CISCO C-C GETS SITES FOR 3,000-BARREL REFINERY

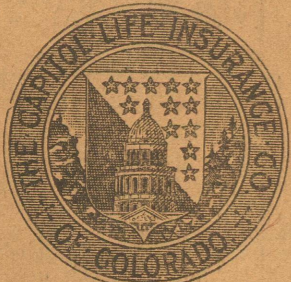

CISCO, Feb. 13.—Acting under instructions of the board of directors of the Cisco chamber of commerce, a committee has prepared the following resolutions to be sent to the board of county commissioners in connection with the tick eradication in Eastland county:

Whereas, the cattle industry has been largely the foundation upon which Texas, the largest and greatest state in the Union, has been built;

Whereas, in view of the insistent menace in capital for better bred stock;

Whereas, the law of the state provides that each county commissioners court shall arrange suitable and adequate dipping vats for tick eradication in order that cattle may be transported from one county to another without causing infection, and that cattle may be shipped to market;

Whereas, Eastland county has not provided the means required by law for tick eradication, preventing cattle owners in the county from either dipping their cattle out of the county or shipping same to market, Therefore, be it resolved that the Cisco chamber of commerce, every effort possible to induce the board of county commissioners to provide suitable and adequate dipping vats throughout the county for the above purpose, and that the chambers of commerce of Eastland, Ranger, Gorman, Carbon, Desdemona and Rising Star be requested to join us in this movement by such resolutions as they deem fit to cover same to the board of county commissioners, and that a copy of these resolutions be sent to each of the above named chambers of commerce.

EUROPE NEEDS YANKEE SHOES, LONDON SAYS

LONDON, Feb. 13.—There is a very extensive market in Europe for American shoes, particularly on the continent, according to the American Chamber of Commerce in London.

The chamber has been advised by investigators in that line of business that American manufacturers can make large sales in these countries provided they make up the shoes according to European styles. Although there is some talk to the contrary, the continental European public in general does not care for the American and English style of narrow toes and long vamp shoes. On the other hand, the American conservative models are said to be excellent sellers.

The difficulties with regard to exchange and transportation are to be considered, but are not a real obstacle.

The sales policy recommended to American manufacturers is to place an agent in each country or group of countries that could be covered by a single agent. Emphasis is laid on the need for steady supplies and a definite amount of stock should be required to be carried at all times. Payment could be made by letters of credit and the agent should be given two or three months longer to pay for the goods, thus permitting him to select the most advantageous date of payment with regard to the rate of exchange.

The comment is made, says the chamber of commerce, that European traders in general have lost their confidence in the promises of American exporters, and that the only way American shoe exporters can develop a lasting market in the foreign countries is to become importers of shoes into these countries either direct or indirect. In other words, they must set up their own organizations which they know will carry out the service traditions of their business or else

work through a properly qualified agent who will build up their reputation in that country.

AN EXODUS OF EVIL OMEN.

(Cincinnati Enquirer)
It made the Egyptians sick to watch that famous exodus of those humble slaves by whom their bricks were made without straw; but there is an exodus going on among us modern Americans which ought to make us sicker.

It is the exodus of our school teachers, who, also, have been making bricks without straw, but who, in countless shoals, are drifting into other businesses or professions.

According to the published statement of Arthur F. Wolfson, principal of the High School of Commerce, in the city of New York, "out of 120 teachers in that institution 22 have resigned in the preceding 18 months. Five have taken positions as salesmen, three have accepted higher educational positions, two have gone into advertising, and the rest are scattered through positions which range from those of agency and office managers to those of production managers and heads of exporting and domestic trades."

"In a sense," he continues, "the exodus of teachers has only just begun. Of the 22 resignations, 11 have been submitted during the last four or five months, and, unless conditions change, 10 or 12 will have to leave before another school year begins." And he winds up his alarming statement with the baffling inquiry, "What are you going to do about it?"

It is a well known fact that teaching is now, and has always been, a sort of bridge to other vocations. It is a door through which multitudes of ambitious youths have found their way to other and more permanent situations. But there has been only a normal movement, while this is a sort of stampede, excited and sustained by the increased expense of living beyond the rise of wages.

All of the changes wrought by this ominous increase in the cost of our daily necessities are sad, but this is alarming. It has been hard enough to secure the present grade of efficiency in the teaching profession, unsatisfactory as it has often been; but to realize that the brightest and most ambitious members of the existing forces are abandoning their posts puts upon us a task of filling their places which there is no other way of performing except by an enormous increase in the rewards of service, against which a howl of protest is sure to be raised by the penurious and ignorant.

It is difficult, but it is necessary, to visualize this exodus, and to grasp the effect of the inevitable depression of the standard of education of the rising generation. It will be like a diminished rainfall upon our next year's crops; like the reduction of food supplies upon the populations of Poland and Armenia. Its dangers can hardly be exaggerated. Prof. Wolfson's question, "What are you going to do about it?" ought to rouse up a trumpet call.

There is only a single answer: The salaries must be raised!

