

Pershing Is Due In Ft. Worth Sat.

FORT WORTH, Feb. 4.—General John J. Pershing and his staff of nine officers will reach Fort Worth at 8:30 a. m. February 7, coming here from Dallas.

The special reception committee from the Bothwell Kane Post, American Legion, will meet the army party at the Texas & Pacific station with a mounted escort of twenty-four men and accompany it up Main street to the Fort Worth club, where rooms have been reserved for the entire party.

After breakfast at the club, the general and his party will be taken in automobiles to Camp Bowie and the two flying fields—Taliaferro, at Hicks, and Barron, at Everman.

Camp Bowie is on the outskirts of the city and here the party will be welcomed by Colonel W. L. Reed and his staff. Taliaferro flying field is ten miles north of the city and Barron five miles south. The stops at these points will be brief and the entire party will be brought back to Lake Worth, where, at the Moslah Temple mosque lunch will be served.

The Shriners expect to give a reception there for General Pershing, who himself is a member of the order. The afternoon will be spent in a visit to the helium plant five miles north of the city, where the government is manufacturing gas for dirigibles.

On the night of February 7, Bothwell Kane Post will give the general and his officers a banquet at one of the downtown hotels. Only ex-service men will be admitted. It is expected General Pershing will deliver a brief address to the former soldiers, sailors and marines.

The Pershing party will remain in Fort Worth Sunday, Feb. 8. At the request of the commander-in-chief, no formal program will be arranged for the forenoon. However, at 12:30 p. m. the party will be guests of the Elks at luncheon and at 2 o'clock the general will unveil a memorial tablet of the Elks. This tablet is located on the side of the Elks' big building overlooking Burk Burnett park. This tablet is in memory of the Fort Worth Elks who went to war. Later General Pershing will be the guest of the Sunday schools of the city. His visit to Fort Worth will end at 7:30 p. m. Sunday, when he leaves for Lawton, Oklahoma, where he will inspect Post 531 and the government school of fire.

A feature of the Pershing entertainment here will be the participation of the commander-in-chief's former orderly, Private Hoyakama, who is now a farmer boy near Fort Worth. He served for a time under Pershing in France.



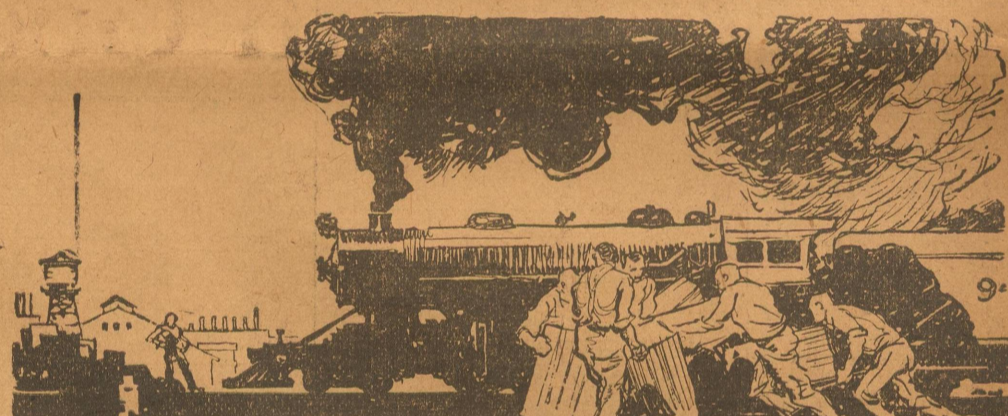

Carrying a Ton a Mile for less than a Cent

Freight rates have played a very small part in the rising cost of living.

Other causes—the waste of war, under-production, credit inflation—have added *dollars* to the cost of the necessities of life, while freight charges have added only *cents*.

The average charge for hauling a ton of freight a mile is less than a cent.

A suit of clothing that sold for \$30 before the war was carried 2,265 miles by rail from Chicago to Los Angeles for 16½ cents.

Now the freight charge is 22 cents and the suit sells for \$50.

The cost of the suit has increased 20 dollars.
The freight on it has increased only 5½ cents.

Other transportation charges enter into the cost of the finished article—carrying the wool to the mills and the cloth to the tailors—but these other charges amount to but a few cents more.

The \$10 pair of shoes that used to sell for \$5 goes from the New England factory to the Florida dealer for a freight charge of 5¾ cents—only one cent more than the pre-war rate.

Beef pays only two-thirds of a cent a pound freight from Chicago to New York.

American freight rates are the lowest in the world.

LEAGUES ELECT CAMPS FOR TRAINING

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—New training quarters have been selected by a majority of the major league baseball clubs as the scene of their spring conditioning prior to the annual battle for the pennants. Ten of the sixteen teams, including the Philadelphia Athletics and the St. Louis Nationals, which trained at home in 1919, have decided to seek new fields for their workouts. The remaining six will return to the balmy diamonds where they prepared a year ago.

As has been the case for several years, the state of Florida still leads as a popular choice, with Texas running a close second. These two states will act as hosts for seven clubs while Georgia, Alabama, Louisiana and Arizona will each accommodate two.

