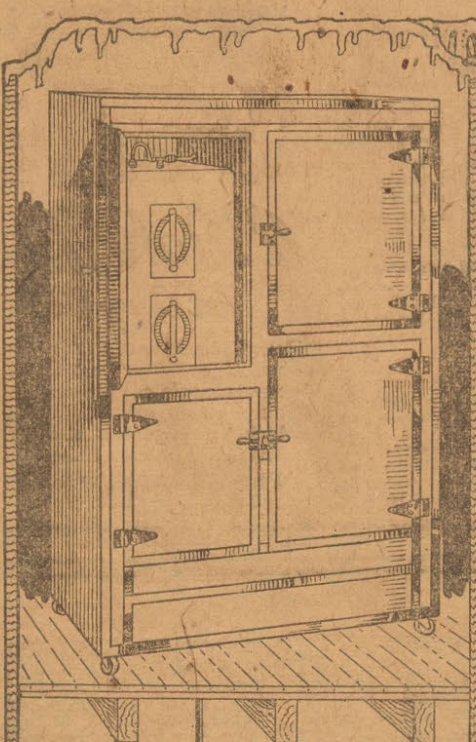
about 98 per cent of the total tonnage of structural steel produced. It is estimated the annual saving made possible in the United States through the organization's standardization activities is fully \$30,000,000.

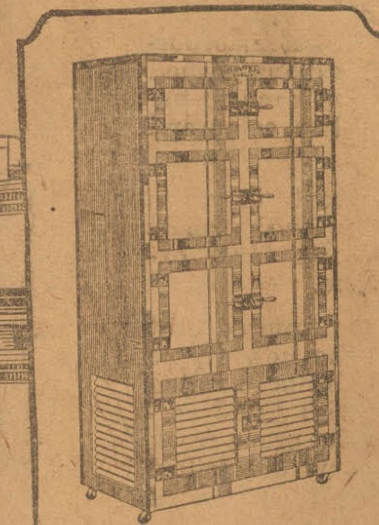

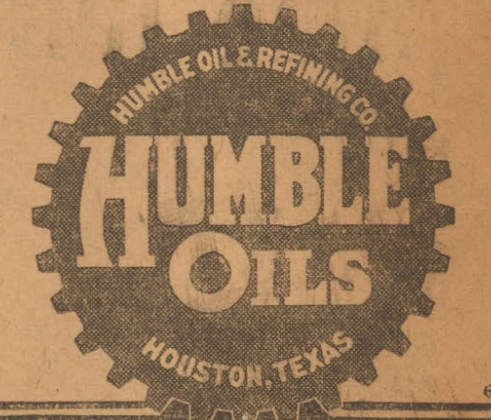