WATER MAINS BEING RUSHED BEFORE PAVING

Work on the water lines on Pine, Main, west side of Marston and Oak streets is being rushed at the present time in order to complete them before paving reaches those portions of the city. A new line of six-inch pipe is being laid across Rusk between Cherry and Cypress streets and will be of great benefit to those citizens residing there who have been without connections for some time. The connection on Marston, north of Main, has been completed.

EASTLAND TRAINS ARE TWO TO THREE HOURS LATE

All eastbound trains were late Friday. No. 26, eastbound, due here at 2:55 a. m., was taken off and did not make the run; No. 2, Sunshine Special, due at 10:48 a. m., was marked up 1:00 p. m.; No. 4, scheduled to arrive at 1:26 p. m., was chalked up to 3:25 p. m.

RAINS AT CISCO WORST THAT OLD RESIDENTS RECALL

CISCO, Feb. 13.—Never in the history of the oldest residents in this section has the country recalled such a soaking. Following a few days of sunshine it began raining here Monday and has been continuing intermittently to the present time.

Killing of Alf Jordan Trial Ends

(Continued from page 1.)

proached them as they walked up the street, he saw that Shamblin was about to shoot and he, Mays, ran away; that he, Mays, had no pistol and did not do any shooting; that he came immediately to the jail of Eastland county and remained there in jail for a while, because he had understood that certain persons at Ranger were "after him."

State Rests Case.

The state rested just before noon today and the defendant began introducing testimony. It appeared clear from the beginning that the defense is that John Mays killed Jordan and that the defendant did not even have a pistol.

John R. Speece testified that he saw the trouble, saw the men going up the street and saw the officer approach and that he saw the man who ran away from the scene in the act of shooting the officer several times and then ran away and saw him throw something away as he went by the filing station.

Mrs. Nell Shamblin testified that John Mays called up her husband that evening and invited him to come to Eastland, and that she objected to her husband coming over; that in about the time it would take an automobile to run from Eastland, John Mays came to Ranger and to the Conrad rooms, run by the Shamblins; that he and Bill Shamblin went out to some party and that later John Mays came back to her rooms and asked for a pistol; that he got a pistol off a bed and left.

She said that she went to the barber shop and called for her husband and that he and Mays came out and they all together started for the Conrad rooms; that the two men were arm in arm, and the witness was on the outside of the sidewalk walking with the men; that as they walked John Mays had the pistol in his right hand, and when they met the officer she did what she could to keep Mays from shooting the officer.

Mrs. Shamblin Accuses.

She added after he had shot Jordan, Mays ran away and she saw him throw his pistol away, and she went to her husband and helped to get him back to her rooms. Her husband did not have a pistol at the time the shooting was done, she said. About ten minutes after the shooting, her testimony continued, John Mays came and stated over Bill Shamblin that he, Mays, was his attorney and that no statement of the occurrence would be made. Mrs. Shamblin was neatly dressed when she came to the witness stand and made very positive and clear statements of the entire matter. She exhibited the suit of clothes her husband wore at the time. She stated she was a trained nurse and had never been married before. She was born in Missouri and moved to Iowa from which latter place she came to Ranger, met Shamblin and married him.

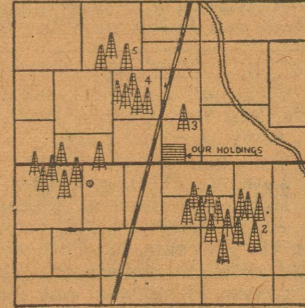

MEMBER OF "FIGHTING ANZACS" TALKS FOR LEGION THURSDAY, FEB. 19, BAPTIST TABERNACLE

Sixty members of the American Legion, themselves seasoned verbal historians of how the war was won, listened with the perfect attention that is best tribute to a speaker's power of narrative and then applauded resoundingly the talk of Sergeant-Major A. J. David, late of the Australian Imperial Forces, who was the guest of honor at the after-dinner smoker of the Legion at the McCleskey cafe Thursday night.

A careful fidelity to facts that was noted with approving nods by the veterans of the A. E. F., a gripping power of description, a true soldier's disregard of hardships and a wit that is delightful characterized his address. The soldiers roared at such casual touches as this, describing the removal of Australian prisoners of whom he was one through a French village just behind the lines.

"To add to our discomfort, two British planes, conspicuous by their absence when we needed them to keep Jerry from taking a good look at us from above, flew over Rencourt after we had been taken prisoners.

"I don't know who they thought we were, but they strafed us just the same. No loss of life, but considerable loss of bad language."

Sergeant-Major David is a typical fighting man of the country which saw no need of conscription. By his Canadian brother-in-arms he was introduced as a man from one of the units that saved the French and Canadians when Jerry's thrusts threatened total annihilation.

Sergeant-Major David will give a lecture for the benefit of the Legion at the Baptist tabernacle next Thursday night at 8 p. m. Tickets will be on sale at the McCleskey cafe and other places in Ranger.

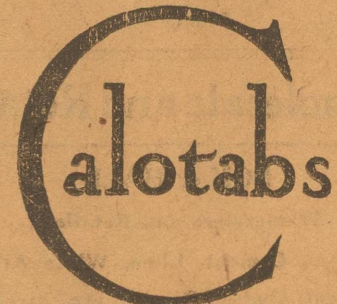