California will again be the scene of the spring training of the Chicago Nationals, the Cubs returning to Pasadena, where they were satisfactorily located twelve months ago.

The Beaumont commission, appointed by the Aero Club of America and the Aerial League of America, has planned three routes from New York to Yokohama, Japan, for the initial stage of the first aerial derby around the world. This event will be in the nature of a touring contest in which any person may participate. The object of the commission is to create world-wide interest in aeronautics and air travel; the building of safe landing fields and air ports; the establishing of controls and appointment of referees to check contestants in and out and to collect data for the establishing of permanent aerial lines thru out the world.

The derby contestants may use both aeroplanes and dirigibles for air travel and will be permitted to use ships, railways, automobiles and other means of transportation to make connections between controls, but the greatest and fastest average air mileage will win the master prizes. A long period of time will be allowed for the entire journey after certain zones of travel have been fixed. A contestant must consume all the time allotted to make the full trip, fly from one point to another on one day, continuing at his pleasure on to the next point, his time being officially taken by referees at all starting and stopping points. All contestants will be under the absolute control and direction of the appointed referees, who must be native citizens of the country through which the contestants are traveling.

It will not be necessary for any contestant to own an aeroplane, flying boat or dirigible as he will be privileged to engage passage in any aircraft available, as the commission hopes to be able to arrange aerial transportation across the Atlantic and Pacific oceans whereby several of the contestants may travel together.

DOCTORS OF RANGER MEDICAL SOCIETY DISCUSS INFLUENZA AND ADVISABILITY OF CLOSING

Members of the Ranger Medical Society, meeting last night in the Baptist tabernacle, discussed the influenza epidemic at length, heard from representatives of the Ranger theater men, and seemed to be of the opinion that a closing up was not indicated, although the matter should be left in the hands of the city health officer.

Proper ventilation of places of public meeting, particularly theaters, was urged, as well as steps to insure such places being thoroughly disinfected once or twice a day.

Mr. Timmins of the Lamp theater, acting as spokesman for the local theater men, said: "As it seems to be the opinion of our local health officer that all theaters, cabarets and schools be closed we wish to state that it is our desire to work in harmony with all the city and county health officials. If the situation at the present time is really serious we would like to know it. My colleagues and I cannot see any reason why the theaters should be closed for a period of three days or a week. If there is to be an epidemic of the influenza, do you physicians present think that a stoppage of shows for that length of time would do any good in proportion to the loss entailed by us?"

"As a preventive measure this will not do any real good. Can you gentlemen explain to me why the closing of theaters, cabarets, pool halls and schools would in any way allay the epidemic while all stores, soda foun-

tains and restaurants, etc. are allowed to remain open and crowds are allowed to congregate in dance halls and other places of public amusement? If things are to be shut down, the measures must be stricter than this and must close everything."

Theater Men Want to Know.

"We do want to know where we stand. Our films are ordered and we must pay for them. If we are to close let us be told so and we will abide by the terms."

Dr. Weir stated that Dr. Terrell was certainly carrying a great weight on his shoulders. If he decided to close all places of amusement he would receive the condemnation of those interested, were he to leave all open and the flu break out in Ranger, he would be hailed as a man who had not done his duty towards the commonwealth, and then again were he to close everything and the flu hit Ranger and through his efforts touch it lightly he would again receive no credit. Dr. Weir also said that from his personal observation there were no more cases of sickness in the city at present than during previous years at this time, and that he could not see that any benefit would arise along sanitary lines by closing the theaters and other places of amusement.

Dr. Pattison stated that cases of influenza were few and very light. He expressed a desire to see all places of amusement disinfected twice a day regardless of the present epidemic, as much as he thought theaters and

such were always in need of close attention along sanitary lines.

Health Officer the Real Authority.

Dr. Palmer stated that as influenza that the health officer should consult any physician. He has been determined by appointment as the man for that office and no doubt has the ability to fill the position. It is questionable whether the shows should be closed or not. However, it is better to prevent than to cure. It may help to stop an epidemic but it will not prevent one. If the city authorities are going to tighten up they are doing what is right.

In connection with the present situation he stated that shownes are morally responsible for the welfare of their customers and patrons and they should keep their theaters in the best of condition at all times. He spoke at length on the evils of poor ventilation.

Dr. Farmer stated that influenza was going to strike Ranger, a closure of shows, cabarets and other places would not benefit the city in the least. He quoted statistics from army and navy records showing that where the strictest quarantine had been effected the disease had spread just as quickly as where the situation was lax.

Dr. Shelton in closing his remarks

stated that Ranger was in such a congested state at the present time that the closure of business hours of any description would be but a useless measure.

Dr. Stucki spoke at length on the bacterial side of the influenza and remarked that his idea was to leave all places open. If the influenza were to strike the city heavily it would do so regardless of all preparation for prevention.

Dr. Wilson said that Dr. Terrell had told him that there was no epidemic here at the present time and that his plan for closing the places of congregation was merely a matter of precaution as he (Dr. Terrell) believed that the epidemic would hit this city in due course.
